Mr. George Lewis and Mr. Henry Irving have both been in Sir Morell Mackenzie's hands. Both have undergone an operation on the throat, and both are better. Mr. Irving's voice is believed likely to be permanently improved.

A Sad Affliction.

John Cameron, cranesman at the ballast pit at Anagnan, received word some days ago that members of his family at Glenarry, Pictou, N. S., were sick and required his return. Mr. Archibald, I. C. R. engineer at Moncton, yesterday received a letter from Mr. Cameron in which it was stated that of his family five of whom he had buried four since his return. The disease is not stated, but it was probably diphtheria.—Moncton Times.

A Scarcity of Ten Cent Pieces.

A prominent bank official of Moncton said yesterday while in conversation that ten cent pieces were becoming very scarce, that sometimes it was very difficult to procure any fair quantity of them at all. When asked why it was so, he said that the cause was the little banks which are being sold and which everybody buys. They are automatic working and it is necessary to get \$5 worth of 10 cent pieces before they open at all. They have not been in use long enough yet for many of them to be filled. NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

A QUEBEC SENSATION.

The Baie des Chaleur Trouble. PREMIER MERCIER AMONG THE BOODLE BRIGADE.

OTTAWA, Aug. 14.—Armstrong, the contractor who refused to answer questions as to disposition of subsidy money paid in for the Baie des Chaleur Railway, was brought before the bar of the Senate this afternoon. He finally submitted and stated that he would appear before the committee and answer all questions. The object is to discover whether this money was used to pay Mercier's debts. The opinion is that if he tells all he knows, the Governor of Quebec will have no other alternative than to dismiss Mercier, as the first minister of the Crown, for having applied public funds to his own private uses. It has created a great sensation.

MONTREAL, Aug. 8.—In view of the recent disclosures in the Ottawa Senate re the Baie des Chaleur railway the following article from La Presse will be read with interest: "It is known and it can be proven that when the count came into power in 1887 he had no fortune, which is no dishonor. It is equally proven that Mr. Mercier, after having lived in great style, is today the proprietor of real estate exceeding in value the full amount of his salary since 1887: has the country not a right to have an investigation on this score? Mr. Mercier is the country's employe. There is in this matter more than a party question—there is a question of national dignity and of public morality. The dignity of the country requires that the fact is said of the first Minister be shown to be false; that he should not steal, that he should not enrich himself at the country's expense and that his revenues should be perfectly legitimate. Public morality exacts imperiously this proof of the honesty and wealth of the Prime Minister, because nothing so corrupts a people as the idea that provocateurs in high station go unpunished. As long as Mr. Mercier has not established that the capital needed to purchase his properties has been legitimately acquired, the people will have a right to think and to say that they were furnished by him, in spite of himself, and that there is a direct relation between the proceedings of the first Minister and the exploits of a vulgar Robert MacAire."

The same p. per claims that a parliamentary enquiry is in order.

INTERESTING SENSATIONS.

THE INVESTIGATIONS AT OTTAWA.

OTTAWA, Aug. 14.—All three committees, the Privileges Committee, Public Accounts and Senate, met this morning. An interesting sensation was made in each.

Before the Privileges Committee, Michael Stairs, of Ottawa, a contractor for the British Columbia dock, swore that he withdrew his tender at the request of Sir Hector, who invited him to his office and in the presence of Perley, requested him to withdraw, and he did so to please him.

Before the Public Accounts Committee Lister was not allowed to show a copy of the agreement between the New England Paper Company and Chaplain, but he said if it was allowed it would drive him from his office in greater disgrace than Langvin Haggart the Postmaster General wanted Mullock to go outside and fight.

In the Senate Committee, Mr. Webb, cashier of the Union Bank, said that fifty thousand dollars of the Baie des Chaleur money went to Pacaud privately, and some more for him to retire. His notes were endorsed by Hous. Mercier, Lunenburg, and L. P. Pelletier.

Charged with Murder. TORONTO, Aug. 14.—Mrs. T. B. Carruthers, of Perth County, has been arrested on a charge of murdering her husband in January last. Carruthers was intimate with her husband's employe and did the shooting when found out.
