# Silliphant Foursome Wins P.E.I. Schoolboy Championship With Three Wins Yesterday

## Will Represent Island In Dominion Finals At Sydney

The David Silliphant foursome from Summerside High School defeated the Barry MacDonald rink from Prince of Wales College 8-6 in a very close match at the Charlottetown Curling Club yesterday afternoon to win the Prince Edward Island Schoolboy Curling Championship and the right to represent the province in the Dominion Schoolboy curling finals to be held later this month. Silliphant topped the MacDonald rink by a similar score in the morning round yesterday to force the extra game.

The MacDonald rink was leading by a 2-0 record after the first day of play, having defeated both Summerside rinks in Tuesday's rounds. Yesterday morning the two western teams played off, with the Silliphant-Lefurgy-Daley-Morrison combination getting go-ahead into the finals with the Welshmen entry and going on to collect three wins for a perfect day's play. The Don Cameron rink eliminated by an 8-0 score in the first game.

The Silliphant foursome played an airtight game all afternoon and after a third end held a 4-1 edge on the MacDonald rink. The Welshmen had a one end in the fourth with the western winners bouncing back with a two ender in the fifth and a one end to the sixth to give them a 7-2 lead. The MacDonald rink then revived somewhat in the following three ends to collect four points and leave the count at a close 7-6, going into the 10th and final end. The game came right down to the last stone when it was played by David Silliphant. At that time both teams had a rock in play but the Silliphant final knocked both stones out of the circle and remained there itself to give the High School a one ender and finalize the two-day competition.
