

Local and Other Items.

ARRIVED.—The schooner Ottawa arrived to-day with a cargo of round coal on Ontario Mines, C. B., for A. McNeill.

TELEPHONE.—Picton telephone subscribers pay only \$20 a year for their telephones. Moncton and Charlottetown subscribers pay \$30.

A FAST STEAMER.—Efforts are being made to get a fast steamer to put on the East River between Picton and New Glasgow next season.

HOOK AND LADDER.—There will be a meeting of the Hook and Ladder Co. in their room on Monday evening next, at 7.30. A full and punctual attendance is requested.

POLICE COURT.—Thomas McCarvill and John Larter appeared before His Honor this morning, charged with being drunk. The charge was proven and the former was fined \$3 or 14 days, and the latter \$2 or 8 days.

THE STALLION RACE.—The race between Black Pilot and Hernando was for \$250—half the gate money to be divided between the horses. It is thought that Messrs. Green Bros. half of the gate receipts will go a long way towards paying the cost of the park.

THE POTATO KING AGAIN.—The Halifax Herald reports that the Merchants' Bank has issued a writ against Jacob Walton, the potato king, for \$14,164.92, including a note of hand for \$4,500 and money lent \$9,664.92. The bank holds ample collateral against this amount.

THE REGATTA.—At the committee meeting held last evening, it was decided to hold the regatta on Thursday, the 27th September next. Mr. E. S. Bonnell, watermaker, has signified his intention of presenting a silver medal. We understand that \$40 will be given as the first prize in the single scull race, and \$15 for the second.

SUPREME COURT.—We understand that Mr. H. B. Smith, who was recently found guilty of a third contravention of the Canada Temperance Act and sentenced to three months imprisonment by the Stipendiary Magistrate, has obtained a rule nisi for certiorari, returnable at the October term of the Supreme Court, from Mr. Justice Peters.

MONEY FOUND.—The \$250 lost between Brighton Shore and Harris' Auction Room, advertised in THE EXAMINER of yesterday, has been found and returned to the owner through Chief of Police Passmore. The money was picked up on Sidney Street, near Stevenson's tinshop, by Mr. Richard Waye, formerly in the employ of Messrs. Beer & Goff.

HYMENEAL.—A quiet wedding took place in Trinity church, St. John, at an early hour on Thursday morning. The contracting parties were Mr. Wm. Jaffery, son of Rev. Mr. Jaffery, rector of St. Mary's, York Co., and Miss Helen E. Wallace, daughter of the late Thomas Wallace, of St. John. There were no groomsmen or bridesmaids. The happy couple intend spending a portion of their honeymoon on the Island.

LIGHT WANTED.—A Souris correspondent writes: "I would wish to enquire how it happens that the street lights are lit at Matthew, McLean & Co's, McEachern & Co's, Cox & Co's, and those at Dumphy's (saddler), Doyle & Co's, Dr. Mutar's, and other quarters are neglected? Is it owing to the scarcity of the artificial luminiferous or neglect of the lamp lighter? Could not a little kerosene be smuggled now, even not of the proof test, as some of the public officials are dispensed with?"

THE SHAD FISHERIES.—The shad fisheries in the Basin of Minas, which have been growing less and less profitable for several years, had this season proved an almost total failure. Most of the boats in the business have abandoned the work, as the sketches have been so small. For the last three weeks no boat has caught more than fifteen fish at a "drift," but very often, as did the fishermen of old, they "toil all night and catch nothing."

Nothing short of a customs union would satisfy the United States.

THE DISCIPLES OF CHRIST.—The annual meeting of the Disciples of Christ, of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, commenced yesterday at Lord's Cove, Deer Island, N. B. Elder O. B. Emery, pastor of the Christian Church in Montague, passed through this city on his way there a few days ago. From the St. John Star of yesterday we learn that a number of delegates from Nova Scotia were on their way to the meeting. It was also announced that Prof. W. K. Barr, Ph. D., would be in attendance, but he was unavoidably detained to continue his work here on the Island. Since he came to this city three months ago he has not allowed a week to pass without adding a number to the church.

FORGOT HER \$1,000 BUSTLE.—A Kansas City despatch says:—S. M. Ballingsley, a wealthy business man of Bronaugh, Mo., and his wife have been stopping at the New Albany hotel for several days. They left on Friday for home. On Friday afternoon, Chief Speers and the proprietors of the hotel received telegrams stating that Ballingsley had lost \$1,000 in the hotel. The clerk found in the bed a purse and the money, around which a piece of coffee sack had been sewed tightly. Around this was wrapped a towel, which was also tightly sewed, and the whole was bound up in another towel, loosely stitched together. Mr. Ballingsley arrived in the city a few days later and explained that his wife had done it up in that manner so that she could wear it in a bustle, but forgot it.

Montreal News.

MONTREAL, Aug. 31.

The dyed goods section of the Cotton Manufacturers' Association has resolved to continue the combination as formerly.

The Quebec Government have decided to establish a permanent provincial police force, with head quarters in this city. The force, will, it is understood, act as detectives and will assist the revenue department, and will, besides that, stand at the disposal of the police magistrates.

A. T. Lapine has consented to be the labor candidate for the House of Commons for Montreal East.

At a meeting of the civic police committee to-day, Chief Hughes received instructions to prosecute bucket shops and all persons found there.

Farmers coming to the city state that the excessive rain has damaged their crops so badly that their winter supply will be very short.

Attack by Robbers.

HAMILTON, Aug. 31.

While Charles Young, mail carrier between Cañuk and Hamilton, was driving towards the city to-day he was asked by two well dressed men for a lift. Supposing they were road agents, Young declined their request, at the same time started his horse on a gallop. Finding themselves foiled the highwaymen tried to stop him with bullets but failed, only one striking him, this going through his hat and grazing his scalp.

Results of the Storm.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Aug. 31.
