LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

The "Patriot's" Falsifying.

Sir.—The Patriot of the 15th inst. gives the following sums as extraordinary revenue under the present Government :-
Assessment from 1879 to 1883. . . \$ 83,193.72
Road Tax from 1879 to 31st Dec., 1885. 164,500.00
Refunds 139,744.41
Special Windfalls from Dec. 31st, 1881 to Dec. 31st, 1885. 67,388.22
\$454,826.35

We claim that it is unjust to include the Road Tax as a part of the Government's annual revenue, inasmuch as the great majority of the people do work on the roads in their immediate neighborhood at an idle period of the year, and, therefore, the Road Tax does not represent, as the Patriot says, \$23,500 of a money tax on the people. We doubt if it represents anything near one third of that amount. More Statute Labor is performed than the Patriot supposes, consequently less money is collected. It is a purely local taxation, just as much so as the District Supplement to teachers, which we expect to see the Patriot next including in his array of figures against the Government. Deducting this amount of \$164,500.00, leaves the extraordinary revenue at \$290,326.35 for seven years, or an average of \$41,475.19.

Now let us compare that amount with Davies' extraordinary revenue in 1877-78: Refunds \$ 41,275.91
Assessment (Inc. arrears and old Land Tax) 85,826.91
\$127,102.82

An average for two years of \$63,551.41, or \$22,076.22 greater than average yearly extraordinary revenue of the present Government.

Then take the average total expenditure under the present Government, \$272,285.38, and add \$23,500, the Patriot's claim for Road Tax, which would bring it up to \$295,785.38, or \$37,097.33 less than the average annual expenditure of the present Government.

The truth is that the Patriot's statements will not bear criticism, and all his attempts to mislead the people regarding the expenditure of the present Government, and his notorious attempts to saddle them with a taxation policy, result in miserable failure, discredit to himself and his party, but redounding to the credit of the present Government.

INVESTIGATOR.

Cardigan.

The noble District of Cardigan is to be congratulated upon having selected such standard bearers as Hugh L. McDonald and Cyrus Shaw, Esqs. Mr. Shaw, it is well known, possesses to a high degree the necessary qualities and brilliant mind which marked the career of his late lamented brother, Robert Shaw, and he is well fitted by nature and culture to take a prominent position among our legislators. He will be a fine representative of the farmers of the Island. Mr. McDonald is one of the most genial and popular men in King's County, if not in all P. E. Island, and we have not the slightest doubt that the electors of his District will, on the 30th, place his name at the head of the poll. Not only would he be a credit to the District, but he would add strength to the party of which he has so long been a faithful member.

Dr. McLaren is, we cheerfully admit, a popular man, and deservedly so, in his own sphere; but the man who makes no enemies in the political arena will never shine as a legislator. During his four years' term in the House of Assembly he has been attentive to his duties, but his vote has always been a silent one. For a man who takes no part in debate would naturally expect him always to vote right, having the time to consider, from his constant habit of quiet listening, the advantages and disadvantages of each and every question before the House, but we find no one voting on all occasions more closely, party and party alone, than Dr. McLaren; and the independent electors of Baldwin's Road, De Gros Marsh, Grand River, Narrows Creek and Cardigan Bridge will, if we mistake not, embrace the opportunity now afforded them of resenting the vote he gave on a certain incorporation bill which came before the House in 1882. They will remember it, and elect men whose moral stamina will not allow them to betray their constituents by voting, simply to please the fag end of the Grit party, against the well-understood wishes of those constituents.

Boston Markets.

Boston, June 19.
POTATOES.—There is an easier feeling for old Potatoes, and only the best Eastern Hebrons command 70c. For Ross, Burbanks and Prolines 65 is a top price. Chenangoes are selling mostly at 45 to 50c. per bushel.

Eggs.—Eastern extras are held at 13c. per dozen, but other kinds are plentiful and sell slowly. It is hard to get over 11c. for Island.

CANNED GOODS.—Lobsters are in fair demand, and have been advanced to \$1.65 to \$1.70 per doz. duty paid. Mackerel are lower and selling at 55 to 60c.

FISH.—Trade has improved a little, but the demand is confined mainly to new Mackerel, which continue scarce and command extreme prices. Some 200 to 300 bbls. from Cape Breton by the Halifax steamer sold readily at \$6.75 per bbl., with bbl. A few small lots from Yarmouth and Barrington sold at \$8.50. A trip of 220 bbls. sold at Gloucester on Monday at \$6.50, with bbl., and came to Boston. Old Mackerel are working off gradually, but it is very difficult to get any advance. Dealers are running their stocks as low as possible, and will not buy until they are cleaned out.

NOVA SCOTIA OLD NO. 3 are hard to sell at \$3.50 to \$4 per bbl., and buyers are not willing to give over \$5 for No. 2. Old Shore No. 2 are selling in small lots at \$5.50 to \$6, with some extra at a higher range. Fresh Mackerel from Nova Scotia go off quickly at \$7 per 100

as they run. Celfish are selling moderately at \$2 and \$2.25 per qt. for new pickled-cured Bank, and \$3 for new dry Bank. Old Cod fish are about all out of market. Hake, Haddock, and Pollock are without movements of importance.

CURRENT NOTES.

Mr. Parnell is about to issue a manifesto to the English people.

Several Brockville lady smugglers have been detected and forced to disgorge.

Mayor McKay, of Hamilton, has telegraphed \$500 to the destitute citizens of Vancouver.

A resident of Barnston, Que., amputated his own toe with a chisel and mallet because it pained him.

The French Senate Committee has rejected by a vote of 6 to 3 all the proposals for the expulsion of the Princes. It is said there are 10,000 families in Chicago without a copy of the Bible. The number of families that have a copy, but never open it, is not given.

Quebec has 692 lawyers. In the Montreal district there are 426 in the Quebec district, 162; St. Francis, 32; Arthabaska, 18; Three Rivers, 32; and Bedford, 22.

Of the 175,000,000 of Moslems that according to Mr. Blunt, constitute the population of Islam, nearly 50,000,000 acknowledge the authority or influence of Britain.

A semi-official communication from Berlin says that Germany's patience in regard to French chauvinism is exhausted, and that France is plainly striving to provoke a feeling hostile to Germany, not merely transient, but likely to lead to grave results.

Mr. Wm. Keenan, of Korah, a place about six miles west of Sault Ste. Marie, is the owner of "one of the greatest wonders of the age," a calf with a head on each end, four eyes, six legs and two tails, all well formed. The freak was born on April 16, but it did not live and the owner had it stuffed.

Alexander Duprey, of East Farnham, Que., seventy years of age, went to the woods alone one morning last week to peel bark, taking his dinner with him. Failing to return at night, a search was instituted, and at three o'clock next morning he was found lying dead near where he had been working.

On the morning of the 18th, while in the office of Col. J. W. Strong, manager of the Morning Herald, St. Joseph, Mo.; and, while the latter's back was turned, shot him dead. Richmond then fired a shot into his own head, but is not thought to be fatally wounded.

A terrible affray has occurred at Bogota, between a guard of prisons and the members of one of the national battalions. One general, several officers and thirty soldiers were killed. The affray is looked upon as the outcome of an old grudge between the guard and soldiers, and is without any political significance whatever.

"Step right into the parlor, sir, and make yourself at home," said the nine-year-old son of the editor to his sister's best young man. "Take the rocking-chair and help yourself to the album. Helen Louise is up stairs and won't be down for some time yet—she has to make up her form, you know, before going to press."

"Susan, stand up and let me see what you've learned. 'What does e-h-a-i-r spell?' 'I don't know, ma'am.' 'Why! What do you sit on?' 'Oh, ma'am, I don't like to tell.' 'What on earth is the matter with the girl? Tell—what is it?' 'I don't like to tell; it was Bill Brass's knee, but he never kissed me but three times.'"

A divorce case is soon to come up in a Maine court, the outgrowth of a trifling quarrel between a man and his wife twenty-five years ago. Since that day, although living together, neither has spoken to the other, until a few weeks ago, when in the excitement of house cleaning the woman said to the man, "Where's the nails?" The man looked at the woman calmly, and did not answer.

In the exchequer court, Ottawa, on the 18th, Judge Henry gave judgment in the matter of Robert E. Sproule, now under sentence of death at Victoria, B. C., for murder, holding that the sentence of death was illegal, and ordering the discharge of the prisoner. Counsel for the crown objected to the discharge, and was given time to consult the officers of the law on this point, when the judge would hear him again.

Ottawa advices say that Mrs. Cook, who for some time past has had charge of the offices of the post office department, dropped dead of heart disease while attending to her duties on Friday. The loss of considerable property through the notorious forger and swindler, A. F. Wood, formerly of the civil service, who left there for the United States, preyed upon her to that extent as to produce the disease to which she fell a victim.

According to the latest general censuses and estimates at hand to the common date of 1881, the number of cities in the world of 200,000 population is at least ninety-six. Of these the United States has ten, the United Kingdom eleven, Germany fourteen, Italy five, France four, Russia four, and the rest of Europe ten. Africa boasts only two, South America two, Australia two, and Mexico one. China is credited by the best authorities with twenty-eight cities of the class described, India seven, Japan four, and Persia one, making a total for Asia of forty and completing the grand total of ninety-six.
