The military force now stationed in Ireland for the purpose of preventing disorders consists of twenty-one thousand men, and includes seven regiments of cavalry.

Parnell says he will not accept Gladstone's measure for Ireland, and the Toronto Mail says Gladstone thinks that Parnell wants quart measures that held a gallon.

The French Premier and Minister of the Interior are threatening to resign, in consequence of a censure by the Senate upon the Prefect of the Seine for removing the crucifixes from the public schools of Paris.

Charles Tennyson, just from Ireland, was charged with drunkenness at the Toronto police court. He passed one hand through his flowing locks, raised the other impressively, and said something to the following effect:—

"The church bell tolls the hour of opening Court.

The hapless drunks are dragged into the dock,

The Magistrate looks glum at this poor post And leaves reporters round to scorn to mock."

The United States Consul at Gaspe Bay reports to Mr. Everts that "American fishermen are now seldom seen in these waters. They stick to their own coasts, and have voluntarily abandoned as worthless the Canadian inshore fisheries, for which the Halifax court made us pay five and a half million dollars, besides the remission of duties on the products of the Canadian fisheries for twelve years." It was for securing such terms as these for his country that Sir John A. Macdonald was abused by Messrs. Blake, Mackenzie & Co. as a traitor. The Grit who should use such language in the same connection now would be hooted by his own friends, but similar language is being employed in connection with the railway contract, and with equal injustice.

SARAH'S YOUNG MEN.—Sarah Bernhardt closed her engagement in Montreal on the 25th, before an immense audience. She was called out after every act, and at the close was compelled to appear a number of times, while the orchestra played "La Marseillaise," the gallery joining in the chorus the enthusiasm being intense. After the performance a great crowd assembled in the street, and the students taking the horses from Barnhardt's sleigh hauled her to the Windsor Hotel amid the singing of French National airs and tremendous cheering. The crowd at the hotel entrance was so great that it was with difficulty the passage was cleared for herself and sister. The excitement for some time was without previous parallel in the city.
