## 2nd Atlantic Workshop Will Start On Monday

Addresses by Ian Campbell, National Co-ordinator Civilian Rehabilitation and R. Noel Meilleur, Assistant Co-ordinator, will get the Second Atlantic Region Workshop underway at Dalvey House Monday morning. The four-day session will run September 8-12. Chief topic on the agenda will be the fitting of the handicapped into useful jobs in the workday world. Registration opens Sunday afternoon with the official opening of the workshop on the rehabilitation of the handicapped to take place Monday at 9.30 a.m. Expectations are that there will be a large attendance from the Atlantic Provinces with 62 persons having already signified their intentions of attending. Other speakers during the sessions will be L.T. Hancock, principal of the Maritime School of Social Work; Dr. Dugald S. Ar-buckle, a professor of Boston University's School of Education, Douglas Cochrane, Deputy Minister, New Brunswick department of labor, and Dr. G.C. Fisher, member of the P.E.I. rehabilitation.

### NFB Films Ch'town Scenes For Dominion Day Feature

Scenes of Old Charlottetown where the signing of Confederation took place, are being filmed by the National Film Board for use on Dominion Day of 1959. Numerous City landmarks and relics of Confederation are being shot by NFB photographer Chris Lundof. They will eventually be used to portray a picture story that will get wide distribution throughout Canada and a number of foreign countries next July 1. The distribution to newspapers will be done through the Department of External Affairs. Scenes being caught on film include a bust of Sir John A. Macdonald; the ballroom of Government House; interior of the Confederation Chamber; descendants of the Fathers of Confederation; carvings at St. Peter's Anglican Cathedral; paintings of Robert Harris. Others are old King St. dwellings; a bust of Owen Connolly and a comparison of the old and new — a hitching post beside a modern parking meter at the corner of Queen and Grafton.

### Year Record Set Moving Island's Potatoes To Market

Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island and Canadian National Railways have teamed to establish a crop year record in moving the Island's famed potatoes to markets; it was learned Friday. B. Graham Rogers, Director of Transportation for P. E. I. says CNR personnel on both ferry and rail services performed "herculean tasks and are deserving of the highest commendation". In a letter to CNR President Donald Gordon, Mr. Rogers said the crop year record was posted July 31. By that time—end of the crop year which began Aug. 1 1957 the Island's principal product has been transported in 11,025 railway cars, most of them refrigerated.

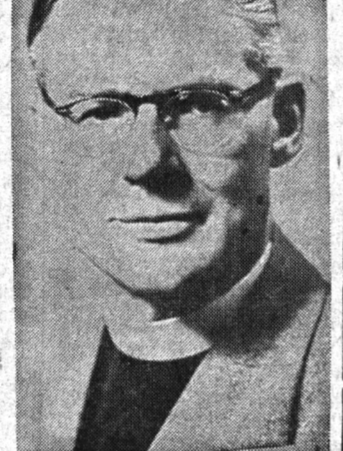

## Member Of S. Rustico Family Gets 30-Day Jail Sentence

One of a family of three appearing on charges arising out of an incident in South Rustico last month was sentenced to 30 days in the Queens County Jail. The man was sentenced when he was convicted of assaulting a police officer in the execution of his duties. Another charge, that of being intoxicated in a public place, was dismissed. The man's father, also appearing on two charges, had one dismissed and was convicted on the other. He was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days for being intoxicated in a public place. A charge of obstructing a police officer was dismissed. The youngest member of the family, charged with resisting the arrest of a police officer, was dismissed. A Bedford resident, charged with causing a disturbance in a public place by fighting was tried and convicted and fined \$25 and costs or 30 days. A Wheatley River man, charged with causing a disturbance in a public place by shouting and swearing, pleaded guilty to the charge. He was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days. Two men appeared on charges of having the care and control of a motor vehicle while intoxicated. One, a resident of Milton, had his case remanded without plea one week while the other, a resident of Mt. Stewart had his case adjourned to Friday, Sept. 12. A Summerside youth was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days when he pleaded guilty to illegal possession of liquor. A similar fine was meted out to a Millview youth when he pleaded guilty to being intoxicated in a public place. The remainder of the docket
