Proposed Latin America Trading Area Seen Vital

WATERLOO, Ont. (CP)—Least eight per cent annually on the average, rather than across the board the present tendency, Mr. Pollock committed himself to move faster than the minimum requirements

Mr. Pollock, who is chief of the Washington office of the United Nations economic commission for Latin America, described the development as a "challenging struggle just beginning to take form," and urged Canadians to consider how they can best respond to it.

"Political and social tensions, long evident throughout Latin America, now are reaching very dangerous limits, Mr. Pollock said. "To help in eliminating them is a most urgent objective in which other countries, including Canada, can all participate."

Their traditional exports do not bring in enough money to pay for the imports that they require if they are to develop. Accordingly, they must make themselves many of the things that they now import.

"MUST HAVE SHIFT"

"A shift must take place," Mr. Pollock stated, "away from producing a few traditional natural resources for external markets and towards the manufacture of industrial goods for local and ultimately for world markets."

He advised Canadian exporters to study the Montevideo treaty and the economic characteristics of the present members, with the aim of concentrating on items whose production would not be adversely affected. Those investing in the concerns on the other hand, should look at the Latin American industries that will benefit under the treaty.

In all cases, he added, due precautions should be taken to merge the private and public interests of Canadians with those of the Latin American countries concerned.

Mr. Pollock's comments were contained in a text made available to the press in advance of delivery.

The Montevideo treaty members are Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Ecuador, Mexico, Peru, Paraguay and Uruguay, representing 80 per cent of Latin America's land mass, 73 per cent of its population and 72 per cent of its gross product.

Under the treaty, member countries must eliminate duties or equivalent charges against each other over a period of 12 years, reducing them by at
