Bank of Nova Scotia Annual Statement

Wednesday, November 22 — The Bank of Nova Scotia's annual statement, released today, shows the bank's assets to be at an all time high of \$818,107,524, with an increase in current loans and a lowering of investments holdings.

Total loans at the bank's year-end stood at \$364,847,746 up from the preceding year's figure of \$340,401,597. Greatest factor in this increase, is the total of current loans in Canada which are up \$39 million over the last year. Total deposits now stand at \$749,011,842. Quick assets totalled \$443,883,288, 57 per cent of the total public liabilities, while the ratio of cash to public liabilities was 10.51 per cent.

The profit and loss statement showed profits of \$4,546,464, after provision for bad and doubtful debts. Out of this the bank provided \$1,203,922 for depreciation and \$1,045,000 for Dominion and Provincial Taxes. After dividends to shareholders and providing for an extra distribution of 20 cents per share, \$377,542 was added to Profit and Loss Account.

Total earnings over the year amounted to \$1.91 per share. This included \$1.60 paid of to be paid to shareholders as dividends.

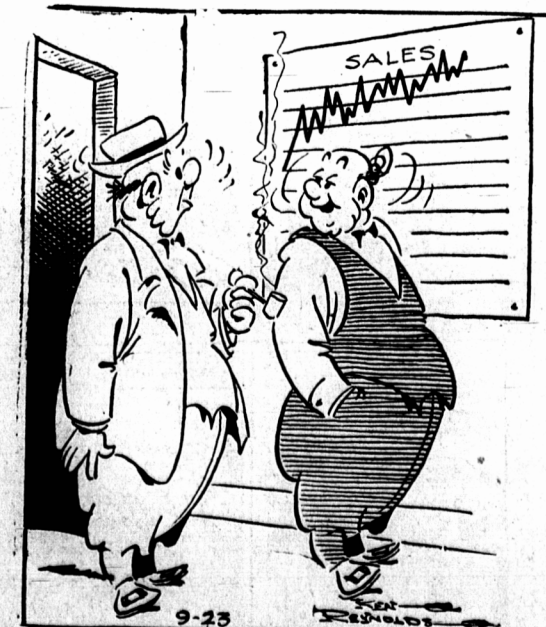
