

Newcomers Impress Eastern Conference

Newcomers to the Eastern Football Conference are making their presence felt in the early stages of the schedule.

Each team has played two games and players in their first season in the East lead scoring, rushing and pass catching.

Peter Kempf, picked up by Montreal Alouettes from British Columbia Lions of the Western Conference, shares the scoring lead with Willie Taylor of Ottawa.

Grant of Hamilton Tiger-Cats has 12 points.

Bob Parnore who went to the AIs from Atlanta and St. Louis Cardinals of the National

Football League, leads rushing after only one game. He galloped 133 yards in 19 carries and scored the winning touchdown against Toronto Argonauts in Montreal's 17-6 victory Fri day night.

Bobby Taylor, an end who joined Toronto from Calgary Stampeders of the Western Conference is the leading pass receiver with 14 catches.

CAUGHT ONE PASS

Kempf has caught one touch down pass to go with three converts and a field goal. Tucker and Grant each have two touchdowns.

Parnore holds a three-yard lead over Ottawa's 30 Scott in rushing. Scott has 136 yards in 30 carries. Parnore's average gain of 7.7 yards, helped by a 75-yard gallop against winless Arizona, is best in the conference.

Taylor's 14 pass receptions have netted 189 yards for Toronto. Tucker is second in passes caught with nine, but leads in passing yardage with 197, average gain with 27.9 and longest gain, 52 yards.

Ottawa's Russ Jackson is the leading passer with 22 completions in 38 attempts for 340 yards, an average of 8.9 yards. Second with an 8.5-yard average is Hamilton's Frank Cosenzino, who has completed 13 of 24 for 203 yards.

Larry Fairholme of the Alouettes and Don Sutherland of Hamilton lead in pass interceptions with three each while Ticats' Willie Betteha is tops in kickoff returns with an average of 26.3 yards in four runbacks.

Toronto's Dave Mann, the East's punting leader for four years until he was dethroned the past two seasons by Joe Zuger of the Tiger-Cats, leads that department with a 43.3-yard average on 19 punts. Zuger is second at 42.9 also on 19 punts.

Jim Copeland of Toronto is the leader in punt returns with an average of 7.9 yards on 13 carries.

American League Batting Lowest In Twenty Years

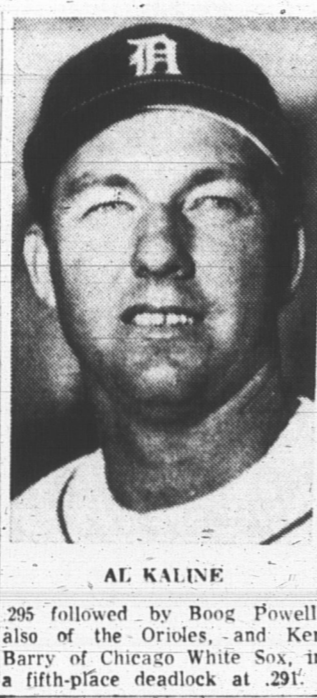
NEW YORK (AP)—The two lowest league-leading averages in the majors' history—were 396 by Elmer Flick of Cleveland in 1905 and 309 by George Stinnett of New York Yankees in 1945, both American League tie-broke.

The way it looks now the 1966 AL champion is liable to be at least the third lowest unless Tony Oliva of Minnesota, Frank Robinson of Baltimore or Al Kaline of Detroit step up their hitting pace.

Oliva, seeking his third straight crown, held on to the lead last week although he slipped five more points with a 4-for-18 performance. He was batting .317 through Sunday's games.

Frank Robinson fell two points to 313 while Kaline's mark is 307, a drop of three points. Robinson had nine hits in 31 tries while Kaline collected seven hits in 26 attempts in last week's action.

The top three are the circuit's only 300 hitters. Baltimore's Brooks Robinson is fourth at a fifth-place dead-end at .291.

The averages are more respectable in the National League where Matty Alou of Pittsburgh has taken a 16-point lead over team-mate Roberto Clemente and Atlanta's Rico Carty, tied for second.

Alou hiked his average one point to .344 by collecting six safeties in 16 times at bat. Clemente slipped one point and Carty climbed three points to .323.

Felipe Alou of Atlanta is fourth at .325 followed by Pittsburgh's Willie Stargell, .322.

Hank Aaron of Atlanta continues to lead in home runs with 33 and two homers in 91 HR had two homers and six RBI last week.

The Orioles' Powell zoomed past the Robinsons and took over the AL runs batted in, giving Powell a 400-point bias in the season. Powell is next with 85 while Brooks Robinson dropped to third with 84.

Frank Robinson led the home run lead. He hit three, boosting his total to 36.

CLEVELAND (AP)—Two-run homers by Jim Gentile and Chuck Hinton gave Cleveland Indians a 4-3 victory over Washington Monday night.

Sonny Siebert, who tossed a no-hitter against the Senators earlier in the season, gained his 13th victory in 20 decisions but needed relief help from Luis Tiant in the ninth after Paul Casanova's second homer of the game, a two-run shot, closed the gap.

Gentile put Cleveland ahead 2-1 in the fourth when he smashed his first home run as an Indian—a 400-foot blast over the center field fence—following a walk to Rocky Colavito.

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Bill White drove in five runs with three singles Monday night, helping Chris Short register his 14th victory as Philadelphia defeated Chicago 11-5.

White singled across two runs in the Phillies' four-run first inning, knocked in another pair in the second and added his third single in the eighth when the Phillie scored three runs.

Short gave up a three-run homer to Byron Browne in the fourth and was replaced by Terry Fox in the eighth after doubles by Dolfo Phillips and Billy Williams. Fox then preserved the victory by holding
