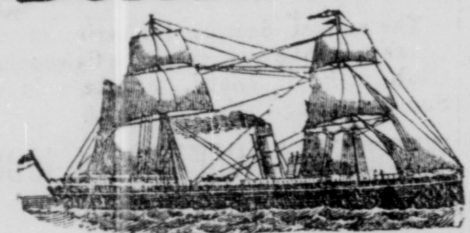

### SIR CHARLES TO VISIT CHARLOTTETOWN.

We have been informed that a telegram has been received by Hon. Senator Ferguson from Sir Charles Tupper stating that Sir Charles will visit Charlottetown on September 4th and that he will likely be accompanied by Mr. G. E. Foster.

### THE CAMPAIGN IN THIS PROVINCE.

With the conventions of the present week the people's campaign against the government will begin in this province. In this campaign continued stress will be laid upon the fact that, instead of lowering public expenditures by two to four millions of dollars, as Sir Wilfrid and his colleagues solemnly promised, the expenditures of the government have been increased to the extent of about fifteen millions, and are continually increasing. This fact will be submitted to the people who pay the taxes, and they will be asked to say whether or not the government guilty of this scandalous breach of faith, necessarily involving heavier public burdens, is worthy of continued trust and confidence.

The question of mutual preference for Canadian and British products in the British and Canadian markets—the preference in which, before the last general election—Sir Wilfrid Laurier saw "immense possibilities"—will be submitted by the Conservatives on the basis lately laid down by the Associated Chambers of Commerce; and the people of Prince Edward Island, as of all Canada, will be asked to say whether or not they are in favor of such a preference, and whether or not Sir Wilfrid Laurier did right when he told the people of Great Britain that Canada did not want such a preference—that the preference given British goods in Canadian markets was a free gift.

The question of the branch railways to New London, Elmira and other points in this Province, to which the Conservatives stand committed and which Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his colleagues have failed to supply—this question will again be submitted to the people of Prince Edward Island; and other improvements will be demanded—including, we hope, cheaper telegraphic rates and—if not too expensive—perhaps an extension of the night service, which the present Government has failed to procure.

These are in our opinion the main points upon which the campaign will be carried on in this Province. Of course there is in addition the general conduct of the Government—the corrupt, extravagant, unjustifiable acts to be criticised.

With five good men and true in the field and an united enthusiastic effort on the part of the electors, we believe that the Opposition will win in every riding of Prince Edward Island. Personal likes and dislikes or differences of opinion in respect to minor matters ought not to weigh for an instant against the necessity of getting rid of the extravagant and corrupt men who now control the administration at Ottawa, or against the good of the country at large and this Province in particular which is involved in the success of the Opposition. The campaign now beginning is one of the most important ever conducted in this Province.

### SIXTEEN TO ONE.

In view of the re-affirming of the 16 to 1 hereby by the Democratic party in the United States an explanation of the meaning of the term, may be of interest. A gold dollar, as is known, weighs 25.8 grains, of which 23.22 grains are pure gold, the remainder being alloy. A silver dollar weighs 412.5 grains, of which 9.10, or 371.25 grains are pure silver, the remainder being alloy. Thus the pure silver in a silver dollar weighs about sixteen times as much as the pure gold in a gold dollar, and this is the meaning of "16 to 1." The proposal to adopt the free coinage of silver at a ratio of 16 to 1 is a proposal that any owner of silver bullion shall be authorized by law to take it to a United States mint and have coined and returned to him one dollar for each 371.25 grains of silver, this dollar being the legal tender for payment of all debts, public or private. The silver in such a dollar (and the dollar itself under free coinage) would be worth, at the present price of silver, not far from fifty cents in gold.

### ANOTHER POLITICAL STRAW.

The Grits supporting Sifton and Greenway are making a bold attempt to suppress Mr. Richardson, M. P. for Lisgar, and to read him out of the party. But the attempt does not seem to be attended with any great measure of success, as Mr. Richardson's old-time Liberal friends apparently have the fullest confidence in him. Here is a despatch descriptive of the reception recently given Mr. Richardson in the town of Cartwright:—

"One of the best political receptions ever accorded any man at a Manitoba country town was given to R. L. Richardson, member for Lisgar, in this Southern Manitoba town on Saturday afternoon. Mr. Richardson had been invited down to meet the farmers. He was escorted to the hall by a brass band; and a resolution endorsing him was carried unanimously by the crowded meeting. Some significant speeches were made by a number of staunch old Liberals. The meeting is especially significant, as it was in Greenway's constituency, and speeches of his old-time political friends and allies show that they have utterly discarded and repudiated him on account of his political crookedness."

Mr. Richardson's conduct, which was condemned by the machine Grits, is apparently approved by the better class among the Liberals.

### THAT FENCE AGAIN.

Mr. JOHN GILLIS explains that he has rented the field owned by Premier Farquharson and that he is responsible for fencing it with the boards from the old Prince of Wales College, which he bought at sale. Of course Mr. Gillis may, as he says, do what he likes with his own and we are glad that his statement exonerates Premier Farquharson completely from all connection with the case. But if the saying that walls have ears has any truth these old college walls must have heard spoken many a panegyric even by the Premier, among others, in their honor in days past. If they could in their present lowly position utter any protest we could well believe they would exclaim as with one voice: "All were not friends that spoke us fair."
