SHOTA BEAR.—This time Mr. John Robertson, of Munn's Road, Lot 47, is the bear killer. A carcass of a horse belonging to a neighbor tempted him to come forth. Mr. Robertson, armed with a double-barrelled gun, climbed a tree close by and waited for his bearship on Monday night last. He had not long to wait. The bear appeared and began his evening meal. Bang went the watchers' gun, first one barrel and then the other, and down came the bear mortally wounded. He proved to be one of the largest ever killed on the Island. The farmers in the vicinity are to be congratulated upon this getting rid of a pest that would have probably lessened the number of their sheep before the summer ends.

MR. WHITMAN FOUND GUILTY.—A Joliet, Ill., despatch of the 21st inst., says: The Baptist Ministerial Council, called to adjudicate the charges against the Rev. Edward Whitman (formerly of P. E. Island) and settle the strife which has, during his pastorate of one year, caused great trouble in the Baptist Church here, met here to-day. Nearly all the churches in Northern Illinois embraced in the call were represented. Such a case was never so joined to stand up and solemnly affirm that for the sake of decency and Christianity they would not disclose the evidence. There was not a voice to be raised in Mr. Whitman's favor, and the verdict was that all the charges were sustained. Mr. Whitman was sent for to speak, but he refused to appear, and locked his church door against the council.

AN ISLANDER INJURED.—The St. John Sun of yesterday says:—J. W. Richards, of Bideford, P. E. I., member of the Island Assembly for the Second District of Prince County, arrived in the city last night on route to New York on a business trip, and is now at the Royal suffering from the effects of injuries sustained yesterday at Fajesse Junction. It appears that while at the junction, in attempting to enter a slowly moving car, Mr. Richards was struck on the left shoulder by the car, but at the time he did not suffer any pain from the blow. Indeed, it was not until the train had passed Moncton that Mr. R. experienced any evil effects, but by the time he reached St. John his shoulder was so painful that he could not pursue his journey. He therefore took a cab to the Royal and summoned D. L. McLaren, who pronounced the injury to be dislocation of the shoulder. With the assistance of his son, Dr. Murray McLaren, the dislocation was reduced by Dr. McLaren, and Mr. Richards made as comfortable as possible. It will be some days, however, before Mr. Richards will be able to resume his journey.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

More French Outrages.

HALIFAX, May 22.

A despatch from Charnel, Newfoundland, says another French outrage on the way to the so-called French shore has been committed. A French captain named Bischell, of the schooner Marie, while coming into Port au Brusque last Friday, carried away a poor man's net. As the occurrence was witnessed by many, the owner went on board to seek recompense, and was nearly cursed out of existence. The magistrate was appealed to, and he issued a summons, which was served on Bischell, who did not appear, and judgment for default was given against him, and a warrant for his apprehension issued. The constable promptly boarded the vessel with a warrant while the schooner was under way, but so far Bischell is gone with summons, warrant and constable. The magistrate telegraphed the facts to the commander of the Ludre and also to the government, the former replying that the matter would be investigated.

Royalty in British Columbia.

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 22.

The heavy rain which prevailed this morning had the effect of dampening in a manner the enthusiasm of Vancouver's welcome to the Duke and Duchess of Connaught, who arrived from Victoria by the Canadian Pacific steamer Abyssinia. At 11 o'clock the royal party was met at the dock by Mayor Oppenheimer and the City Council, forming a reception committee with the officers of the C. P. R., who tendered them the hospitality of the city. An address, expressing Vancouver's loyalty and her citizens' pleasure at the honor of the visit from royalty, was read by Mayor Oppenheimer, and in reply the Prince thanked Vancouver for the cordial welcome extended to himself and his royal consort. He was glad, he said, to find himself once more on Canadian soil. It was quite a new experience for him to come into a city only three years of age, and he was perfectly astounded.

Presbyterian Conference.

SARATOGA, N. Y., May 23.

In the Presbyterian General Conference to-day, Dr. Patten, chairman of the committee for canvassing answers of presbyteries on revision read the reports. One hundred and thirty-three desired revision, and 68 did not. Others declined to answer. Dr. McCracken made affirmative, 135 and 67 negative, including Albany and Sacramento in the affirmation list instead of negative. This is a very important point, as the classification of these two decides whether two-thirds have desired revision.

Cowardly Conduct.

HALIFAX, May 22.

A despatch from Bonavista says that the schr. Advance, with fish, arrived yesterday from the Banks. She presents a pitiable appearance, having lost her bowsprit, jib-boom and outwater, in fact everything forward had been carried away. The disaster occurred by collision with a French banker. Instead of rendering or offering to render assistance, the Frenchmen flung at the Newfoundlanders iron belaying pins and everything else capable of being used by them as a missile.

Nova Scotia Elections.

HALIFAX, May 23.

Later returns of the election show that C. H. Chan (opposition) has defeated McCoy in Shelburne by eight votes, and is only 11 behind Hon. Thomas Johnston, a member of the Government. Both Lawrence and Clarke, Government candidates, are elected in Colchester by majorities of less than fifty. Both Government men are elected in Inverness. The latest reports from Halifax claim the election of Dr. Haley (Govt) by one majority over McDougall (Opp).

A Disastrous Storm.

BERLIN, May 22.

The village of St. Maplen, near Hildesheim, was recently visited by a severe hail-storm, which did a great deal of damage. To-day the people gathered in the church to pray for a cessation of the storm, and while the services were in progress, a thunderstorm came up. The church was struck by lightning. Four persons were instantly killed, and twenty injured, four being rendered completely blind.

New Gunboat Coming.

LONDON, May 23.

The new British gunboat Thrush, recently completed at Greenock sailed yesterday for Halifax to join the fleet on the North American and West India squadron. She is under command of Prince George, second son of the Prince of Wales.

The Behring Seas Matter.

OTTAWA, May 23.

Hon. Mr. Tupper, when asked as to the truth of the rumor that the Washington Government had refused to accept the proposed settlement of the Behring Sea question, said the Canadian Government had no information which they could make public.

Queen's Birthday Honors.

OTTAWA, May 23.

It is understood that among the Queen's Birthday honors will be a knighthood to Chief Justice Johnson, of Montreal, A. K. C. M. G. for Col. Gzowski and C. M. G. for the late Deputy Postmaster General Griffin.
