**Farm Prices And Markets**

The following details are from the weekly marketing report prepared by the Provincial Department of Agriculture. This will be the last report for the current season:

**Potatoes**

The market for tablestock potatoes still remains very dull, and as far as seed is concerned, this is practically over for the season. Reports received indicate that the warehouses are fairly well cleaned out and the potatoes that are left are in the farmers' cellars, particularly in the outlying districts.

The following is a detailed report on prices in different sections of the Province:

Tignish — Seed — 88c per cwt. at the car. Tablestock—60c per 75 lb. bag. Potatoes pretty well cleaned up.

O'Leary — Seed — None moving. Tablestock — 45c-50c per bus. at car.

Wellington — Seed — None moving. Tablestock — 55c per bag delivered. Slow movement.

Summerside — Seed — Moun-tains and Sebagoes 50c per bus. Cobblers slow. No price. Tablestock — 45c per bus. with a fair movement. Lot of potatoes left in surrounding districts.

Kensington — Seed — None moving from farms. Tablestock—50c-55c per bag at the car. Slow movement. Lot left in cellars yet.

Borden Line — Seed — 69c-70c per 75 lb. bag at car. Heavy movement. Tablestock — 65c per bag delivered car.

Charlottetown — Seed — Cobblers 65c per bus. Other varieties 50c per bus. Very slow. Tablestock — 55c-60c per bag. Fair movement.

Vernon River — Seed — 90c-95c cwt. at car. Light movement. Tablestock — 55c-60c per bag at car.

Morell — Seed — 55c-60c per bus. at the car. Tablestock — No movement.

Elmira — Seed — Foundation

**A Katahdins** 45c per bus. More potatoes than usual left. Markets very slow. Tablestock — none moving.

**Turnips**

The turnips are practically cleaned up and any that are being offered now are more or less the culls from the season's shipping. Great difficulty is experienced in having them graded to pass inspection.

**Feeds**

There has been no change of note in the price of oats and barley during the past week and the brokers do not anticipate any change for some time. Wheat is up slightly this week over the previous week due to supplies on hand and until such time as shipping opens on the Great Lakes we cannot look for any change in feed prices.

Milled feeds have increased during the past week. Bran is now lower.
