

Further Snags Foreseen In Arab - Israeli Dispute

UNITED NATIONS N.Y. (CP) Prospects for even the slightest early agreement on either the Arab-Israeli dispute or the disarmament deadline were regarded pessimistically by United Nations delegates today.

Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjöld, working to complete his report for the General Assembly by Friday on the Israeli withdrawal demanded by an assembly vote was expected to hear new and conflicting suggestions on the scope of his authority to use the UN Emergency Force in the dispute areas.

And a ray of hope that Russia might fall in with a proposed new resolution on disarmament was dimmed by reports that the Soviet delegation was holding out for amendments that would strip it of its general approval.

A British suggestion Tuesday that the UN force be posed in definitely between Israel and Egypt until permanent arrangements are made to prevent further hostilities was taken to mean that Britain feels Hammarskjöld

has the authority to order the force into the Gaza strip and the Gouf of Aqaba areas.

RESEMBLES U.S. PLAN

The United States earlier made much the same suggestion as Britain did Tuesday—but has since indicated that it could not be construed as having any bearing on the secretary-general's authority. The interested powers now are awaiting further word from the U.S. on its attitude.

Canada went along with last week's resolution calling for a new Hammarskjöld report, but said some interim solution on posting of the UN force should be reached to avoid returning to the mutually tense situation on the Arab-Israeli border which led to the Israeli's October invasion.

Egypt's contention has been all along that the UN force is only a drawl in the UN force. The Egyptians see that the Israeli withdrawal would be a step toward the use of his authority to get this completed.

Israel has been calling for guarantees from the UN that Egypt will not be allowed to threaten her

position along the Gaza Strip or her shipping in the Gulf of Aqaba.

OFFER COMPROMISE

She was reported to have submitted a plan to Hammarskjöld calling for a compromise UN administration in the strip. This would call for withdrawal of Israeli troops, with all civil and social services being placed under the direction of the UN. Presumably the UN force, under this plan, would be stationed in the strip pending a definite settlement.

The big hope among several delegations, including Canada, was reported to be that debate will be adjourned when the report is presented to the assembly Friday, and that possibly by Monday a new resolution might be agreed upon spelling out definitely the terms under which Hammarskjöld could further delay the force.

On the disarmament question, meanwhile, the big Western powers were reported trying to get Russia to agree on backing a resolution to throw the problem back to the commission and sub-committee which have been dealing with it for almost 10 years.

Canada's L.B. Pearson on Monday told the assembly's political committee that he hoped such a resolution would soon be brought before them. The U.S. was reported willing to back it, and Britain Tuesday threw in her support. But early today the prospects for Russian support - on any terms but her own - were regarded as slim.

Exhibition Ass'n President Reports Active Year For 1956

"Our activities for the year 1956 including our Agricultural Shows and Horse Racing were as good if not better than previous," Dr. J.P. Lantz said Wednesday in his report as president of the Charlottetown Driving Park and Provincial Exhibition Association. He was speaking at the annual meeting on behalf of himself and for H. J. Kennedy, vice-president, George Buntain, secretary and Frank Acorn, race secretary.

"Our Live Stock entries for the Exhibition exceeded the previous year by 200 making a total of 1,786 entries. The attendance was good except for one day; the weather was favourable. Our Exhibition was opened this year by Premier A.W. Matheson who spoke in glowing terms of the outstanding exhibits at our Provincial Exhibition.

"Building program included a new shed for judging of Swine.

"The Women's Institute exhibits were even better than ever. We realize that the accommodation allotted to them was not adequate and we know that to complete their plans for 1957 they will require more space. The Directors are sympathetic, and as this is one of the outstanding Organizations on the Island, will try our best to facilitate their plans.

"The Fat Stock Show and Sale was the most outstanding one since its inception. The average of all animals sold was higher than any sale in the Dominion and the attendance at the sale was 25 per cent above any other year and it looks as though in the future we will have to have larger accommodations for the sale.

"The Harvest Exhibition and Calf Club show sponsored by the Provincial Government was a marked improvement over previous Calf Club shows and reflects credit on the Department of Agriculture.

"Here we would like to pay tribute to the Provincial Minister of Agriculture, Hon. Mr. Cullen, the Deputy Minister, Mr. Wright and the agricultural fieldmen for their splendid cooperation during both the Provincial Exhibition and

throughout the year. To the Dominion Dept. of Agriculture through Mr. Clay, and their fieldmen, we also extend our thanks for without their help it would be very difficult to have a Show.

"The regular Fox and Mink show was held, the exhibits were of high quality. While there was not as much interest in the foxes, the Mink exhibits held their own.

"The Horse Racing program included thirty races, a total purse of \$57,286 was paid out to Race Horse owners this season.

"The track record was broken for pacing when the horse "Newport Chief" made the mile in 2:05. This race had the three fastest heats paced in the Maritimes and also the fastest mile trotted in the Maritimes in 1956 took place at our track: 2:08 4-5.

"For the 1957 Provincial Exhibition we are planning to devote one day to Prince County, one to Queens and one to Kings. On these separate days something special will be arranged for each County. One day will also be devoted to the 4-H and Junior Farmers Clubs open to a Prince Edward Island when a special program will be arranged," the report concluded.
