Fire Damages Royalty Barn

Members of the North River Fire department answered a call Sunday about 12.30 p.m. to the residence of Willard Link, West Royalty, where a barn fire was quickly brought under control.

A member for the department said cause of the blaze was an oil heater. There was little damage.

Fire Damages Annex Of Hall

GEORGETOWN — Fire late yesterday afternoon caused slight damage in the annex of St. James Hall here.

Glen MacDonald entered the upstairs hall shortly before five o'clock and noticed smoke. He opened a door leading to the annex and found the fire there, in a wall in a corner near the door.

He immediately notified Rev. L. B. Dooley and turned in the alarm to the Georgetown Fire Department. A pumper and volunteer firemen were on the scene quickly and the fire extinguished.

Slight damage was done to a portion of the inside wall and the fire also broke through the shingles on the outside wall in a small area.

It is thought that defective wiring may have been the cause as the hall had not been occupied and no fire had been in the furnace since Thursday night.

No damage was done to the main hall or its contents and all public functions will be carried on as usual.

Harness Racing Needs Support?

TORONTO (CP) — The Canadian harness racing industry needs support from the federal and provincial governments if the small breeder is to survive, members of the Canadian Standardbred Horse Society said at their annual meeting last week.

"The race tracks and the government take all the money they can out of racing but won't give anything back for breeding purposes," George Giguere of Montreal, society director, told the meeting.

"We need help from the government — if we had state races big enough, the small owner would be able to survive."

Dr. Glen Brown of Brampton, Ont., society president, said government aid should take the form of grants to boost the value of stakes purses. Increased prize money would let owners improve the quality of their stables and generally improve quality of racing in Canada.

Dr. Brown said New York state provided \$1,500,000 in 1965 — to be boosted to \$2,000,000 this year — for stake money for horses sired by stallions owned in the state or stallions leased for at least 10 years to breeders in the state.

The money comes from a percentage of the pari-mutuel take at the tracks.

"I think we've got to get some-

thing like this going in Canada. We've approached the federal and provincial governments on a number of occasions in the past without success.

The society will continue its efforts in this direction in cooperation with the Ontario Harness Racers Association and the Canadian Trotting Association, both of which hold their annual meetings here this week.

L. Montague Lady Dies Suddenly

MONTAGUE — The death occurred unexpectedly on Friday night of Mrs. William Anear of Lower Montague in her 89th year.

The late Mrs. Anear had been in reasonably good health until Friday evening when she was taken to the Kings County Memorial Hospital where she passed away a short time after. She was the former Darling Foote

of Lower Montague, where she was born and spent her entire life.

Her husband had predeceased her last September.

She leaves to mourn a number of nephews and nieces on her own side of the family as well as a number on the side of her late husband. One niece Mrs. Greta Yeo lives at Lower Montague.

The funeral will take place today from the Lower Montague United Church with interment in the Lower Montague cemetery.

SHERBROOKE, Que. (CP) — Maurice Allard, independent Conservative member of Parliament for Sherbrooke, says he has given the House of Commons a proposed bill on a national anthem.
