Prominent Merchant Dies in Summerside

There passed away late on Thursday evening, in the Prince County Hospital, a prominent merchant of the town in the person of Mr. Mark Gaudet. He was 83 years of age.
Mr. Gaudet was born in Muscouche and came to Summerside as a young man. He worked with the firm of Sinclair and Stewart Ltd. for 18 years and in 1919, he opened a grocery business on Granville Street which he operated until his death. In later years his sons were associated with him. This was probably the first neighborhood grocery store to be established in Summerside and proved to be very successful.
Mr. Gaudet was an exemplary citizen and took part in many of the community activities. He was a member of the school board for about 20 years until he retired several years ago. He was also a member of the Board of Trade, a member of St. Paul's Church and an honorary life member of the Summerside Council of the Knights of Columbus. He also served for many years as a parish trustee.
Mr. Gaudet was married twice and from the first marriage a daughter, Mrs. Richard Duggan, Charlottetown, survives him. He leaves to mourn his second wife, the former Madeline Perry of St. Nicholas, two sons, Mark and Hillary in Summerside, and a daughter Irene, Mrs. Sylvie Gallant of Fitchburg, Mass. Another daughter, Sister St. John Robert, of the Congregation of Notre Dame, predeceased him. One brother and four sisters also survive.
Mr. Gaudet became ill about a month ago and entered the Prince County Hospital about a week later. Prior to that he had been in good health. The body is resting at the Compton Funeral Home and the funeral takes place this morning at nine o'clock to St. Paul's Church and cemetery.

Boxer Awarded \$25,000 Damages

NEW YORK, (AP) - A Supreme Court jury Friday awarded \$25,000 damages to former lightweight champion Sugar Ray Robinson in a libel action against the publishers of the Amsterdam, N.Y. News.
Basis of the action was Robinson's charge that on Jan. 6, 1951, the paper "wickedly and maliciously" carried a story which falsely caused the impression that he had been "guilty of assault and battery on his wife."
The publisher said the news item complained of was a fair and impartial report of a rumor that had reached the proportion of common knowledge.

Sport Echoes From Prince County

The regular annual school for referees which will in all probability be held next fall again in Charlottetown should feature besides their usual lectures on rule interpretation and conduct of play, a short course on how to duck a riot crowd and roll with a left jab. A little road work after the regular classes might come in handy too. It isn't so many years since hitting a referee was almost an unheard-of thing, and old time fans would be horrified to see the arbiters attacked in any way. Now the fans are getting pretty used to the refs being man-handled, and as far as the better element of fandom is concerned, pretty disgusted too.
In two of the intermediate games played in Prince Edward Island Thursday night, referees were struck by players. Where will this roughneck business end? It seems to us that very severe penalties should be handed out to players who attack referees. The mainland authorities seem to realize the danger of this new trend of affairs as they gave two players suspension for two years for such attacks. She ruling, to carry the most weight, should come from the parent body, the M.A.H.A., but if they do not see fit to put teeth into these penalties, or in any case, until the local leagues should take matters into their own hands and impose stiff penalties themselves. We were in Bedeque rink Thursday night in time to see the third period, and don't think we ever saw a more disgraceful exhibition of disregard for authority as that of the referees being played. We sympathize with the Executive rink authorities and the Executive of the South Shore League as no fault can be laid at their door, but it is to be hoped they will hand out to Thursday evening's offenders penalties fitting to the offences committed.

six games in Intercollegiate competition in 1952, against Mount A, two against Acadia and two against St. Francis Xavier. Only Acadia was able to beat them, and the 3-0 defeat suffered in Wolfville was thoroughly avenged by a 28-2 victory at home. In Maritime Intercollegiate competition St. Dunstan's scored 62 points against a total of 7 for their opponents. As Intercollegiate Champions they met the Halifax Wanderers, the winners of the Maritime Senior League, and this time Red and White came through again, 11 to 0. This with a year's record of six wins and one loss, 73 points scored to 7 for their opponents, the Saints' had brought the Maritime Senior and Intercollegiate Rugby Championship to Prince Edward Island for the first time.
While the game of basketball ("Basket-ball") has long been a favorite pastime at St. Dunstan's, it is only during the last three years it has come into its own as a major sport on the college campus. With the opening of the new Alumni Gymnasium in 1951, adequate facilities for basketball first became available and St. Dunstan's entered a team in Maritime Intercollegiate competition. Intercollegiate competition, it was Father Walter McGuigan's plan for getting some "experience" for his team; but the team of 1951-1952 gave as well as received when it came to hard-fought competition.
