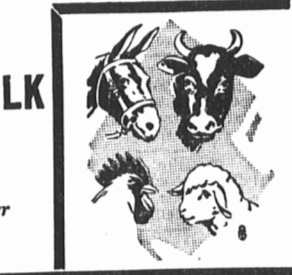

PUBLIC NOTICE

The Highway Traffic Act
