

Aces Dump Montague 8-4

Vance Harris Scores Five To Pace Summerside Attack

The Summerside Aces went up one in their best-of-seven semi-final series with the Montague Primroses, beating Bub Dowling's boys at Civic Stadium last night before over 1200 fans by the score of 8-4. Vance Harris was the star of the contest, scoring five goals and getting the unanimous nod of the judges for the Holman "most valuable player" award.

The first period ended 2-1. Hughes scored at 1:28 stealing the puck from an Ace defenceman at the blueline and picking the far corner with a long shot. Wallie Shepherd set up Vance Harris beautifully to equalize. Vance shot from left wing beating Dillon cleanly. Vance repeated three minutes later, his backhand drive finding the cords after a relay from Gallant. Montague got the first of two soft goals, Coyle's slow slider tucking inside the right post.

Early in the middle session Vance Harris' slap shot from the blue-line caught Dillon napping, and Wallie Shepherd realized half way through the frame after he, Gallant and Grant Grady had staged a buzz session around Dillon's cage. Harris scored a very pretty goal for his third, taking a pass-out from "Ears" Gallant and waiting for Dillon to make the first move before shovelling it home. Arsenault scored from close in to make it 5-3, and Vance got his fifth marker, breaking away from the pack as Montague was gangling the ace net with Grant Grady sitting out a holding penalty.

Gord Cutcliffe scored at 4:42 of the final stanza going right into the net with the disk. Arsenault got

that one back a minute later, his shot hitting Mann's skate and caroming over goal line for the second soft Montague marker. Dillon was particularly sharp in the final frame as the Aces swarmed around his cage again and again.

Allen whipped Sackville's rink skipped by Doug Goodwin 16-10 in the first round played in the afternoon and came back in the evening to defeat Bert Hunter's Summerside crew 10-6.

MacLeod of Truro won his first match without tossing a rock when the Sydney rink failed to show up. All games scheduled against Sydney will be defaulted. MacLeod's other win came on the ice when he turned back Dr. Chris Gallant's Charlottetown rink 12-7 last night.

The Charlottetown and Sackville rinks finished the day with 1-1 records. Sackville's win came at the expense of the absent Sydney rink and Gallant downed Hunter 10-7 in the opening round.

Alberta Curlers Capture Canadian Championship

KINGSTON, Ont. (CP)—Matt Baldwin's Edmonton rink, which was almost eliminated from the Northern Alberta playoffs this year, is the new Canadian curling champion.

The 30-year-old skip wrapped up the title Friday with victories in the final two draws to finish the round-robin classic with a mark of 10 straight victories, the only unbeaten rink in the championship.

A few minutes after the last rock was thrown the Albertans received the Macdonald's Brier Tankard. Baldwin made sure of the Canadian title in the 10th round with a tight-fitting 7-4 victory over Manitoba.

Baldwin, who won the classic in 1954, brought the west its 23rd title in 28 championships with his 10th-round victory over a Winni-

peg rink skipped by Howard Wood, Jr.
New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island played the last draw as if the title was at stake. The Saint John rink finally won it or extra end 11-10 after holding up the closing ceremonies for more than 30 minutes.

Baldwin took a firm hold of his second title with two victories Thursday. He needed only one Friday.
Baldwin, aided by mates Bill Price, Art Kleinmeyer and vice-skip Gordon Haynes, led 3-2 after six ends as neither rink yielded more than a rock an end.

The playoff came in the seventh when the Albertans counted two on Baldwin's flag rock. He drew in for shot with four stones sitting in the ring and a measure gave him second shot.

Alberta was ahead 6-4 going into the final end. Skip Wood tried a runner with Alberta sitting shot rock and knocked his own out of the house. Alberta counted one and Baldwin didn't have to throw his final rock.

Heavy Slump In Fur Market

The fur market took a heavy slump this season. The sport of General Sale by the Canadian Fur Auction Fur Company at Montreal January 22nd-25th was the most disappointing in years. Local fur buyers took it on the chin but that's a chance they take in the fur buying game. The slump caught more than the local buyers napping and goes to prove what a gamble the fur market can be at times. One lot of 150 choice mink, large, well furred pelts, for which a local buyer paid an average of \$16.00 each sold for \$10.25 each. After commission, shipping costs, etc were deducted the skins netted slightly over \$9.00 dollars. Other lots, good average pelts, sold for \$7.75 each. Other skins that were slightly off colour or damaged fetched from \$1.50 to 50 cents.

The fur market has always been susceptible to unsettled world conditions but the Egyptian Suez crisis was enough to throw any market of the skids. No need to wonder further where our old fashioned winners were one was just around the corner all the time. It has been tough on our wildlife, particularly the Huns, but without its general severity we have had winters much harder on our birds. The absence of severe snow storms, to date at least, has done much toward keeping 13 of us intact. Last week a covey of 11 showed up at Southport. They appeared in good condition and
