PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

Officers and Members:

Another year has passed and as President I have the honor to address the members of the Montague Sub-Division of the C. W. L. of Canada at this their fourth annual meeting.

Two years ago you honored me with the position of President, last year you renewed that confidence by entrusting to me for another year the delicate duties which the office entails, and tonight this labor of love is completed. I hope my services have merited your approval. To my successor I give the assurance that her work will be both pleasant and agreeable, and my assistance and co-operation always available. It is pleasant to recall the many cordial relations I encountered during the two years and the cordial contacts made with officers, members and friends of the League. To all who helped me in my work I am deeply indebted.

The year now ending was marked with no particular singular achievement, but reports to be submitted by the Secretary and Convenors of the different committees will reveal that many duties of a miscellaneous character were performed in your name.

Feeling that a one hundred per cent membership should be the objective of a society such as ours, we have directed our efforts in this direction and we are pleased to report a gratifying increase in our membership.

This has been an exceptionally hard year and financially we are not able to make as favourable a report as we would wish. We have, however, paid our obligations re National and Diocesan fees and sent our contributions to Sisters of Service, Budget, Scholarship and Regina Relief Fund. We have had Masses said for deceased friends and on the Feast of our Patroness, Our Lady of Good Counsel, a Mass said for the living members of the League.

The year did not pass without sadness to the Catholic Women's League of Canada. The death of our well beloved King George was a source of deep regret, for he was the best loved King of all ages, as shown by the loving tributes from his subjects at the time of his Jubilee Celebration.

The League too was called upon to bear a distinct loss in the death of His Grace, Archbishop O'Donnell of Halifax, whose interest in all Catholic activities, especially League activities, was always manifest.

Certain members of our own sub-division have had deep wounds to bear in the passing of friends and relatives. By the death of Mrs. Catherine Clair, Montague Sub-Division lost its first member. She was ever a sympathetic friend, a zealous League worker and a woman with a genuine devotion and zeal for

God. A Requiem Mass was offered for the repose of her soul. Two of our members have lost their husbands and must henceforth tread the lonely path; one member has lost a dearly loved mother; three a kind father, while two others were called upon to bear the loss of loved brothers. To all these bereaved of dear ones we offer our deepest sympathy.

Our efforts during the year followed the usual lines of Religion, Social Service and Education. All committees have been exceptionally active in their branches of League activities and to them on behalf of our Sub-Division I wish to extend a well-merited tribute of praise and appreciation.

The Study Club organized in the early Autumn has been functioning regularly and as meetings were held each Monday night, during the last few weeks Professor Blanchard's Radio Talks on the "History of Prince Edward Island" have been a most interesting and instructive part of our study programme. Many members were also interested in the addresses given by Dr. Croteau and Professor Sullivan on Thursday evenings. St. Dunstan's University, sponsor of these excellent broadcasts, is to be highly commended for its efforts to advance Study Club work on our Island.

While speaking of broadcasts I might incidentally remark that our Sub-Division is deeply indebted to the members of the Holy Name Society, who were instrumental in installing the electric lights and a radio in our C. W. L. Hall. That this thoughtful act was much appreciated is evident by the number who attend each Sunday and Wednesday evening to hear the excellent Lenten sermons preached by Rev. Thos. McMahon. We, the members of the C. W. L. tender our grateful thanks and ask God to bless them individually and as an organization.

May I in passing draw the attention of members to the many instructive and valuable pamphlets issued by the Catholic Truth Society. A pamphlet rack in our League Room or Church would be of great benefit in the spreading of good Catholic literature.

In September I had the honor of representing this Sub-Division at the Diocesan Convention held in Georgetown. The convention was honored by the presence of our National President, Mrs. J. Coffey of Montreal. The spirit of loyalty, co-operation and enthusiasm manifested by officers, delegates and visitors on that occasion augurs well for the future of the C. W. L. on Prince Edward Island.

The change made at the last National Convention held at Ottawa with regard to the awarding of C. W. L. Scholarships is of interest to our members. Whereas formerly one scholarship was awarded each year to students of Canada, a smaller one is now awarded to each province. This change makes it possible for a greater number of student of rural schools to compete. In this province the Catholic girl making highest marks in the Matriculation Examinations for entrance to Prince of Wales College wins the Scholarship. We have a number of Montague Catholic girls trying those examinations this year, and with the outstanding success which the Principal, Mr. Norbert Grant, has had in the past, may we not hope to see one of our girls win this much coveted prize? Certainly our best wishes are with them.

In conclusion, I wish to extend to our Chaplain, Father Kiggins, my sincere gratitude for the assistance given me during my two years of office, also to all officers, convenors and members for their loyalty and hearty co-operation and I ask for my successor a continuance of the same support.

However, if our women could realize that His Holiness Pope Pius XI gives the League his wholehearted approval, our sub-division would soon grow to the desired strength.

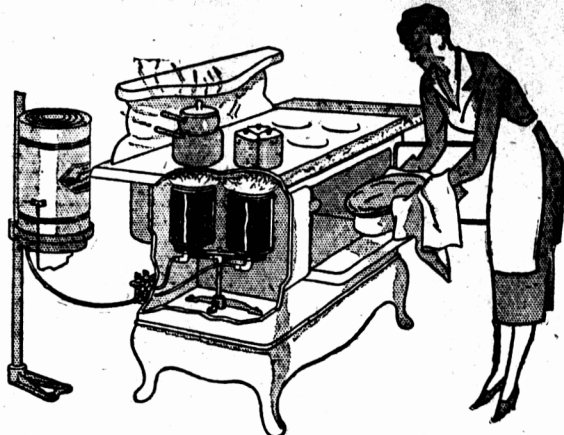
While the cash receipts are not as large as last year, the amount of good work accomplished was equal to that of any previous year and the active members may look back with no regrets on the results of their endeavors.

As we are yet feeling the effects of the depression, it was not deemed a profitable project to hold our Chicken Supper and Bazaar. This annual affair of the League had to be disposed of, which cut down our activities very materially.

On April 26th the Feast of our Patroness a High Mass was offered for the living members. A collection, amounting to \$7.50, was taken up by the children of the parish under the direction of the

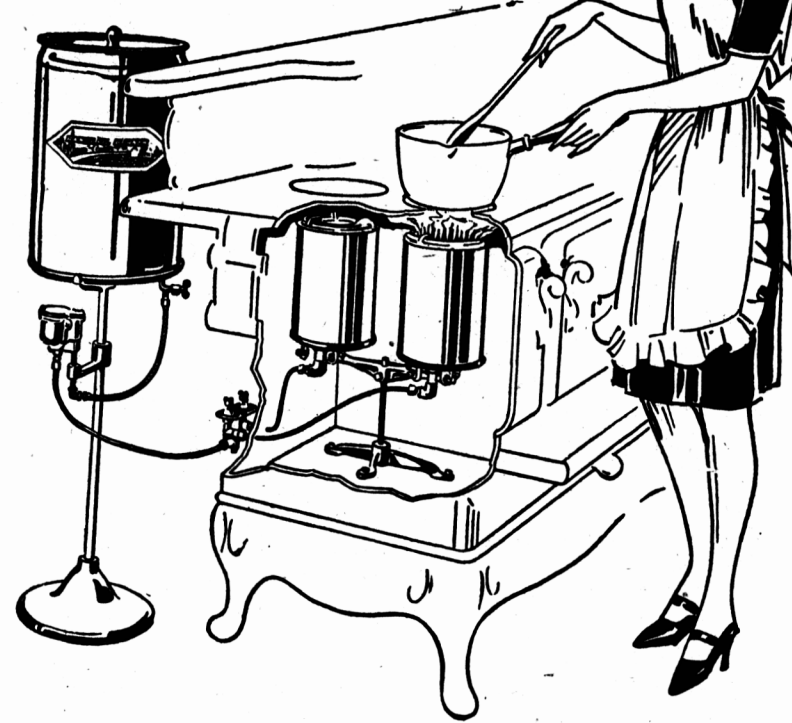

League, to provide flowers for the Altar and Repository during Holy Week.

May devotions were carried on as usual with the children's choir, under the direction of Miss Grant, rendering suitable hymns.

Card parties were held on April 2nd, 29th, and on May 24th. The proceeds were very satisfactory. Catechism classes were held until the end of June and on closing day prizes were presented to eight pupils and a generous treat of candy given to the children. A prize for General Proficiency donated to Grade IX of Montague Memorial School was won by Miss Mary Grant.

In July the church received a thorough cleaning by a number of members.

On July 16th an Ice Cream Festival was held on the church grounds, receipts of which amounted to \$69.25.

Our Diocesan Convention took place at Georgetown on September 10, 11 and 12, our Sub-Division being represented by the President, Miss Kelly. A number of members also attended the opening meeting and the banquet held at The Highlands.

Two of our members were elected to Diocesan offices: Mrs. Harold Hynes, Treasurer and Miss Florence Kelly, Convener of Study Clubs.

All our National and Diocesan obligations were promptly attended to. Our quota of \$5.00 was paid to the Regina Relief Fund and \$5.00 sent to the Sisters of Service.

Weekly card parties began in October and were continued until the beginning of Lent. Lunch was served at each party followed by music and dancing and on February 25th a "Pancake Lunch" was served, which was greatly enjoyed by the large number present.

The Bean Supper and Bingo Party held on November 16th was a decided success, the sum of \$44.25 being realized.

On December 23rd a Christmas Tree and entertainment was provided for the children of the Town. Twenty-eight children received a gift from Santa and all children present were given a treat of candy. Much praise is due the youthful performers for their creditable showing and to their teachers, whose painstaking efforts gave us a most enjoyable evening.

In November a High Mass was offered for the Souls in Purgatory and in January for one of our (late) members. Two Low Masses were offered for deceased husbands of members. Letters of sympathy were written to families who suffered bereavement.

A quantity of yarn was purchased and at Christmas a box of knitted articles was sent to St. Vincent's Orphanage, which no doubt helped to gladden the hearts of the little ones.

In December the sum of \$35.00 was paid towards church funds.

The different committees responded willingly to many calls on their time and service. The Church Committee, who volunteer their services from month to month as in former years, have carefully performed the duties of sweeping and dusting the church, washing linens, and the various other jobs necessary. During Holy Week the Altar and Repository were beautifully adorned with flowers. The decorations of the Church and Altar at Christmas brought forth many favourable comments. A Crub was prepared for the coming of the Infant Saviour. A new Communion cloth was made

and is now ready for use.

The Social Service Committee received many calls for fuel and groceries especially during the winter months. Articles of clothing were provided, flannellette was purchased and a number of articles made by the members for needy families. Visits were made to the sick and infirm and fruit sent on many occasions. Sick members and orphan children were remembered with fruit and candy at Christmas.

To the Diocesan Committee goes the credit of providing the box for the Orphanage at Christmas. They have now ready a beautiful quilt for the Sacred Heart Home.

The activities of the Education Committee in the teaching of Catechism, giving prizes, etc. has already been reported and clearly shows they have been adding their share to the many good deeds accomplished by the C. W. L. in each succeeding year of its existence.

A Study Club was organized in our Sub-Division in the Autumn, holding weekly meetings all winter. The members of this group were given some very instructive information with regard to the significance of the Vestments and the different parts of the Mass, which bring to us a realization of the many beautiful ceremonies contained in Holy Religion. Current Events was an important part of the programme of each meeting, while the radio addresses on the "History of Prince Edward Island" by Professor Blanchard formed an interesting part of our most recent programmes. At one meeting a demonstration on the making of artificial flowers was much enjoyed by the members. Many other interesting subjects have been dealt with at the differ-

ent meetings which time does not permit to enumerate. The rapid spread of Study Clubs throughout Canada shows the extent to which our women are preparing to meet the social and religious requirements of our times. The scope of this branch of educational work is unbounded and should appeal to every member.

The ladies are at present preparing a hooked rug, which they expect to have ready to lottery at an early date.

We are deeply grateful to the Holy Name Society for their initiative in installing electric lights in our C. W. L. Hall and providing a radio for the use of the parish during the Lenten season. This generous act and spirit of co-operation is greatly appreciated. In addition to this many other articles for general use have been added to the League Room equipment.

All correspondence has been carefully and promptly dealt with and letters incidental to League work written. Eleven regular and two executive meetings were held.

To our Chaplain, Father Kiggins, who with inconvenience to himself was present at many of our meetings, we attribute much of the year's success. His words of encouragement and good cheer helped lighten our difficulties, and to him we extend our deepest gratitude.

In conclusion I thank the officers and members for their display of goodwill and co-operation on all occasions and to the new staff of officers I quote the following lines: "Whatever your work and whatever its worth,

No matter how strong and clever, Someone will sneer if you pause to hear

And scoff at your best endeavor. So work along in your chosen niche With a steady purpose to nerve you, Let nothing folks say, who pass your way, Relax your courage or swerve you. The idle will flock by the Temple of Art.

Says Governments Facing Default Or Inflation

OTTAWA, April 20—Government are faced with inflation, or default, G. G. McGeer, (Lib., Vancouver-Burrard) told the House of Commons tonight as he protested against a tendency to regard unemployment as a temporary difficulty, payment as a temporary difficulty, "The province of British Columbia must default on May 15 in one of two ways," he said. "Either by neglecting to maintain its sinking funds or by letting the obligations which then fall due pass by." The government should study the relief methods and the monetary policies pursued in Great Britain and the United States, said Mr. McGeer. They were the reverse of monetary deflation and they involved a recognition of unemployment as a permanent problem.
