

Beavers In 4-2 Win Over Sydney In Game Last Night At Amherst

AMHERST, N. S., Dec. 17 (CP)—Saint John Beavers hockey machine worked too smoothly last night for Sydney Millionaires, speeding to a 4-2 win over the defending Maritime Major Hockey League game.

The league leaders gave a polished performance and their aggressiveness on the attack drew roars of appreciation from the fans. Aside from an attacking

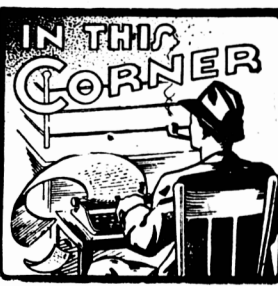

Ty Cobb 65 On Tuesday

TWIN FALLS, Idaho, Dec. 17 (AP)—Tyus Raymond Cobb, one of baseball's grand old men, will celebrate his 65th birthday Tuesday.

Cobb, who has become a millionaire since his active baseball days, is no longer officially associated with the game. But he has kept close to it in recent weeks by giving advice to Twin Falls residents who purchased a franchise in the Class C Pioneer League as a community enterprise.

Through his efforts Twin Falls solved its player shortage.

Representatives of the club, armed with letters and advance spawdwork by Cobb, came back from the baseball meeting in Columbus, Ohio with a full working agreement with San Francisco Seals and partial working agreements with Detroit Tigers, Cleveland Indians and Boston Red Sox.

From his winter home in Atherton, Calif., Cobb has screened several candidates for the Twin Falls management, and it is expected he will be a guiding light behind the new club in its first season.

While not paid the fantastic salaries of modern-day baseball men, Cobb wisely invested money in two struggling young companies, one, the Coca Cola Company of his native state, Georgia, has made him a wealthy man. He is today also one of the largest stockholders in General Motors Corporation.

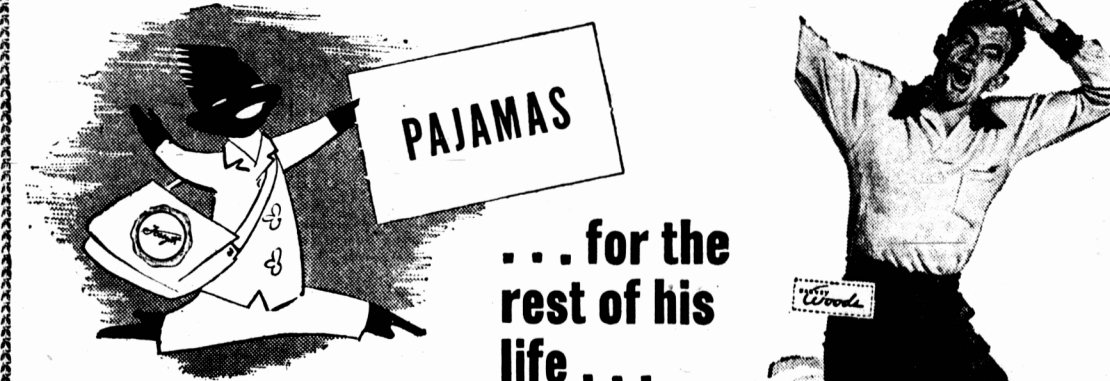
