A coroner's jury last night decided that Glen Robert, seven-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Russell Compton, Belle River, came to his death as a result of injuries received on October 1 when he was struck with a truck on the Belle River bridge.

In a rider added to the verdict the seven-man jury noted that evidence submitted indicated that no blame should be attached to the driver of the vehicle involved, Angus Bruce Singleton, 21-year-old native of Ocean View.

Coroner Dr. H. P. Stewart presided, and was assisted by Crown Prosecutor John P. Nicholson in his examination of the eight witnesses called.
