Manitoba's Trouble.

MANITOBA has not been permitted to do just as she pleased with reference to three railway charters. She feels, in consequence, very much aggrieved; and the organs of the Opposition are working up sympathy for her. But the facts and circumstances show that if she had her way, it would be detrimental to the interests of the whole country, and in the end, of herself.

As the Montreal Gazette remarks, the policy of preventing American railways from tapping the trade of the Northwest by uniting with Canadian lines running to the frontier, is one to which both parties have long ago become committed; and it was in pursuance of this policy that the railway charters referred to were disallowed by the Dominion Government.

This policy was pursued when the building and working of the Canada Pacific Railway by the Government was in contemplation; and it was well understood, both in and out of Parliament, by both parties to the contract, that it would be continued in after the Canada Pacific Railway Company had taken the great work off the hands of the Government.

To repudiate it now would, therefore, be in the nature of a breach of contract; and to permit the passage of the Manitoba Railway Charters would be to repudiate it.

The Monetary Times, an impartial political critic, makes these sensible remarks:—"It requires but little reflection to convince any candid-minded person that no other course was open to the Government. The contract with the Pacific Railway Company cannot be violated by one of the parties to it; and if the Government were disposed to be false to its engagement, the courts would certainly enforce the contract. It is unfortunate that the Pacific Railway Company should have acquired a monopoly for a long term of years; but the restriction is part of the price we pay for the railway. It is mere child's play on the part of the Legislature of Manitoba to continue to assume the assertion of authority, in respect to these charters, which it does not possess. We must all submit to constitutional restraints; and any attempt of a Province to usurp rights which do not belong to it, must necessarily be put down in the interests of constitutional government."

—Professor Foster, of Queen's University holds very correct views on matters educational. Believing the end of University training to be the cultivation of the mind, he is a foe to cram; and he says—"It is better to have a few correct ideas so thoroughly mastered that we can apply them in after life, than a mass of hazy, unscientific notions which we cannot even clearly express, not to say apply to practice." In short, education should train men to

walk manfully through life by having made us sure first of the stability of the ground on which we are to tread."

Legislative Council Elections.

THE elections were quiet throughout the Island. Reports state that Mr. Bolger is defeated in the First District of King's County, and Mr. Reid in the First District of Prince; and that Dr. Fraser and Joseph Murphy have secured the respective seats.

In the Second District of King's County, it is pretty certain that Mr. Clow is victorious over Mr. McDonald, though his majority will be small; and in the Second District of Prince Mr. McNutt has defeated Mr. D. H. McDonald, who came too late into the field.

The result in the first district of Queen's County is still in doubt; while the election of Mr. Nicholson and the defeat of Mr. Munn is admitted on all hands.

It is too soon yet to see precisely what the results indicate.

Concerning Charlottetown, a correspondent of the Boston Transcript writes:—

"One does not find so much provincialism here as in some other provinces of the Dominion, nor so much activity. There is not that bustling, business-like air that is noticeable in Halifax or the Canadas. There seems to be a dead, spiritless atmosphere hovering over the Island. Every one seems to be waiting for someone else to do something. But still, underlying all this, there can be detected a little current flowing quietly along, watering the seeds of the spirit of competition, which are being sown, and must in time yield a plentiful harvest. In most cases, I know, the spirit of rivalry should be deprecated; but standing on the deck of a schooner that commands a view of almost the entire stretch of the isle, and casting the eyes along the coast, with its numerous bays and inlets, many of which afford good harborage, and then lifting them, to see fertile hills, broad fields and dense woodlands, one cannot help exclaiming, 'What a pity there is no more life here! What a Paradise this might be made, with a few energetic men and women to vie with each other in making this what it should be!'"

"There is a healthful moral element at work there; the streets are quiet and orderly, and entirely free from that heart-sickening practice of evening parades upon public thoroughfares that prevails to such an extent in most cities and towns; perhaps this may be attributed, in a measure, to the fact that the prohibition flag waves over the Island. They have their religious and Bible organizations, their benevolent societies of all kinds, their temperance societies, and, in fact, they have everything to make them a prosperous people but enterprise."

THE coal shed at the head of Ferry Wharf is in jeopardy. Those who had charge of it, all appearance, did not study its inability to bear an uneven burden, consequently a heavy load was allowed to remain in the building at the outer end of the wharf, while the inner end was comparatively empty. The result was, the butt, last night, sank at the outer end a distance of ten or twelve feet; it separated from the wharf and now the shed lies canting towards the channel at an angle of forty-five degrees. If the weather turns stormy it may at any time turn into the channel or into the dock in way of the ferry boats and thus prove a great loss of coal to the contractor and an inconvenience to passengers.

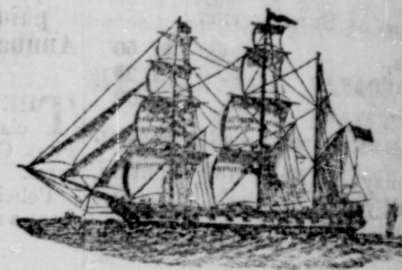
