China's Brand Of Communism Making Gains In South India

NEW DELHI (AP)—China's brand of violent communism has established a new beachhead in Asia and is advancing under heavy fire.

It opens South India for the Chinese Communists in their campaign to expand China's influence throughout Asia and it presents the United States with another serious challenge.

For the pro-Chinese Communists of South India have demonstrated in Kerala state they can exist, indeed prosper, under staggering blows from Prime Minister Lal Bahadur Shastri's Indian government.

With 132 of their top leaders imprisoned, the pro-Chinese Communists won 40 state assembly seats in the Kerala elections, four more than Shastri's congress party and 37 more than the pro-Moscow Communists who espouse more moderate communism.

Before the election, the pro-Chinese Communists had only nine seats.

29 ELECTED

Testifying to the widespread support they now have, the pro-Chinese elected 29 candidates who never even campaigned. They were jailed two months ago.

The step to Kerala was a big one for Peking.

It carried a creed of violent revolution across the immense Bay of Bengal and out of Southeast Asia, where the U.S. now is fighting desperately to stamp out other beachheads.

It also gave Peking the friendly enclave it always has needed in subversion campaigns against non-Communist governments.

There are no indications the Kerala Communists will be able to go beyond subversion at the moment. They appear unable to form a Communist state government, even in coalition with other leftists.

Also Shastri's regime is quite willing to arrest more Communists if necessary and continue

to run state affairs from New Delhi.

AIMING AT POWER

But there is no doubt the Communists are aiming at eventually gaining power, first in South India, then throughout the country.

The Indian government in a recent white paper said 900 pro-Chinese Communists were arrested in the length and breadth of India because they were plotting a revolution that drew its tactical inspiration from guerrilla methods developed in Cuba and its ideological inspiration from China.

There are widespread reports Peking is financing the Indian Communists with money funnelled through friendly diplomatic missions in New Delhi and Calcutta.

Home minister G. L. Nanda says Peking is trying to foster turmoil in India's rear areas while threatening the northern Himalayan frontier.

Kerala and all South India for years have been economically depressed areas and today it continues to be a primary threat to the stability of the Indian government.

Another in Calcutta and the surrounding west Bengal state far across the sprawling Indian subcontinent where the pro-Chinese Communists are working feverishly.

INDIAN LANGUAGE

You are South, both sides vulnerable. The bidding has been:

West North East South
1 ♠ 1 ♠ 2 ♠ 2 ♠

What would you now bid with each of the following five hands?

1. Two hearts. Partner's double announced the values for an opening bid, and it is therefore quite obvious that our hand, in conjunction with partner's, is practically sure to produce at least a game.

However, the best game contract is certainly in doubt at this point, and we should not arbitrarily respond with a jump shift in spades, diamonds or clubs. While a response of either two spades, three clubs or three diamonds would identify the game-going prospects, it might at the same time result in the wrong suit becoming trump. The best thing to do is to cuebid the opponent's suit and force partner to make the choice of trumps. We have excellent support for any suit North names.

2. Two clubs. It may be tempting to respond one notrump with this type of hand, but most authorities agree that this response to a double shows great strength, usually eight or nine points & two club re-
