

Two Tie Games Played In N. H. L. On Saturday

TORONTO, Feb. 3 (CP) — Boston Bruins, mainly in the person of goalie Sugar Jim Henry, tied Toronto Maple Leafs 1-1 Saturday night before 13,379 National Hockey League fans.

The result left Toronto one point ahead of the third-place Montreal Canadiens and boosted Boston's lead over the fifth-place New York Rangers to two points. The game—largely lack-lustre except for Henry's play and that of his opposite number, Leafs' Al Rollins—opened with a scoreless first period, saw Bruins go ahead 1-0 in the second and then Leafs deadlock the issue in the final frame.

Johnny Peirson of Boston opened the scoring when he finished off a play with his two rookie linemates, Red Sullivan and Jack McIntyre. Peirson got the puck in a pile-up in front of the Leafs goal and fooled Rollins with a neat backhand.

Tod Sloan got the equalizer at 2:03 of the third period. A 31-goal man with Leafs last year, Sloan tipped in a pass-out from behind the Bruins cage from Sid Smith and Teeder Kennedy.

MONTREAL 2, DETROIT 2

MONTREAL, Feb. 2 (CP) — Montreal Canadiens' routing third-period drive wiped out a two-goal deficit and earned them a 2-2 National Hockey League tie Saturday night with Detroit Red Wings.

It was a thriller for the 14,426 fans. Ted Lindsay and Fred Glover scored for the Wings in the second period and Canadiens, with a wide margin of the play in the last period, pulled out the tie on goals by Floyd Curry and Billy Reay.

The tie kept Detroit four games in front of second-place Toronto with Canadiens half a game behind Toronto.

Neither Gordie Howe of the Wings nor Maurice Richard of Canadiens could score and their goal-scoring leadership remained deadlocked at 26. But Howe had an assist to stay in front of the pack on points.

For more than two periods it looked as if goalie Terry Sawchuk of the Wings would gather in his 11th shutout of the season. Finally Canadiens' desperate power plays, with the Wings almost

entirely on the defensive, broke through Sawchuk's brilliant stand. In the hectic last period Detroit had only four shots on goal to Montreal's 17. For the full game, Canadiens had a 39-19 margin.
