Martin Reports No Change in Canada's China Policy

External Affairs Minister Paul Martin said there is "no change" in Canada's policy towards Communist China.

The Canadian minister, here for talks with Foreign Minister Gerard Schroeder and Defence Minister Kai-Inge von Hassel, denied that Canada would support the admission of Communist China to the United Nations.

He told a press conference there is "no basis" for press reports that he said something similar to this at the NATO ministerial council meeting Thursday at the Hague, Netherlands.

"There is no change in Canada's policy towards Communist China," he said.

"If and when there is such a change—and this does not mean that there will be—we will take consideration of four friends in NATO and other parts of the world."

Canada does not now recognize the Communist Chinese regime although the country has sold wheat to the Peking regime in the last few years.

Answering a question at the conference, Martin said Canada has received no request from the United States for military assistance to South Viet Nam.

PROVIDING SOME AID

"Canada is now providing some aid for South Viet Nam. No request for any other kind of assistance has been made of us," he said.

Martin said The Hague conference of NATO ministers evoked "unanimous conviction in the need for NATO and of the importance of having that body as united as possible."

The external affairs minister said Canada would like to see the military review of the alliance, suggested at last year's Ottawa conference of the ministers, proceed more quickly than at present.

He said Canada has no intention of reducing her armed forces in West Germany.

Martin and Schroeder will discuss preparations for a visit by West German Chancellor Ludwig Erhard to Canada on June 10 and 11 and also other matters raised at the NATO meeting.

The Canadian minister will visit West Berlin today and leave Bonn Sunday for Canada.

Chev Plans Iron Foundry In Michigan

SAGINAW, Mich. (AP)—Chevrolet division of General Motors Corp. announced Monday it will build a new iron foundry at Saginaw that will employ 2,000 persons and have an annual payroll of about \$13,000,000.

Chevrolet gave an estimate of cost for the plant, which will cover 780,000 square feet. It is to be completed in the spring of 1966.

Simon E. Knudsen, Chevrolet general manager, disclosed plans for the new plant, which he announced this month for Saginaw by his division.

OXYGEN LACK SEEN FOR FISH

OTTAWA (CP)—Has your favorite trout lake been fished out?

What's needed may be a windmill pumping oxygen into the bottom of the lake to keep the fish alive, suggests Senator Arthur Roebuck (L-Ontario).

He told the Senate Monday night many lakes in populated areas are being fished out, not because the fish are outnumbered, but because they lack oxygen.

Waste and garbage dumped into these lakes absorbed an ever-increasing portion of the oxygen supply in the water, he said.

Provincial game officials were spending thousands of dollars producing fingerlings, but these died as soon as they were dumped into a polluted lake.

The 86-year-old lawyer suggested government scientists might look into the feasibility of erecting a "robust windmill" beside each polluted lake to pump a fresh supply of air into the water whenever the wind blows.

This would increase fish stocks dramatically and quadruple the inflow of tourists. Nothing attracted tourists more than the prospect of catching a few lively ones, Senator Roebuck said in a debate on tourism.

SEND PROTEST

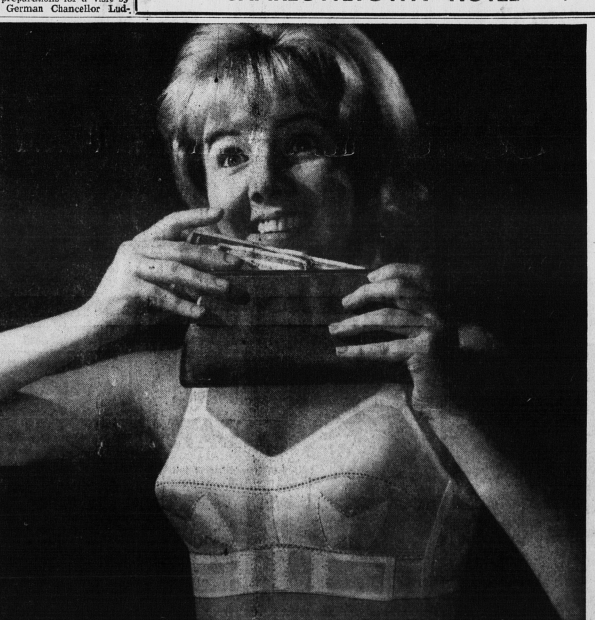
