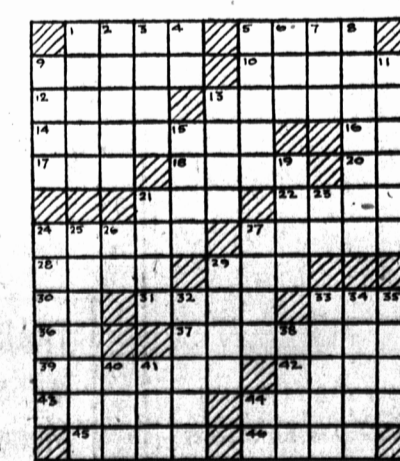

PRODUCER DIES KINGSTON, (CP)—Arthur Sutherland, founder and co-producer of International Players, died here Wednesday. He was in his early 40s. After a drama career dating back to 1922 while he was attending Queen's University, he founded International Players here in 1948 and led it to a North American stock theatre record of over 1,000 consecutive performances. It completed its sixth consecutive year here two weeks ago.
