

B.C. Trip Stamps on Kapp's Arm

VANCOUVER (CP) — British Columbia Lions rode along on the brilliant passing arm of Joe Kapp to a 33-14 victory over Calgary Stampede Sunday to capture the Western Football Conference final and earn another chance at the Grey Cup when they meet Hamilton Tiger-Cats at Toronto next Saturday.

The Lions, who dropped last year's Grey Cup game to the Titans at Vancouver, saw Kapp fire four touchdowns while the B.C. defensive unit put a continual ruck on Stampede quarterbacks Eagle Day and Jerry Keeling, preventing them from mounting any real threat on offense.

More than 32,500 fans attended the game.

Kapp's passing gained more than 300 yards and his receivers were not only catching the ball but running with it. Day and Jerry Keeling passed more often but gained little more than 100 yards between them.

The touchdown passes went to halfback Willie Fleming, flanker Sonny Homer and end Mack Burdette and Pat Cluziga.

Kicker Peter Kempf converted three of them, picked up one field goal and a single point when he missed another place-

- ment. Two more points came on a safety touch.
- Calgary's lone touchdown came on a third-quarter romp by Keeling. Larry Robinson converted and kicked two field goals, and Jim Furlong kicked a single.

Hawks Bomb Montreal; Tie Habs For Third

CHICAGO (CP)—Eric Nesterenko's goals marked the second period uprising that netted Chicago Black Hawks four goals en route to a 5-2 shelling of Montreal Sunday which enabled the Hawks to tie a third more times in the National Hockey League standings with the Canadiens.

Montreal carried over a lead after the first period but faded as the Hawks came on strong and continued to bottle up the Canadiens' skaters throughout the remaining 40 minutes.

Bobby Hull, with his league-leading 14th goal of the season, tallied Chicago's first period goal, which kept the Hawks within range following Montreal goals by John Ferguson and Claude Larose.

Ken Wharram pulled the Hawks even with his fourth goal of the season—the season's—against Montreal—before Nesterenko picked up his first of the night, scoring directly from the left side of the net that eluded goaltender Charlie Hodge.

Nesterenko added Chicago's insurance goal shortly after, converting passes from Johnny McKenzie and defenseman Pierre Pilote who picked up Hodge's rebound in the game.

McKenzie completed the second period barrage and Phil Esposito completed the rout late in the third period when he tipped in a goal-mouth pass from Ferguson.

Colts Capture Ch ship By Defeating LA 24-7

Baltimore Colts won their first NFL championship since 1959 in the National Football League's Western Conference by whipping Los Angeles 24-7 Sunday for their 10th straight victory.

The Colts, who won the NFL crown in 1958 and 1959, haven't lost since the opening game with Minnesota.

Green Bay Packers delayed Cleveland's rush toward the Eastern Conference title by beating the Browns 28-21. Cleveland still needs a combination of its victories and St. Louis losses totaling two to clinch the title.

The Colts got off to a 7-0 lead in the first quarter as Lenny Moore scored a touchdown for the 14th consecutive game.

The team composing this veteran Colt raced 18 yards after Johnny Unitas teamed with John Mackey on a 62-yard pass.

The Colts' defence, led by Gino Marchetti, held the Rams scoreless until the fourth quarter when Bill Munson hit Buckley Linn with a 21-yard touchdown pass.

A gambling pass by the Packers' Bart Starr and a fumble by Cleveland's Jimmy Brown helped waltz Green Bay into the lead to stay, trailing 14-7 in the third quarter. Starr threw a fourth down pass from his 44 to Max McGee, who reached the Cleveland one. Jim Taylor then scored.

Within 3½ minutes, the Packers had another touchdown on Starr's four-yard dash. The Colts, in the second quarter, pulled All-Pro receiver Brown's fumble on the Browns' 40-yard line.

Hawks Defeat Halifax 5-4

HALIFAX (CP)—Brian Graver scored three straight goals in the second period to power Montreal Hawks to a 5-4 victory over Halifax Wanderers here Sunday night.

Graver, a former Halifax player, fired three goals less than five minutes apart in the first half of the second period to put Montreal ahead after the Hawks had fallen behind 1-0 in the first period.

Ded Wings Tie Rangers; Leafs Defeat Bruins 3-1

NEW YORK (AP)—Detroit's Lowell MacDonald, making one of several brief appearances on the ice, broke away for an unassisted goal in the closing minutes that gave Detroit Red Wings, National Hockey League leaders a 3-3 deadlock with New York Rangers Sunday night.

The tie gave the Red Wings 21 points and assured them of holding first place in the NHL race.

Bob Nevin's breakaway goal early in the final period, his second of the night, had given the Rangers a 2-2 lead which they held until a little more than three minutes from the finish.

Then MacDonald, a 23-year-old reserve forward from Thornborn, N.S., who had scored only four previous NHL goals, skated the winning goal for the Red Wings for the equalizer.

Nevin's go-ahead goal came at 44 seconds of the third period while the Rangers were short on defense. New York's Larry Cahoon was serving a penalty when Nevin took a pass from defenseman Harry Howell, outskated Detroit's Alex Delvecchio and faked goalie Roger Crozier before backhanding the puck into the cage.

LEAF TWICE—Red Wings had taken 1-0 and 2-1 leads on Norm Ullman's seventh and eighth goals of the season but New York came at 12:20 of the opening period. Parker MacDonald circled the Detroit Lions a 2-2 tie, scored by Doug Barkley. The defenseman came from 45 feet out and Ullman, parked at the left of the cage, guided in the rebound.

New York tied the score once again—Ullman 2:17, Gadsby 9:49, Nevin taking Earl Ingardie's

pass from a faceoff and drilling the puck past Crozier from 30 feet out.

The Red Wings regained the lead on Ullman's goal early in the middle period. New York's Vic Hadfield had served 46 seconds of a penalty when the Wings scored.

Again Rangers countered quickly, Hadfield setting up Marshall, whose backhand shot deflected off a Detroit player and went in between Crozier's legs.
