## BISHOP POTTER ON THE SALOON.

### He Creates a Great Sensation

AT A MEETING OF THE CHURCH TEMPERANCE SOCIETY

By Saying They are a Social Necessity in this Day.

NEW YORK, Jan. 20.—Bishop Potter justified the existence of the saloon before a meeting of the Church Temperance Society last night. He told his brother bishops and the members of the Church who formed his audience that the saloons were a social necessity under existing conditions, and that they provided a reasonable and legitimate relaxation for the great majority of men, who, he pointed out, could not afford to belong to clubs.

Bishop Potter warned the society that the saloon would continue to exist until something equally attractive to laboring men was substituted for it.

His unexpected defence of the saloon caused a sensation in the meeting.

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## BE READY FOR THE ELECTIONS.

### Advice of a Liberal Member of Parliament

GOVERNMENT WILL NOT PULL OUT ITS TERM OF FIVE YEARS.

Elections When They Come Will Come Suddenly.

MONTREAL, Jan. 20.—In a speech at the Liberal Club, last night, Rodolphe Lemieux, M. P., for Gaspe, warned the Liberal workers of Canada not to be deceived with the idea that the present government would fill out its whole term of five years. He had many opportunities of conferring with the Ministers and he must warn all Liberal workers that the general elections, when they come, would come suddenly and with very short notice.

MONTREAL, Jan 20.—The funeral of the late Dr. Chiniquy took place yesterday and thousands of people were attracted to the route of the procession. Public services were held at Erskine Church, at which the leading Presbyterian divines of the city assisted.

NEWS NOTES.

The British authorities have just concluded a series of trials of the use of American petroleum as fuel for warships, and the experiment has been a failure. Russian petroleum will now be tried.

The painful litigation between Sir Tatton and Lady Sykes, which has so scandalized London owing to the charges of forgery with which it bristled, has come to an end. The parties have agreed to a deed of separation, and Sir Tatton is about to leave England for Mexico.

The Government of the Transvaal, says the Pretoria correspondent of the Times, has expended nearly £300,000 since 1894 in trying to influence the European press and European officials to prevent the leasing of Delagoa Bay to Great Britain.

Telegrams received from London, Berlin and Washington confirm the rumor so persistently circulated at Madrid some weeks ago to the effect that the Caroline Islands had been either sold or ceded to Germany. The presumption that the news is authoritative renews the talk in diplomatic circles in Madrid of intervention on the part of the powers, led by Germany, in the disposition of the Philippine Islands.

## THE RECONQUERED SOUDAN PROVINCES

### Convention between Egypt And Great Britain.

GOVERNOR GENERAL SHALL HAVE SUPREME CONTROL,

And an Open Door to all Nations— Martial Law Will Prevail.

CAIRO, Jan. 20.—The official Gazette publishes convention between Great Britain and Egypt relating to the future government of the reconquered Soudan provinces.

Great Britain is to give effect in the claims that have accrued to her by the right of conquest.

The Governor-General shall be supreme and there shall be an open door to all nations.

The British and Egyptian flags shall be used together on land and water throughout the Soudan, except at Suakin, where the Egyptian flag alone shall be used.

The convention provides that jurisdiction of the mixed tribunals shall apply to no part of the Soudan except Suakin and the whole of the Soudan shall remain under martial law until the Governor-General proclaims otherwise.

No consular agents shall be accredited to or allowed to reside in the Soudan without the previous consent of Great Britain.

The importation or exportation of slaves is absolutely prohibited.

THREE CENT STAMPS.

The Government Will Redeem Them.

OTTAWA, Jan 20.—The Post Office department has decided to redeem outstanding three cent stamps.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—The Attorney General of Nova Scotia does not count much upon Provincial ownership of the fisheries within the three mile limit. He says 'The Dominion Government has still full control of the regulation of the fisheries on the coast and in the inland waters alike.' But 'the flats where oysters are collected are clearly the property of the several provinces.'

—The Journal points out that the report of exports from Prince Conny are 'unfair' and 'injust.' The whole Province is subject to precisely the same unfairness and 'injustice.' Thousands upon thousands of our products are shipped to Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and thence to other parts of the world, of which no account is taken by the Customs and of which no reliable statistics can be obtained. No one can now tell what amount of produce this Province sends away. We agree with the Journal that reports at the Customs of all our shipments would be interesting and useful.

—Professor J. Gould Schurman, of Cornell University, has been appointed a member of the commission selected by President McKinley to study the Philippines. The other members of the commission are: Rear Admiral George Dewey, commander-in-chief of the Asiatic squadron; Major-General E. S. Otis, military Governor of the Philippines; Colonel Charles Denby, former minister in China, and now a member of the war investigation commission; Brig.-Gen. Charles E. Whittier, of New York, recently on duty at Manila. Admiral Dewey will be president of the commission.

—It is now the general opinion that the Czar's peace conference, if it meets, will be unable to do more than to give expressions to pious opinions. Lord Salisbury's reply, which was dated October 24, and which was made public last week, has attracted little notice. The belief is growing that the efforts of the Czar of Russia have failed. Since the date of the reply of the British Premier, the German Government has decided to increase its navy. Personally, Lord Salisbury and many leading officials believe that the Czar is sincere, and it is needless to say that the Queen is in entire sympathy with the proposal. But the British public, which is overwhelmingly Russophobic, distrusts the St Petersburg policy. Its immovable standpoint is Rudyard Kipling's 'The Truce of the Bear.'

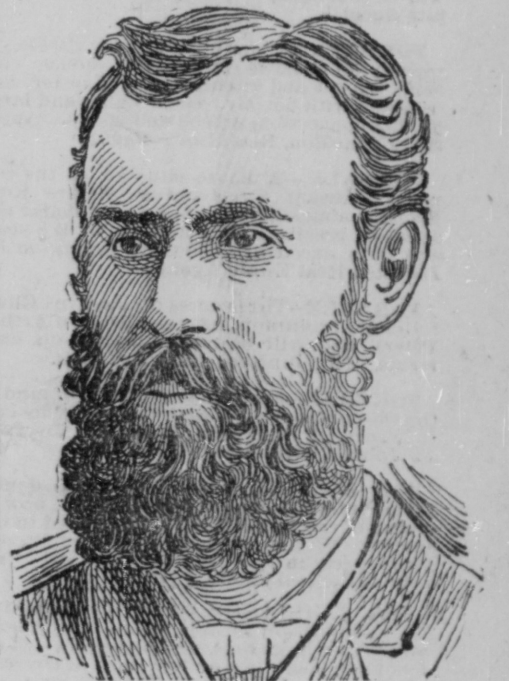
