Darby was elected, in Fourth Prince where George MacKay was elected and in Fourth King's where Daniel MacRae was elected. 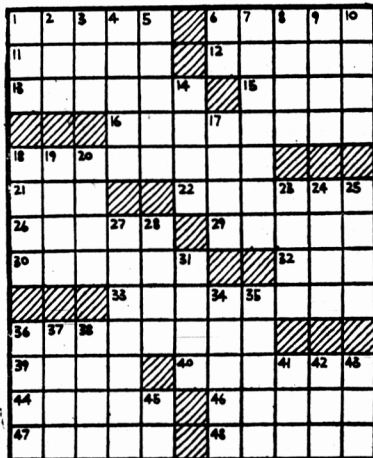
