### Seven Appear In County Court

A total of seven cases were disposed of in Queen's County magistrate's Court Friday afternoon by Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet. A resident of Charlottetown and one from New Wilshire were each fined \$5 and \$10 or 5 days when they pleaded guilty to unlawfully driving a motor vehicle on the highway which was not at all times equipped in proper condition and adjustment. A fine of \$20 and costs or 30 days was imposed upon two residents of Charlottetown when they were convicted of having the unlawful possession of liquor in a place other than their respective residences. A resident of Cornwall was fined \$10 and costs or 10 days when they pleaded guilty to driving without due care and attention (speeding). A fine of \$25 and costs or 30 days was imposed upon a Charlottetown resident when he pleaded guilty of failing to file a 1957 T-1 income tax return.

### National Chairman To Speak At Red Cross Annual Meeting

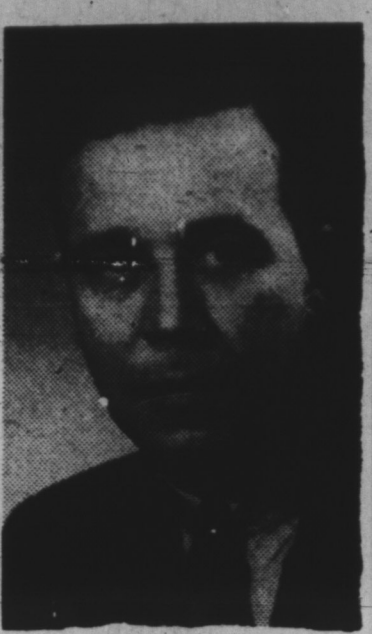
Plans for the annual meeting of the P.E.I. Division of the Canadian Red Cross Society, were formulated yesterday afternoon at a meeting of the provincial executive, held at Red Cross headquarters in Charlottetown and chaired by the president, Walter R. Shaw.

It was announced that the executive committee, Marshal Stearns and the national commissioner Dr. W. Stuart Stabury, both of Toronto, would be attending the annual Provincial Red Cross meetings in Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, the week of February 22nd, with the P.E.I. meetings slated for February 23rd.

It was decided that afternoon and evening sessions would be held with committee reports in the afternoon, and addresses by Mr. Stearns and Dr. Stabury to be given at a dinner meeting at the Charlottetown Hotel in the evening.

The receipt of a bequest of \$1,000 from the estate of the late Mr. and Mrs. Lorae Coles was reported.

### Rev. D. A. Campbell Accepts New Charge At Zion Church

### Action Soon On Springhill Is Expected

OTTAWA (CP)—Revenue Minister Nowlan said Friday he hopes that "some action" will be arrived at soon concerning location of some industries at Springhill, N.S.

He was replying in the Commons to J. W. Pickersgill (L - Bonavista - Twillingate) who asked whether the government has any plans to assist Springhill, crippled by fire and two big mine disasters in the last two years.

Mr. Nowlan, Nova Scotia's representative in the cabinet, said the Nova Scotia government set up a special corporation with capital of \$1,000,000 to assist in attraction of industries to Springhill.

He had been having discussions with officials of different companies as to what the federal government could do to assist in establishment of industries at Springhill.

Mr. Nowlan did not refer to a previous report that a federal penitentiary might be located at Springhill.
