## 'Y' Planning Quick Financial Appeal

The annual campaign for maintenance funds for the Charlottetown YMCA will be carried out this week in a two day effort, with upwards of 100 friends of the 'Y' participating. It will be recalled that two years ago a general campaign for the new swimming pool and capital funds was generously supported by the public and a total of \$25,000 in cash and pledges realized. With the cash received at that time and the subsequent redeeming of pledges, a swimming pool was built, the building renovated and furnished and most of the mortgage paid off. As the pledges continue to be redeemed the balance of the mortgage will be liquidated and the 'Y' will be free of debt. The report of the general secretary, John Evans presented at the annual meeting last week indicated that the addition of the swimming pool had resulted in "an amazing increase in participation in activities." Since the pool was put into operation in April there has been a total of 25,000 in attendance and 1,798 individual swimming tests were passed. Of course increased activity called for increased staff and other expenses related to the pool and the expanded program. The maintenance fund objective is \$20,000 which is necessary to take care of the difference between income from memberships and other sources and administration, building maintenance and program expenses. On Thursday morning 88 men handling 400 selected names will meet at the 'Y' for breakfast and complete their calls throughout the day. In the evening 100 men will meet at supper with the Y's Men's Club and begin their calls following the meeting and throughout Friday. The quick but intensive campaign will be under the board of directors, headed by president, Loran MacLellan. The steering committee is composed of Lloyd Grant, Ian Rankin, H.E. Miller, Ralph Rupert and John Evans.

## Pair Arraigned On Charges Of Break Into Railway Club

Two persons charged with break and entry with intent, elected trial by a judge and jury, at their arraignment before Magistrate A. J. Haalam in city police court Saturday. Elmer Daniel O'Brien, counselled by Lester O'Donnell, and Francis Vernon Donnelly, both of Charlottetown, were charged with breaking and entering the Railwaymen's Club, 130 Richmond Street, with intent to commit an indictable offence. Following the election the two accused were remanded without bail until Feb. 24, at the request of Chief of Police C. W. MacArthur, at that time a date will be set for the opening of the preliminary hearings. Convicted on the charge of forging a cheque on the Bank of Nova Scotia in the amount of \$57 and payable to Betty Goodie, a sentence of three months in Queens County jail was meted out to Lorraine Georgie Matthews, Lower Free-town. A one-year suspended sentence was given Harry Matthews Jr., Charlottetown, on the charge of damaging private property. In addition, the accused was ordered to enter into a recognizance in the amount of \$300 and two sureties of \$150 each. Defence counsel was Mr. O'Donnell. Fined \$30 Also represented by Mr. O'Donnell, William Roy Murnaghan, Charlottetown, on the charge of criminal negligence in the operation of a motor vehicle, was fined \$30 and costs or 15 days in jail. ## Interest In Fort Is Due To Society

"I am very much pleased with the decision to proceed this year with development work on the Historic Fort Amherst site, but credit for sparking the action on the park should go to the members of the Prince Edward Island Historical Society", R. Earl Taylor said Saturday. The P.E.I. representative on the Historic Sites and Monuments Board of Canada was commenting on an Ottawa story from this paper's special correspondent that Resources Minister Walter Dinsdale has approved "stepped up work on the site of the 18th century fort at Rocky Point, at the entrance to Charlottetown Harbor." Recalling that the historical society has been actively promoting the Fort Amherst restoration for some years, Mr. Taylor noted that the society held a ceremony in 1958 to observe the capture of the fort from the French in 1758. It was the following year that Lord Rolfe built the fort; previously, there had only been the commandant's home, a few guns their sportsmanship and curling ability. ## Roads Blocked In Kings But Others Said Open

Main and secondary roads were reported blocked in Kings County last night following a weekend snowfall, which dropped up to eight inches in some sections of the province. All main highways were reported open in Queens and Prince counties. Reports from Prince County indicated that very little snow had fallen in the area. There was some drifting but nothing to cause any traffic troubles. The plow dispatcher at Charlottetown stated that all plows had been working since 7 a.m. yesterday morning. Some heavy drifts were encountered but all main roads were open. The radio range at the Charlottetown airport reported that approximately three inches of snow had fallen. Winds early yesterday morning reached 28 m.p.h. with gusts to 41 m.p.h. The snowfall started about noon on Saturday in the Montague area and the snowfall amount was estimated at six to eight inches. Plowmen were out throughout the night on Saturday and Sunday morning clearing the heavy drifts on roads over which the storm crossed. Last evening the winds subsided and the main highways were expected to be open for travel by early morning. Snowfall was also reported heavy in the Souris area where plows were encountering drifts up to four feet.

## Gov't Is Studying Hospital Problem

No consideration has been given by the government as to whether the provincial hospital insurance plan will "continue as a premium plan or a government-supported plan," Premier Walter R. Shaw said Saturday. Recently, several groups have passed resolutions requesting the government to consider abolishing the premium plan and pay the cost of hospital insurance out of the general revenue of the province. Two of these groups are the Young Progressive Conservative Association and the Federation of Agriculture. Premier Shaw said that hospitals have a definite responsibility, as far as finances are concerned, to operate efficiently and economically. "The policies of the commission and the hospitals should be integrated in the best possible manner, in the interests of the health of our people," he said.
