

# 60 Killed In Train Crash In Chile, 100 Gravely Injured

SAN BERNARDO, Chile (AP)—Sixty persons were killed and at least 100 gravely injured Sunday when one passenger train plowed into the rear of another standing in the San Bernardo station in dense fog.

Railway officials said the death toll may reach 70. Most victims were third-class passengers riding in cars at the rear of a train halted in the station to await track repairs ahead. The locomotive of the second train, southbound like the first, destroyed two of the third-class cars in the grinding crash.

Doctors, nurses, ambulances and firemen sped to the scene and found passengers of both crowded trains in panicked confusion amid screams of pain and horror. FOG DIMS LIGHTS President Carlos Ibanez and several cabinet ministers hastened to San Bernardo, about 16 miles from the capital, Santiago, to direct relief operations. Ibanez ordered a speedy investigation and government help for families of the victims. Both trains were travelling from

Santiago, the first to Talcahuano and the second to Pichilemu. A short time before the first reached San Bernardo a freight train damaged tracks south of the station. The first passenger train was held and the station master switched on the red warning lights for the second train. These, however, were invisible in the fog, the second train's crew said. Soon after the wreck, the fog lifted.

## Funeral At Midgell Saturday

The ashes of the late Percy Douglas Leslie of Calgary who passed away March 16th were interred on Saturday morning, July 16th, in the family plot in Midgell cemetery. Only immediate members of the family were present. Rev. Russell MacLeod conducted the committal service.

Below is a tribute to Mr. Leslie at the time of his death in Calgary which appeared in the Railway Mail Clerk.

"Percy Leslie was one of my dearest friends; in fact there existed a 'Damon and Pythias' friendship which never wavered through the many years I was associated with him. I met him first in the Fall of 1910 and we roomed together for about a year in Moose Jaw; then, our hard apprenticeship over, we were brought back to Calgary. He was a man of versatile genius; he could pull a car apart, put it together again and then tackle a problem in higher mathematics or accountancy. Above all, he was honest and square and his generosity was unlimited.

"I saw Percy last in Moose Jaw, on August 22nd of last year. He told me that the old ticker was not too strong but I did not take it too seriously and the news of his sudden passing came as a shock to me.

"Yes, a gallant gentleman has passed; our loss is great, but Earth is richer that he lived."
