

MURRAY McLAUCHLAN TO APPEAR 'WITHOUT' 'SILVER TRACTOR'

Due to unforeseen circumstances, the previously announced back-up group for recording star Murray McLauchlan will not appear in his scheduled November 26 performance at Confederation Centre of the Arts.

Fall Festival Executive Producer Donald A. Grant today announced that the Silver Tractors, a group advertised as the back-up band for McLauchlan's current national tour, will not appear in his Charlottetown concert or any other concerts which complement his tour through Quebec, Ontario and other Atlantic Provinces.

Mr. Grant said that McLauchlan will appear with instrumental support from his long-time music associate and back-up base player, Dennis Pendrith.

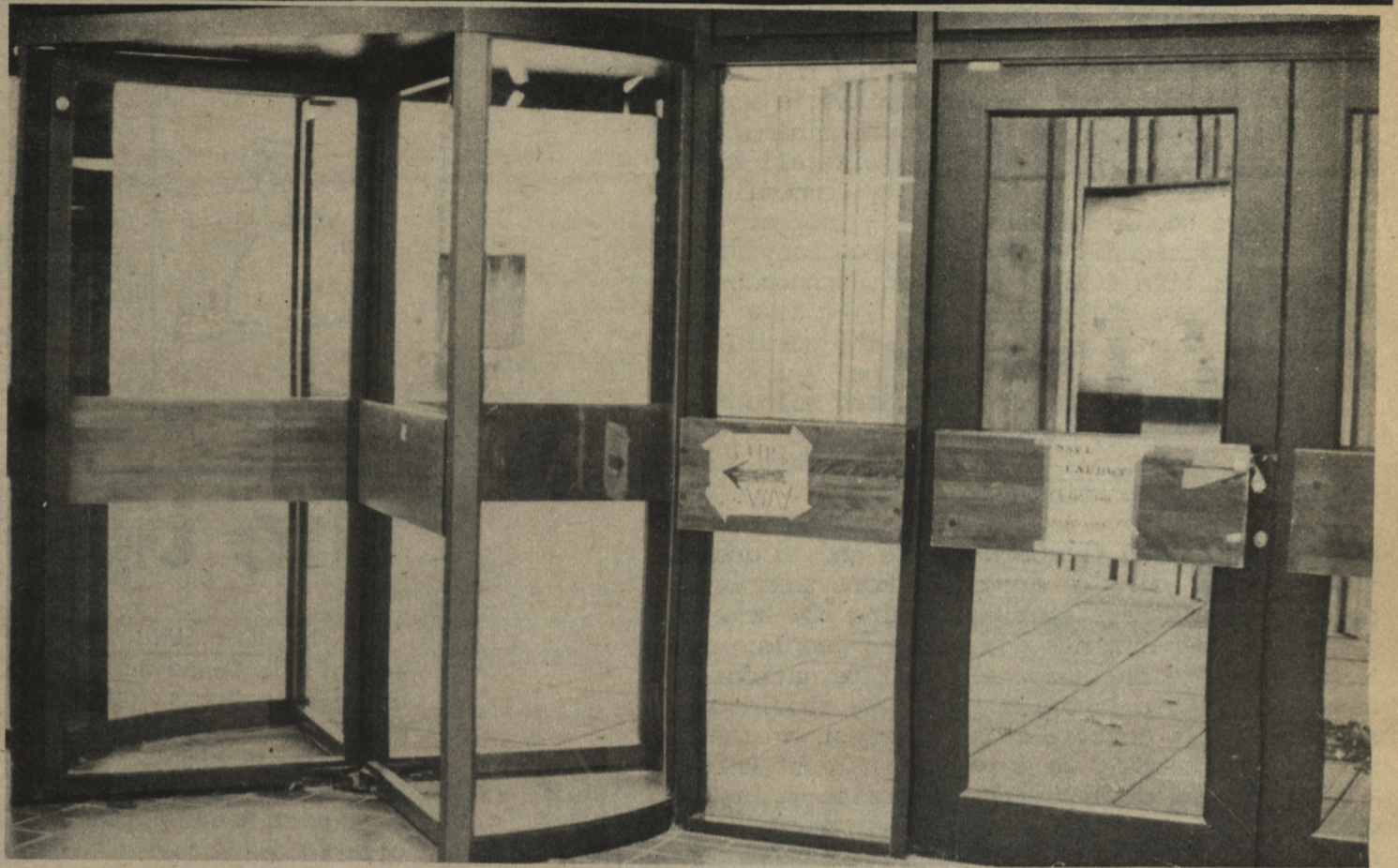
McLauchlan himself plays guitar, harmonica and keyboards and is noted for his distinctive vocals and striking lyrics which have made him a five-time JUNO award winner and holder of two gold albums. The scheduled appearance with Dennis Pendrith as sole back-up performer is reminiscent of McLauchlan's

beginnings in Canada's music industry when he became known as "the kid from the city" and received national recognition for such works as "The Farmer's Song".

Individuals who have

already purchased tickets for the Saturday 8 p.m. performance which advertised the Silver Tractors may receive full refunds if they wish at Confederation Centre Box Office in downtown Charlottetown up until the day prior to the show.

MEETING TURNS SOUR EMERGENCY PLENARY TO MAKE DECISIONS

Halifax (Cup)--The meeting that some student officials hoped would be the turning point for the Atlantic Federation of Students turned sour last weekend when delegates attending the group's sixth conference put off key policy decisions until an emergency plenary that will be held in two weeks.

The conference also failed to elect a Secretary Co-ordinator. Delegates in various workshops expressed clear views on the Atlantic Federations of Students,

universities financing, unemployment, and student pay, but were unable to transform them into policy, after getting bogged down in constitutional control.

Dalhousie University Student Council and UPEI Student Council refuse to guarantee to pay their membership fees to the organization. This contributed to the organization's failure to hire a Secretary Co-ordinator, a staff position which most delegates saw as essential to the organization. The executive,

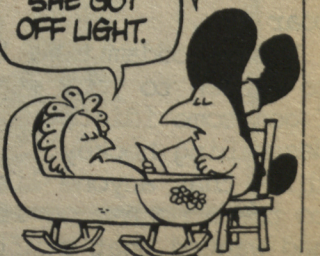
however, recommended hiring a staff person when 75% of the federation's outstanding fees were received. The debates stalled at the final plenary when six executive nominees agreed that the election and the workshop reports should be shelved until a Dec. 3rd meeting at Acadia in Wolfville, N.S. At the workshop students said the organization should research the effects of cut backs on post-secondary education funding on each campus. Other workshop motions emphasized the need for student representation on the Maritime Provinces Higher Education Commission and improve student aid.
