Lodge And Scranton Score In Primaries In Home States

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two non-candidates for the Republican presidential nomination scored decisive victories, including in home state primary elections in Massachusetts and Pennsylvania Tuesday.

Henry Cabot Lodge, a former senator from Massachusetts, was a 7-to-1 leader in written votes over his nearest Republican competitor in Massachusetts.

Governor William W. Scranton, a former Massachusetts legislator, won about 60 per cent of the Republican vote in Pennsylvania, a record in any state.

The major eyebrow-raiser was Lodge's strong showing in Massachusetts, where he won about 20 per cent of the write-in vote. By contrast, Scranton got only 10 per cent.

French Speaker Sees Separate Quebec Possible

PARIS (CP) — Raymond Aron, one of France's most respected commentators, says it is obvious that French Canada has enough people and a large enough territory to form an independent state.

In a front-page article in Le Pictorial, Aron also says it seems probable that English-speaking Canadians would not long oppose by force an independence sought by an active minority with the moral support of most ordinary French-Canadians.

Aron, a professor at the Sorbonne, says English Canadians have not given their French fellow citizens what people find difficult to do without — the feeling of being recognized. In addition, the French seem to their countrymen as survivors of a kind of folklore, worthy of a respect tinged with irony rather than a dialogue between equals.

"It is this dialogue that French-Canadians today demand, without all of them being agreed on the style or the methods."
