For the sake of a good home and whatever you can afford to pay her, would be willing to take your mother-in-law's place and keep an eye upon your boy? If you can afford it, it would be worth making many sacrifices for, because these are the formative years of your boy's life, and you want him to get the right start.

Of course, in reality a mother should be on her job, and when her children come home from school she should be there to welcome them, with the cookie jar filled. She should know where and what they are going to play and handpick their chums. But many mothers who might do this and see how their children spend their afternoons, do not do it. You at least have the justification of working so that you may give him a better home, a better environment and a better education than he could otherwise have.

So my advice to you is just to do the best you can and quit worrying over it. Any boy who has as conscientious a mother as yours has is mighty likely to turn out all right.
