Premier Jones Reviews Issues In By-Election

Following is the text of an address delivered Monday evening on Federal by-election campaign issues by Premier J. Walter Jones: "To make a speech on Federal issues is not the same as making one on Provincial issues. The field of Federal politics is much more extensive than the field of provincial politics. There are about twenty Ministers in the Federal Government and ten of them have Parliamentary Assistants. The only representative from the Island in the Cabinet is one Parliamentary Assistant—Mr. Watson. Almost every Ministry touches slightly on Prince Edward Island. The Ministries of Agriculture, Fisheries, Transport, Public Works, Resources and Development and of course the Post Office being the most usual. "Resources and Development has charge of the National Park and also the Trans-Canada Highway and Forestry. "Public Works has charge of building, such as the extension to the railway wharf, the improvements at Souris Harbour, wharves, docks and Federal Public Buildings. "Transport has authority over railroads, ferries, air services and communications generally.

Bonshaw Mill Destroyed By Fire

The sawmill of Mr. Garth Walton, Bonshaw, with all its machinery was destroyed early yesterday morning causing a loss of several thousand dollars. Several piles of lumber near the mill were also destroyed. The mill was the largest of its kind in the Province. It was located in a ten acre field and was known as a "portable". It was operated by heavy engines of the latest type and all its saws, planers, and other sawmill machinery was of the most modern manufacture. The fire broke out about 3 o'clock and a call was sent in for the City firemen who arrived on the scene about 3.45. The sawmill was located about 500 feet from the Crosby Mills. Origin of the fire is unknown.
