BERLIN (CP)—Dynamic West Germany is a big ship steaming into unknown seas. She's going places, but she doesn't know where.

Glittering with fresh paint, her great industrial engines throbbing, the revamped modern Germany—how revamped!—is a materialist wave of unprecedented prosperity.

It is hard, in this brilliant spring of 1957, not to be impressed by the federal republic's breathtaking comeback. Bombed cities rise new-born in the boardrooms and production graphs shoot through the ceiling.

Being a woman of deep piety, and strong Christian conviction, she ever manifested a deep interest and took an active part in all things, pertaining to the spiritual and moral welfare of a kindly unselfish nature, she ever sought to minister to the welfare of others.
