NOTES ON THE NEWS.

"The Dead Dominion." This is the caption under which appeared some time ago, in the New York Criterion, an article on Canada. It is just as well that Canadians should occasionally reflect on the light-hearted, or light headed, manner in which our so called cousins across the border regard us. Of course not all the people of the United States nor all the newspapers hold opinions similar to those which follow, but the ideas thus set forth are the ideas of a vast number of the people of the United States.

Here is a quotation from the article: "Canada has eaten meagrely and looked hungrily towards us for many years. Her sons and daughters desert her year after year and seek fortune in the United States. * * * All the Jubilee sentiment and the "Joe" Chamberlain Imperialism have not abated her longing for our fleshpots. * * * A live official propaganda should be undertaken to urge them to cast their lot with us. * * * What cannot be always tolerated is the existence of a government to the north of us hostile to our interests and whose territory may be used as a military foothold by its Suzerain. * * * Our Continental dominance demands the obliteration of Canada as a quasi-independent power."

Now this may be all right from the American side, but note how the "Dead Dominion" is going to be "obliterated." And talking about fleshpots, we wonder who longs most for the gold mines of the Klondike, the boundless wheat lands and one or two other valueless appurtenances of the decrepit, semi-independent Canada. It is amusing to find this same paper, later on, going into raptures over the valour displayed by live Canadians in fighting as American volunteers in Cuba.

About the only objection that can be made to this kind of talk is that it is apt to lead the people of the United States so far astray that unpleasant consequences may sometime arise out of the fact that what they take for a dead country will be found very much "alive and kicking." Note for instance the turn affairs have taken as soon as a really important question is considered at the Anglo-American conference now sitting at Ottawa. Our despatches inform us that no discussion will take place on certain subjects brought up by the Canadians until certain concessions are made. The language, if we are to take it literally, makes it appear that the concessions are demanded rather than asked for.

Sir Henry Irving, the great actor, has according to some dramatic critics been worried exceedingly over the rival star, Mr Forbes Robertson. The latter's Hamlet outclasses Sir Henry's imperiousness, but his effort as Macbeth aroused no such enthusiasm. Mr. Forbes Robertson has dropped the role of the murdering throne, his wife gracefully receiving him by all going that she disliked playing Lady Macbeth, and Sir Henry is himself again.

The Marquis of Lansdowne has delivered a very important speech, this time dealing with the question of the home defence of the British Isles. This is a matter that has engaged attention for a number of years. Mention is made of a new gun to be used. The expense of the scheme of defence is certain to be very heavy, but if the results justify it, the people of Great Britain will not object. It seems possible just now to get everything that is wanted for national defence.

Even the difficulty of finding recruits for the Imperial army, which two years ago was a bugbear to the War Office, is gradually disappearing, chiefly owing to reform in the army. Some time ago a new battalion of the Cameron Highlanders and a new battalion of Guards was instituted. Recruits came slowly at first, but now the new Cameron regiment is strong enough to be called a battalion, and a few days ago received their colours from the Queen in person, who made the following speech to the men:

"It gives me great pleasure to present these colours to the new Battalion of my Own Cameron Highlanders. I feel sure that they will always be safe in your keeping, and that you will ever maintain the high reputation of your gallant regiment, and to follow the noble example of those comrades who so recently laid down their lives in the Sudan at the call of duty."

Just at present there is no little war on

England's hands. Such an unusual state of affairs however will not probably last long. The Zakka-Khels, the Mahmood-Khels, the Afridis and all the other "big hairy Pathans" of the north west frontier of India have been looting and shooting and engaging in tribal feuds. These finished they are now officially described as "restless." This restlessness means probably another war and hardship and suffering equal to that of the last campaign.

The recent border troubles are ascribed to the Durrand arrangements made with Afghanistan in 1893, since which time the chiefs of many of the "buffer states" as the territories along the frontier are called have been very suspicious of the Indian Government. Periodically they show their independence by a fierce outbreak, and though put down and shot down by force each time, they turn up again fresh and willing, and give Mr. Thomas Atkins, of the British Army, a mid-winter trip that is a decided change in the routine of Indian military life.

Fleets Scattering.

LONDON, Nov. 17.—A despatch to the Times from Wei-Hai-Wei says that the British squadron that assembled there is dispersing. The Undaunted has gone to Nagasaki and the Hermone and Iphigenia to Cebu-Foo. The Narcissus is going to Hong Kong, and the Alacrity, with the admiral aboard, is going to the Yang-Tse-Kiang.

The correspondent remarks regretfully on the complete absence of preparations to defend Wei-Hai-Wei. The place has been occupied by the British for six months, yet no fortifications have been begun, and the telegraph are defective, all of which is in striking contrast to the feverish activity displayed by the Russians at Port Arthur.

Armor Plate for England

BRUSSELS, Nov. 19.—Enormous orders for raw material have been placed in Belgium within the last fortnight by English manufacturers of armor plate. So heavy has been the demand from this quarter that the effect is visible in the market quotations on iron.

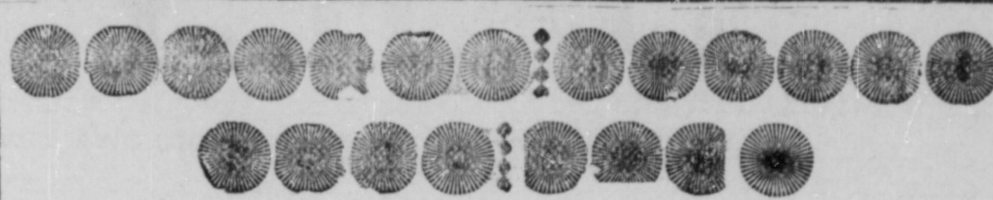

Mr. Johnson and a colored lady had tickets for two orchestra seats, but were refused admission. Mr. Johnson then took a cab and drove to the Casino Francaise where he purchased new tickets. Sperry then dismounted his companion. The defence claim that Johnson secured the tickets on a pass, saying that they were intended for a gentleman at the Queen's Hotel, and further that Johnson was perfectly aware that colored people were not allowed to occupy orchestra seats at the Academy, though they are allowed to occupy seats in the dress circle and gallery.

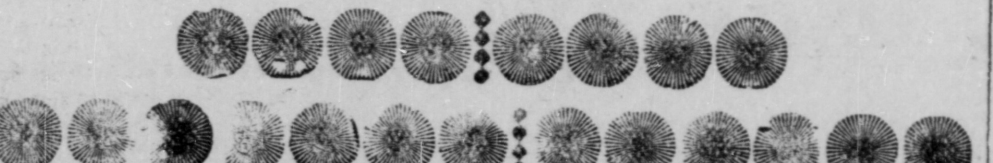
