STOLE FROM A CHURCH.—On Sunday evening last, while Rev. Mr. Hamlyn was preaching, some person entered the vestry of St. Paul's Church through the back door and stole therefrom a new overcoat belonging to Mr. Sidney Grey, and a pair of astrachan gaiters belonging to Miss Hill, the church organist. The thief, with commendable consideration, left an old overcoat in place of the one he had stolen. This overcoat has not yet been identified. The police are working up the case.

A GREAT SUCCESS.—The reception and ball on Friday night for the benefit of the unemployed of Boston, under the auspices of the Ninth Regiment of the Massachusetts Volunteer Militia, will go into history as one of the greatest military gatherings in that city for many a year. More than seven thousand people attended, and about \$5,000 will be given by the management for the relief of the thousands who are without work. Every public and private military regiment in the State sent representatives, and a large delegation were present from Rhode Island, New York and Connecticut. The grand march included more than one thousand couples, headed by Governor Greenhalge and staff.

HIS LAY BAKERY.—Mr. John O'Neill, printer, who lives on Euston Street, near Clements' Corner, is undergoing treatment for a broken leg at the P. E. Island Hospital. It appears that Mr. O'Neill committed his residence yesterday, and not noticing that the cellar-hatch in the kitchen was open fell into the cellar, causing the injury above stated. The break is in the upper part of the leg, near the thigh, and it will be two months before Mr. O'Neill will be able to resume work again. The hatchway was in the floor of the kitchen, near the door, and the effects of the glistering snow being in O'Neill's eyes after coming in he did not notice that it was open until he walked into it. His sister was in the cellar. Dr. Warburton was called in and removed O'Neill to the Hospital.

BOSTON AND THE PROVINCES.—The North Sydney, C. B. Herald says: An important meeting in the transportation interests of the Maritime Provinces, says the Boston Herald, was held in that city Monday afternoon, representatives of Austin Corbin, the Plant System, and Mr. E. F. Clements, of Yarmouth, who appeared for Provincial capitalists. It is understood that the meeting decided upon a consolidation of steamship and railroad interests which, if carried out, will be of great importance to Boston and the Provinces, and none of the gentlemen were prepared to outline the scheme at present. It is understood, however, that the communication between Boston, Nova Scotia, Cape Breton and Prince Edward Island will be perfected, and among other attractions will be added that of a game park, to be one of the best stocked and best looked after on the continent.

**NEWS NOTES.**

Edward Blake addressed a large and representative gathering at Ottawa on the night of Jan. 25th, his subject being "Home Rule for Ireland." Hon. John Costigan presided.

A Washington despatch of the 25th says: The House today adopted an amendment to the tariff bill, specifically repealing the reciprocity clause of the McKinley law, as it applies to agricultural implements and oil specialties.

When a receiver took possession of the Chicago Guaranty Investment Company's affairs, he found the liabilities to be \$55,000,000 and the assets \$449. The report says that the manager has been held for want. A man who could build up so many millions in liabilities upon a basis of \$449 should not be regarded as a vulgar, fraudulent person, but as a Napoleon in the art of wholesale robbery. Chicago leads the World in all things.

The following cable appears in the Empire, dated London, Jan. 25: The Canadian Australian line of steamships is attracting more and more attention here. The intervention of Sir Charles Tupper and agents-general with the Marquis of Ripon, Secretary of State for the Colonies, has been the subject of interesting conversation, and I have it on the best authority that the Imperial Government will grant an interim subsidy for the Fall session once. The question of a permanent subsidy of £25,000 will, it is said, be considered at the next cabinet meeting. I have it from undoubted source that the Marquis of Ripon personally favors the granting of the subsidy.

The Canadian Military Gazette says: "It is very comforting for us to go down to Halifax and look at the big guns on the Blake and her smart consort, but will Great Britain with her colonies scattered all over the world, and the necessity of protecting the shores of her own "right little island," be able in the event of a great war to spare sufficient naval force to protect the unassisted Canadian seaboard? It has lately been pretty clearly shown that the naval strength of the countries most likely to combine against Great Britain is superior to that of the mistress of the seas, so that Canada can appreciate the folly of depending wholly on the navy for the defence of the Dominion in the event of a European war."

An Iowa man was arrested the other day on a charge of brutal assault upon a little girl. As is usual in such cases in the West, the girl's friends organized an attack upon the man with a view to lynching the criminal, but the attack was repulsed. Thereupon a mob harangued the crowd, arguing that if the accused had been a black instead of a white man he would have been lynched long before. The mob then proceeded to the jail, and the man was arrested himself. The Montreal Gazette remarks that he will probably have learnt by this time what is the meaning of equality before the law of the United States. The fact is that negroes are often lynched in the States, not because of the moral sense of the community has been outraged, but simply to satisfy the racial hatred of an ignorant mob.
