

England, Russia and the Turks.

The telegrams are sensationally warlike. England and Russia are sparring; and the world is on the qui vive for a great fight. Lately discovered intrigues on the part of Russia, in both Afghanistan and Turkey, for the mortification and discomfiture of England has made England angry; and Russia recognizes in England the power which always thwarts her plans for conquests in the East. The St. Petersburg correspondent of the New York Herald says "the heart of every Russian is beating faster at the recollections of the many evils inflicted on Russia by the policy of England." If this be true, it is not strange that Russia is seeking an occasion to wound and disable her overpowered opponent. But then it is said that Russia lacks "the sinews of war;" and England is constitutionally averse to striking the first blow. After all, it is a question if the expectations of the world be gratified just yet.

In the telegrams, too, we note an apparent change of policy on the part of England towards the "sick man." For years England has upheld Turkey through evil and through good report. But her patience is at last exhausted. And no wonder. The "sick man" will not try to get well. The "Unspeaking Turk" will not make an effort to carry out the reforms he has, time after time, promised to make. And the consequence is, that the British Ambassador at Constantinople has demanded an immediate change for the better under a threat to send a fleet up the Bosphorus and practically to take possession of the Turkish capital. The indications, at present, are that England may herself assume the position in Asia in regard to India which Turkey has hitherto held.

It has been decided by the Supreme Court of Canada that the Act of the Legislature of Nova Scotia investigating the Lieutenant Governor with the power to appoint Queen's Counsel is ultra vires and void; and that Her Majesty, by herself, or through the Governor General, alone can confer that dignity.

COMMERCIAL NEWS.

PRICE OF CATTLE.

James Duggan & Sons sold, at Keating's market, yesterday afternoon, 25 head of cattle, from Antigonish, at the rate of \$6 per hundred pounds.—H. Herald.

PRODUCE SALE IN HALIFAX.

James Shandon sold, on Tuesday, barrels of cranberries at \$5.50; half barrels do at \$2.25; barrels Early Rose potatoes at \$1; turnips, 90 cents per barrel; carrots \$1 per barrel; bacon 5 cents per pound; apples from \$3.50 to \$3.50 per barrel.—Herald.

POTATOES IN HALIFAX.

Among the imports yesterday were 4,304 bushels oats, 14,780 bushels potatoes, and 1347 bushels turnips, from P. E. Island.—H. Herald.

The price of Sydney coal has advanced to \$5.50 per chaldron at Halifax.

LIVE STOCK AND PRODUCE EXPORTS.

The S. S. "Ocean King" sailed on the 5th inst. from Montreal, having on board 333 sheep, 90 head of cattle and 80 hogs for the English market. On the same date the S. S. "Alpha" sailed from Halifax for Glasgow with a large cargo of apples and potatoes.

On the 5th the Princess of Wales took from Summerside 600 sheep for the United States market.

THE PRICE OF FLOUR GOING DOWN.

The price of flour by wholesale has fallen from 55 to 80 cents per barrel during the past few days, and the tendency is still downwards.

A NEW INDUSTRY.

We understand that parties in Moncton have in contemplation the establishment of a flour mill on a larger and more extensive scale than any now in existence in the Maritime Provinces. The parties are now engaged in collecting information in connection with the business. The central location of Moncton makes it a distributing point of great importance. A respectable portion of the flour imported into New Brunswick and Nova Scotia is distributed by parties situated here.—Moncton Times.

TEAS.

A further sharp advance has taken place in teas. The total advance would probably

make retail purchasers pay from 8 to 11 cents to increased price more than recent rates, if holders were not anxious to realize. As, however, there are fair stocks on hand it is possible that holders will sell at a slight advance on old prices.—St. John Telegraph.

FOREIGN FAT CATTLE

are now quoted in the English market at nearly the same price as British, but English mutton sells considerably higher than the imported article.

UNPLEASANT NEWS.

The announcement that a Chilean gun boat is reported at Lobos Islands, notifying ships loading guano to discontinue their work is not very pleasant news for ship owners.

News from the North-West.

[From Winnipeg Papers.]

Grand Valley seems to be rapidly settling up.

Buffalo are reported plentiful between Red Deer Forks and Fort Walsh.

It is reported that the water in the Red River, and also in the Assiniboine, has been rising for some days past.

The thief who was concerned in the recent mail robbery has been discovered and has made an involuntary confession to Mr. Dewe. The amount, about \$300, has also been made good.

The preliminary work in connection with the building of the telegraph line between Winnipeg and Portage la Prairie is making progress.

Water tanks are immediately to be constructed on the Pembina Branch, in consequence of the representations of Mr. Sanford Fleming, Chief Engineer of the C. P. Railway.

The following statistics show the number of the criminal trials which have taken place before the Court of Provincial Police, Winnipeg, during the year ending on the 30th of September, 1879. The number of persons tried was 218. Places of birth: Canada, 158; United States, 39; Ireland, 7; England, 8; Scotland, 3; Germany, 2; Sweden, 1.

Mr. Fred Salters, of St. James' Parish has raised from his market garden this season over 30,000 heads of cabbage and cauliflowers, 10,000 bunches of celery, and potatoes, carrots, beets, parsnips, onions, turnips, &c., in quantities unknown—and all from a patch of ground a little over ten acres. He has also sold 5,000 bunches of celery to Mr. Saunders, huckster. What he can't grow in the vegetable line isn't worth growing.

Coblentz & Bro., of Emerson, sold 1,000 bushels of wheat to F. R. Sterret at 73 cents per bushel. The wheat is to be delivered at West Lynne.

The Rat Portage North Star has the following with reference to the late mineral discoveries in that vicinity: "The discovery of gold in the vicinity of this town, in considerable quantities, has produced a wide-spread sensation here. When it was discovered that the precious metal existed in extensive tracts, the excitement became intense, and Mr. McCallum, D. L. S., immediately started for Toronto and Ottawa, to which place he carries valuable specimens. We trust his expectation may be realized, and the enterprising discoverers amply rewarded. Silver has also been found in several places on Lake of the Wood in large quantities. We have in our office at the present time mineral specimens of the different metals, which, for richness of the pure stuff would compare favorably with any part of America, and this without any exaggeration. We cannot longer withhold the fact that present indications point to this place as the future El Dorado of the continent."
