

Women Of Budapest Keep Flame Of Defiance Alive

The women of Budapest took a turn in keeping alive the flame of patriotic defiance. Twice this week in the Hungarian capital, they turned out in thousands, defying Russian tanks, to march to the city's chief squares to place flowers at national monuments.

At another point, the Russian-directed Budapest police used rifle butts to disperse the women.

The female demonstrations, Tuesday and Wednesday, were followed by street clashes Thursday in which at least two nationalists were killed—Russian tanks and armored cars were at all main street junctions as the tense atmosphere continued.

The Hungarian puppet government announced the United Nations secretary general, Dag Hammarskjöld, would not be welcome on Dec. 16, the date he had set for an inspection of conditions in the Hungarian capital.

EMIGRATION EN MASSE—A new style of emigration—the

movement to Canada of complete sectors of Hungarian life—appeared in the making. In Vienna, Canada's Immigration Minister Pickersgill said the entire faculty and student body of the University of Sopron's school of forestry is ready to move to British Columbia. With dependents, the group numbers close to 500.

A move was also afoot to bring to Canada the entire Budapest Opera Company, but this plan appeared much less firm than that of the foresters. The opera company—singers, musicians, stagehands, designers—escaped from Hungary in a group and now is in an Austrian refugee camp.

A large segment of the Hungarian Olympic team in Melbourne was reported seeking refuge in Australia or North America.

BRITISH CRISIS

At the normal traffic rush hour one day this week, Piccadilly Circus in the heart of London was almost deserted. The absence of traffic was one side of the economic aftermath of Suez. Gasoline was scarce—and expensive. The government imposed a new tax on it, and the refiners increased their price, too, to take care of increased cost due to blockage of the canal.

The fuel shortage cost about 1,500 British workers their jobs and put another 40,000 on short time. The government appealed to Canada and the U.S. to forgo interest payments due on post-war loans.

EDEN'S RETURN

Prime Minister Eden will return to London next Thursday after his three-week rest cure in Jamaica. Although the government won a

vote of confidence in the House of Commons on Thursday, special continued that Sir Anthony will not long be the tenant at 10 Downing Street. "Psychologically, he has already ceased to be prime minister," was one comment, in The Daily Express.

For four days this week the Commons held a sort of inquest into the Egyptian expedition. The revolt of the Tory backbenchers failed to materialize, except for 15 abstentions in the confidence vote.

The debate was notable for the speech of left-winger Aneurin Bevan—even a senior cabinet minister called it "statesmanlike"—as the chief Opposition spokesman on foreign affairs. Bevan likely would be foreign secretary in any new Labor government.

MANITOBA NICKEL

Manitoba, which hasn't had much luck in oil, hit it rich in nickel. The International Nickel Company announced it will spend \$175,000,000 to develop two nickel mines in northern Manitoba, together with smelter, refinery, power plant, railroad facilities and a new town.

The development will make Manitoba the world's second largest nickel producer, after the Sudbury area in Ontario.

WEATHER NEWS

Western Canada had its coldest weather of the season. In central Alberta it was 47 degrees below zero. Albertans could enjoy a chilly laugh at a news dispatch from Massena, N.Y., which told how 175 workers on the St. Lawrence seaway walked off the job because of the "extreme cold." The temperature: 15 above.

Mail Changes For Bear River And Armadale

Effective December 16th the present direct delivery of mails to Bear River and Armadale post offices will be discontinued. This service will resume May 15th, 1957.

During the winter months mails destined for these points will be taken to Souris East. From there it will be dispatched by train to the railway station serving these districts. A side service will be established to transfer this mail to the respective post offices. Outgoing mails will follow the same route as above in reverse order.

This information was released December 4th by the District Director of Postal Service, Saint John, N.B.

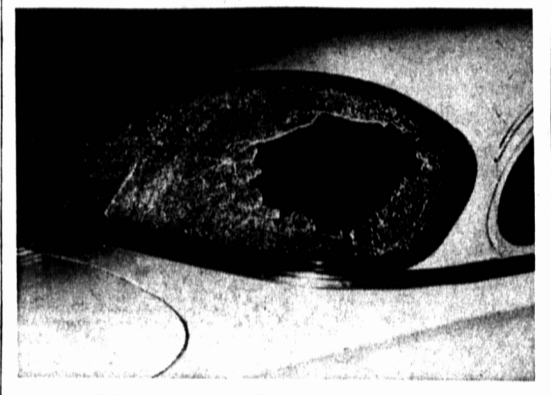
