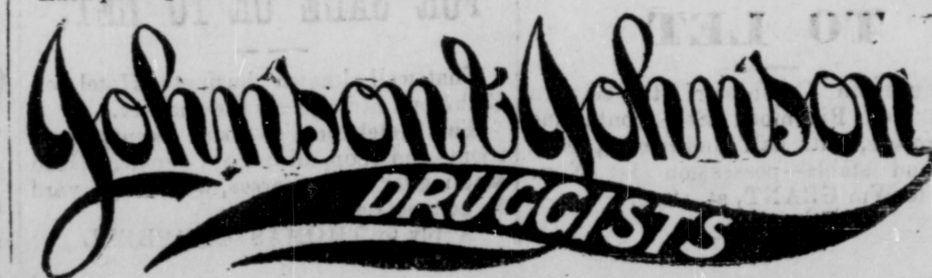

Local and Other Items.

DOBELL LINE.—The Tiber is expected here this afternoon en route to Halifax and St John. She was at Summerside this morning.

DISTRIBUTING ASSETS.—By advertisement in another column we notice that the assets of the old Ch'own Gas Co are now being distributed by the Court of Chancery.

P E I HOSPITAL.—A meeting of all ladies interested in the P E I Hospital will be held in the parlor of the Y M C A tomorrow, Friday, morning at half past eleven o'clock. A large attendance is urgently requested.

AFTER DAMAGES.—Mr Angus McDonald is suing the city for £150 damages for the breaking by John Ring of one of the large panes of glass in the window of his place of business in Queen Street. The case is on trial in the County Court.

BREACH OF PROMISE.—Mr Milner, of Chatham, Ont., a widower, aged 70, is in trouble through the proclivity of his affections. Mrs S A Patterson, a widow of the same place, says that he pursued her for two years and promised to marry her. Now she sues him for breach of promise.

POLICE COURT.—This forenoon, Edgar L Strang was fined \$5 or 30 days for riding a bicycle on the sidewalk. Mr Ernest Dawson, with whom he collided, gave evidence. The defendant, while admitting riding on the sidewalk said the collision was accidental.

FOOTBALL.—The Dalhousie team arrived from Halifax last evening and are quartered at the Hotel Davies. They play the Abegweits on the C. A. A. C grounds this afternoon.

McGill team defeated the Montreal team on Saturday, the score being 8 to 5. Gordon Alley was captain of the McGill team.

THE LAKE WINNIPEG.—The Lake Winnipeg arrived here at eleven o'clock this morning. She has a large cargo of general merchandise. Her cargo from this port will include 1000 sheep and 100 head of cattle on deck, and butter, cheese and other products under deck.

A TOWN UNDERMINED.—According to an exchange there is likely to be a serious depression in Wellington, Vancouver Island, B. C., in the immediate future. The town is undermined by the operations of a mining company. A few weeks ago the ground gave way beneath a house, and dropped down a coal shaft. Now a general subsidence has begun, and the bottom has already fallen out of land values.

DETERMINED TO DIE.—Miss Alice Malone, thirty-five years old, while temporarily insane, built a fire in a field near Red Bank, N. J., last Thursday, and then walked into it, burning herself so badly that she will die. Miss Malone tried to end her life a few days ago in New York by drowning. Her only brother, living near Red Bank, was notified and he brought her to his home on Wednesday. She stole a march on her brother on Thursday morning and when discovered by a farm hand she was all ablaze. The unfortunate woman was removed to the hospital.

COMMITTED TO THE EARTH.—The funeral of the late John Hagan took place this morning, and a large number of friends followed the remains to their resting place in the Roman Catholic Cemetery. The pall bearers were James Curran, Wallace Thorn, James McCourt, J Simmons, Wm Murray and Patrick McQuillan. Mr Hagan was a member of the firm of Hagan Brothers, tanners and curriers, and was well and favorably known to business men and others. His death, after a few days illness, is sincerely mourned.

PRODUCE SHIPMENTS.—Carvell Bros are loading the schrs Elbow and C A Chisholm at Charlottetown for provincial ports. Their cargoes will be made up of potatoes and oats. The same firm are also loading the schrs Amorette and Hydra, the former at Hickey's and the latter at Brush wharf. The Amorette is taking in oats and the Hydra oats and potatoes. They are for provincial ports.

The steamer Horton left Montreal for Sharpness, Eng, on Tuesday morning with a full cargo of oats purchased by Matheson and Toombs.

Mr Walter Matheson has recently made some large shipments of oysters to Montreal, and is now loading several small schooners with oats and potatoes for the Nova Scotia markets.

The schr Sante Marie is expected here next week to be loaded by H C Outerbridge for Bermuda. Her cargo will include oats, potatoes, horses, cattle, sheep and poultry.
