

Mar. Midget Tournament Is Scheduled For Ch'town

The Charlottetown Minor Hockey Association has come up with a first in Maritime hockey playoffs. Ivan Doherty announced last night that the local association will host provincial championships from New Brunswick and Nova Scotia respectively in a three team round-robin tournament for the Maritime midget hockey championship. This will be the first time the Maritime midget crown has been decided by means of a tournament.

The last Maritime midget championship for an Island team was back in 1958-59 when Billy MacMillan paced a Charlottetown team handled by Harry "The Barber" Sentner to the Maritime crown. The Sentner coached forces defeated Bathurst in a sudden death game played in the New Brunswick city and then defeated Halifax before over 1,100 fans in a thrilling game staged at the St. Dunstan's rink. Other key members of that team included: Roy Biggar, Gord Whitlock, 5-4-n Pearson, David Lee, John Davis and Frank Dow.

Lorne Hennessey has a new crop of youngsters and coach Hennessey has stated he feels this is one of the best midget teams ever assembled on Prince Edward Island. The local club is financing the tournament and when speaking on this subject Lorne told us, "about the only thing we are going to get out of this is the Maritime championship."

Speaking about his team Lorne said his forward lineup is headed up by Bobby Whitlock, Bob Doherty and Brian Foley and he has a most solid defence which includes: Sandy MacDonald, Pat Walsh, Allan Acorn and Ted Kitson. The Charlottetown coach has added young Robert Stewart to his squad. Robert is a strapping 165 pounder whom is still of bantam age, but will bolster the Hennessey coached forces in their quest for the championship.

Lorne is being assisted this year by Lloyd Hillier who takes care of the managers' duties for the Charlottetown midget representative. Lorne has lots of praise for the efforts that Mr. Hillier has put forward in order to keep the team running smoothly.

STRONG OPPOSITION

honors in New Brunswick. The Charlottetown coach commenting on the opposition stated, "I think the Fredericton team should prove to be the toughest, on the bases of their showing in an invitational midget tournament played at the Montreal Forum, this season. The Fredericton team were undefeated in the Montreal tournament."

Action gets underway at the local arena Friday night at eight o'clock when "the giants" of the tourney (Fredericton and Charlottetown) will clash head-on. Saturday will see the teams take to the ice at 11 o'clock with Fredericton and Antigonish crossing sticks in the final game of the tournament at the Nova Scotia champions will be pitted against Charlottetown team with action scheduled to get underway at seven o'clock.

Ivan Doherty, president of the CMHA, told us they will be putting the players from the visiting teams up in private homes for the tournament and anyone interested in helping out in this way is urged to contact Mr. Doherty.

This writer thinks that local fans should see some of the best hockey played at the Fitzroy street "ice palace" this season when action commences for the Maritime midget crown at the local arena Friday night.

There are three National Hockey League teams interested in several of the youngsters who will be taking part in this tournament. Montreal Canadiens, Tor-

onto Maple Leafs and Boston Bruins will have scouts in attendance for the tournament, to keep a sharp eye for any possible "finds" among these youngsters. There are at least two players on the Charlottetown team that have been approached by National Hockey League scouts, with the intention of sending them to fall training camp with a Junior 'A' hockey club.

Fred Whitfield exploded a bases-loaded triple in the fifth inning as Cleveland edged Boston 5-4. Lenny Green homered for the Red Sox.

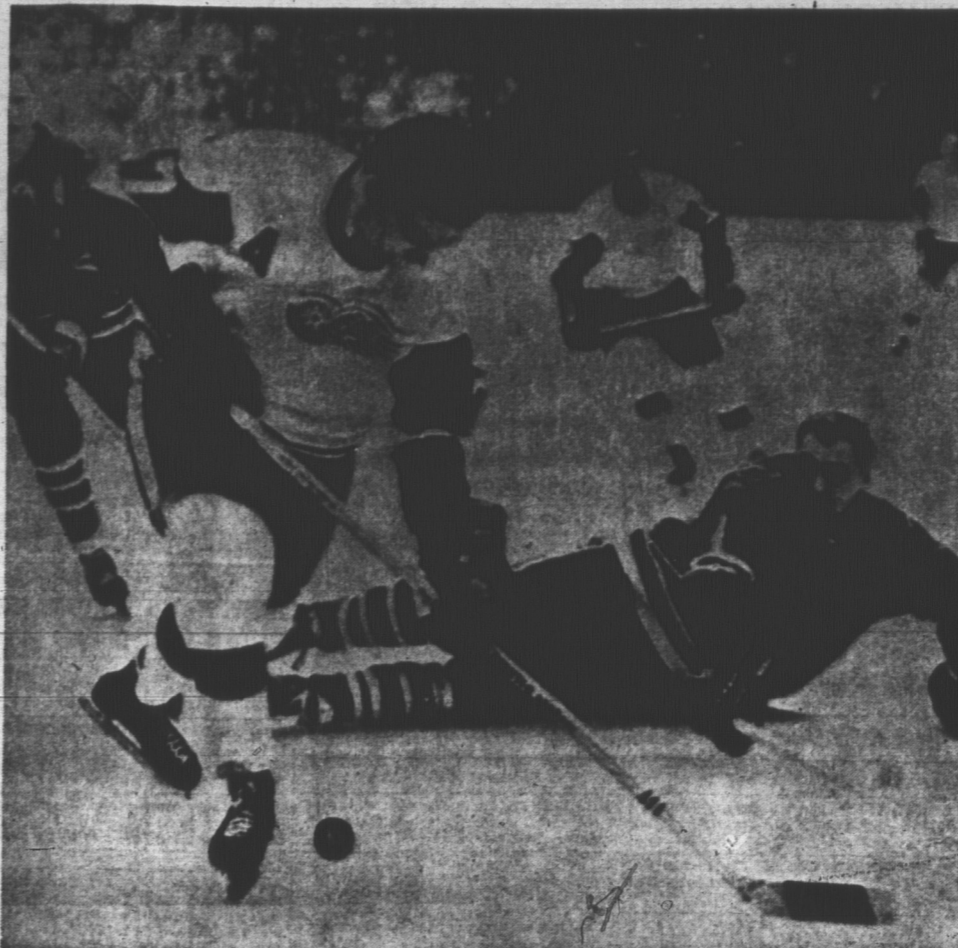

Toronto Edges Canadiens; Hawks Swamp Red Wings

TORONTO (CP) — Davey Keon stole the puck from Montreal defenceman Ted Harris and scored his first playoff goal to give Toronto Maple Leafs a 3-2 victory over Montreal Canadiens.

Toronto's Frank Mahovlich, who led the puck posse from J. C. Tremblay and Harris was in the process of retrieving it when Keon swooped in.

The end was a heartbreaker for Gump Worsley in the Montreal net. The Gumper had turned aside numerous Toronto efforts earlier in the period and was responsible for Montreal staying as close to the Leafs as they were.

The results left Canadiens still holding a 2-1 edge in their best-of-seven Stanley cup series.

Keon's goal was his 21st in playoff competition. Earlier Eddie Shack and Andy Bathgate scored for Leafs while Jean Beliveau and Henri Richard were the Montreal marksmen who sent the game into the first overtime contest of the current series.

Worsley, who replaced injured Charlie Hodge in the Montreal net for the third game, sparked throughout, robbing Toronto of several sure-seeming goals.

His counterpart in the Leaf net, Johnny Bower, was again sensational as he turned aside

big gun for the Hawks as he counted two goals, his fourth and fifth of the series. Billy Hay, Stan Mikita and Doug Mohns shared the other Chicago goals.

Veteran Ted Lindsay, the 39-year-old left winger, who returned to the National Hockey League this season after a four-year retirement, scored both Detroit goals.

Hall who was in goal for the first game of the series in Detroit when Wings won 4-3, was a standout, stopping 31 drives. He was particularly effective in the final period when he kicked out 12 shots.

Rookie Roger Crozier didn't have as much work as Hall, and stopped only 11 of 16 shots fired at him.

A capacity crowd of well over 19,000 shook Chicago Stadium when the Hawks registered three goals in the first eight minutes.

Lindsay scored his goals in each of the first two periods, but the Hawks counted once and three in the third.

The Hawks were an improved club over the first two games as they kept the Wings off balance with vigorous checks and gave Hall sufficient coverage.

They were particularly sharp in the Detroit zone as the forwards consistently worked the puck out to their defenceman on the points, giving Wing defenders little chance to get set.

Detroit made a game of it for two periods, but tired quickly in the third.

Until the Hawks get things straightened out within their camp we are afraid their team as a whole will suffer greatly.

The Hawks trade with the Rangers in which they acquired Camille "the ed" Henry doesn't appear to be paying off with any great amount of success for the Windy City pucksters. Henry hasn't been effective on the power play and this is their only use for the diminutive winger. He is not in the best of physical condition so we expect this will be his last year in the National Hockey League; thus we conclude that the Rangers got the best of the Norris boys when they pulled this trade off.

Tid Bits From Here And There

Quarterback Bernie Faloney says he is prepared to sit out the 1965 Eastern Football Conference season if he can't negotiate a contract with Montreal Alouettes—and if the Al's then refuse to trade him to Toronto Argonauts. I am asking for a large increase in salary if I go to Montreal for compensation for the business interests I'll have to give up in Hamilton. Faloney said Monday at a press conference. He denied he had asked Montreal for a \$200,000 three-year contract.

The RCAF Eagles and the Borden Nationals are having quite a series to decide the Prince County Hockey championship. The Eagles toppled the Nationals 9-5 on Monday night to square the best-of-seven series at two games apiece. The fifth game in the series will be played at the RCAF rink tonight and both clubs will be going all out for the important victory.

Cape Breton Post Juniors eliminated Summerside Legionnaires in the Maritime Junior hockey finals by downing the Summerside pucksters 4-2 in Sydney Monday night to capture the best-of-three series in straight games. The Sydney representative shaded the Legion outfit 5-4 at Civic Stadium Saturday afternoon. The Summerside pucksters had a 2-1 lead early in the third period, but the Sydney squad struck for three quick goals to salt away the Maritime championship. Sydney now will go against representatives of the Ottawa Valley and Quebec in the Eastern Canada Memorial Cup playoff in Sydney next week.

The remnants of the once-powerful Atlantic Football Conference will subsist on a diet of exhibition games during the 1965 season while seven former members compete in the newly-formed Inter-Collegiate Blueeese Conference. Seven University clubs pulled out of the AFC after completion of the '64 schedule and decided to form a separate league under the Maritime Inter-Collegiate Athletic Association. The move left the AFC with two navy teams and a new entry, Halifax Buccaneers.

Government Grants To National Sport Bodies

OTTAWA (CP)—Grants to 12 national sports governing bodies to help them stage leadership training programs were announced Tuesday by Health Minister Judy LaMarsh.

Largest amount goes to the Canadian Figure Skating Association, which gets \$22,891 for its national clinic in Ottawa. Technical staff and program coordinators at the clinic later will conduct regional training clinics at 11 communities across Canada.

The Canadian Volleyball Association is to get \$21,405 for a series of demonstrations and exhibitions by stars from overseas. They also will conduct clinics in all major Canadian centres.

The Canadian Lawn Tennis Association will get \$18,750 for a series of coaching clinics across Canada.

Other grants: National Federation of Amateur Baseball, \$9,483 for a national coaching and leadership clinic in Montreal; Canadian Lacrosse Association, \$7,515 for regional clinics for referees and coaches in Montreal, Toronto and Winnipeg; Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, \$2,000, for a national judges' clinic in gymnastics in Saskatoon in July and a \$4,500 grant for development of track and field training.

Canadian Amateur Softball Association, \$6,000 for clinics across Canada for coaches, referees and sports organizers; Canadian Badminton Association, \$4,425 for coaching clinics and organization of a national-wide tour; Canadian Association of Amateur Oarsmen, \$2,536 to hold national coaching clinics, and Canadian Women's Field Hockey Association, \$2,015, for coaching and umpiring clinics in various centres.

All grants were recommended to the minister by the advisory council fitness and amateur sport.

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Eagles Host Nats Tonight

SUMMERSIDE — RCAF Eagles host Borden Nationals in the fifth game of the PCHL finals tonight at the Air Force Base. Game time is 8:15 p.m. The best of seven series is currently tied at two games apiece. The Eagles grabbed the opener 3-2 and the Nats the next two by scores of 8-5 and 6-3. RCAF took the fourth contest 8-2 on home ice.
