## Announce Sawchuk Will Receive Three-Game Rest

DETROIT (AP) — Detroit Red Wings announced Wednesday that goalie Terry Sawchuk will be given a three-game "rest" and will be replaced by Glen Hall, a 23-year-old netminder from Edmonton of the Western Hockey League.

"We're giving Terry a rest — nothing more," said general manager Jack Adams of the Red Wings.

Hall, who played briefly for the Red Wings in the 1952-53 season, will be in the nets for Detroit in Saturday's game in Toronto. He also will play in Chicago on Sunday and again against Chicago in Detroit next Tuesday.

"Terry was getting a little worried out there," Adams said. "You know, a goalie can make a game — while the players in front of him can make 25 and nothing will happen."

In 54 games this season, Sawchuk has permitted 109 goals for a 2.02 average—second only to Toronto's Harry Lumley. Last week in Boston, however, the Bruins rattled Sawchuk for 10 goals in two nights.

Adams said that goalie Dave Gathener of Quebec Aces in the Quebec Hockey League would go to Edmonton to replace Hall.

TORONTO (CP) — Toronto got one fluke goal and centre Rudy Migay added two clean-cut tallies Wednesday night as the Maple Leafs crushed the powerful Montreal Canadiens 3-1 before 13,874 National Hockey League fans.

One of hockey's rarities occurred just before the second period got under way. Referee Frank Udvari asked to inspect Lumley's goal stick and found the blade half an inch over regulation width.
