Two cases of smallpox, of a mild type, were discovered on board the str. Sarnia from Liverpool two days before her arrival at Quebec. The patients were two Russian immigrants. They were immediately quarantined, and the ship thoroughly disinfected on arrival at port.

A MINOR tornado was, yesterday, observed on Prince Street, near Quirk's Bakery. A passing cloud seemed to suck up the dust from the street, and after circling around for a few moments, went whirling off dust and all, leaving a plainly discernible track. Fortunately no "cyclone callers" were necessary.

Home Rule Progress

LONDON, May 18.

Gladstone, in the House of Commons this afternoon, moved that the House devote four nights—out of five given to Parliamentary business every week—to the debate on the Home Rule Bill. The Premier's proposal produced a sensation as it had come to be generally believed that the Government had about given up the hope of carrying their measure, and would bring on the crisis as early as possible. After a warm and long discussion Gladstone's motion was adopted.

The Queen Assents.

LONDON, May 18.

The Queen has assented to the dissolution of Parliament, but does not approve of an immediate dissolution. Her Majesty recommends that the dissolution be postponed until August, on the ground that a general election in June would unsettle the season, and be injurious to London tradesmen.

Canadian Dynamiters

ORANGEVILLE, Ont., May 18.

Two more dynamite explosions took place here last night, one at the office and the other at the residence of Police Magistrate Monro. The indignation of the people is very great, as this is the third and greatest explosion since the initiation of the Scott Act.

Heavy Damages

NEW YORK, May 18.

The trial of the suit of James H. Goodsell to recover \$250,000 damages from the Western Union Telegraph Co. was this afternoon closed by a verdict for Goodsell against the Western Union for the full amount of \$250,000.

Damages were claimed by Goodsell for a breach of contract, the Western Union having failed to make good a contract which Goodsell held with the Atlantic and Pacific Company, which the Western Union absorbed.

LONDON, May 18.

Beach, the Australian oarsman, who recently arrived here is in robust health. He says he has come to England to row anybody who is willing to make a match with him, but has no engagements here yet.

Protecting the Fisheries

HALIFAX, May 18.

H. M. S. Emerald, 12 guns and 222 men, arrived here to-day from the West Indies, and will be engaged on the fishery protection service.
