The weekly Magistrate's Court was held in Georgetown yesterday afternoon before King's County Specially Magistrate Joseph W. MacDonald.

The plea was guilty and the defendant was fined twenty-five dollars and nine dollars costs, or thirty days in the King's County Jail.

OLD HABIT, NEW WRAPPER

This is a reproduction of an interesting editorial which appeared recently. It pokes a few holes, with good-natured intent, in the current proneness of dentists to apply blanket indictment on sugar as the cause of dental decay.

THE GLOBE AND MAIL, SATURDAY, MAY 20, 1950. Dentists of this continent are now out on an anti-sweets campaign. Their purpose was made plain by speakers at the Canadian and Ontario Dental Association meeting here. These gentlemen spoke of "caries-inducing" foods and "inhibitors of acid reaction," and unanimously named high carbohydrate diet for the poor state of North American teeth.

Divested of its scientific language, this mainly means a boycott of the cookie jar, the candy bar, the soft drink and other products of the sugar bowl around which, it would appear, the bacilli of cavities fairly swarm. But, by dentists and doctors own argument, a single food pattern cannot be laid down for all.

Some children lack proper sugar content and have to be fed it in prescribed dosages. Others secure all their sugar they need in inverse ratio to these conditions.
