

Rough Riders Slaughter Tiger Cats To Win EFC

MONTREAL (CP) — Ottawa Rough Riders left no doubt Saturday as to their right to represent the Eastern Football Conference in the Grey Cup classic in Vancouver Nov. 26.

The Rough Riders trampled Hamilton Tiger-Cats 42-16 and won the two-game total-point EFC final 72-17.

They now meet Saskatchewan Roughriders in Vancouver in the Grey Cup Saturday. Saskatchewan eliminated Winnipeg Blue Bombers in two games of their best-of-three western final last week.

The last time Ottawa and Saskatchewan met in the Grey Cup was in 1951, when Ottawa scored a 21-11 win. Since then Ottawa has beaten Edmonton Eskimos 16-6 in the 1960 Canadian final.

In defeating the defending Grey Cup champions, Ottawa displayed an awesome aerial attack and a formidable defence.

SETS RECORD
 Ottawa defenders set a CFL single-game record with eight interceptions, as Hamilton quarterbacks Joe Zuger and Frank Cosentino tried desperately to narrow the margin of points separating the clubs.

Ottawa fullback Jim Dillard scored three touchdowns, all on passes, while halfback Bo Scott, flanker Whit Tucker and Bill Cline scored the others on pass plays.

Moe Racine, the EFC's scoring champion, converted four of the six Ottawa TDs and added second- and fourth-quarter singles on field goal attempts.

Flanker Tommy Grant scored

both Hamilton touchdowns, Don Sutherland's two converts and a safety touch completed the Hamilton scoring.

Cline, who does the Ottawa punting and subs at quarterback for Russ Jackson, as well as taking his regular turn at defensive halfback, had a pair of interceptions to go with his fourth-quarter touchdown.

BLUM AND GILBERT GET 2
 Linebacker Mike Blum and Don Gilbert also picked off a pair, while Larry DeGraw and Bob O'Billovich grabbed one each.

Ottawa led 13-0 after one quarter, 14-7 at the half and 28-9 after 45 minutes.

The game threatened to turn into a fiasco as exuberant fans began invading the field as early as the half-time show.

Officials were hard pressed to keep the game going in the final quarter as the fans jammed the sidelines and proceeded on intermittent excursions in to the end zones, with some of them penetrating the team huddles and climbing on to goal posts.

It all ended in a sordid note as veteran Hamilton lineman Angelo Mosca became involved in a helmet-swinging incident with the crowd, which blocked his route to the Hamilton dressing room and threw an assortment of punches at him.

START FAST
 Quarterback Russ Jackson, voted the outstanding player in Canadian football this season, took just over four minutes to get the Rough Riders rolling.

He hit Tucker on a 61-yard pass-and-run lay and Racine converted. Seven minutes later he hit Scott, and the lanky halfback eluded a pileup near the Hamilton 30 to make the score 13-0.

Grant scored his first touchdown early in the second quarter on a 19-yard pass from Zuger. Racine tried a field goal from the Hamilton 17, but it was wide and the Roughies settled for a single point.

Dillard contributed two of his three touchdowns within a two-minute span in the third on 10-and-eight-yard passes from Jackson. Cline conceded a safety touch late in the quarter to retain possession of the ball.

With 22 seconds elapsed in the final quarter, Grant scored his second TD. However, 90 seconds later Cline took a scoring pass from Gilbert and then Dillard was back for his third score to finish off the Ottawa touchdown spree.

Racine completed scoring with a single on a 19-yard field goal attempt.

The Riders built a total offense of 426 yards, 263 through the air and 164 rushing. The T-cats had 206 yards through the air and 49 on the ground.

Jackson, Cline and Gilbert were good on 15 of the 30 passes while Zuger, Cosentino and fullback Art Baker tried 25, completing 15.

Ottawa had 20 first downs in 13 for the T-cats.

AFL Positions Stay Unchanged

Buffalo Bills tightened their grip atop the Eastern Division and Kansas City Chiefs remained strongly in front in the Western Division in Sunday's American Football League action.

Buffalo scored a 45-30 triumph over Houston Oilers for a 7-1 record. The Oilers now are 3-8.

Kansas City and Boston Patriots played to a 27-27 tie, giving the Chiefs an 8-3-1 record and holding the Patriots, who had trailed Buffalo by one-half game in the east, to 8-2.

Oakland kept its Western Division hopes alive by defeating Denver Broncos 17-3, raising the Chargers to 7-4. Denver is 2-8.

In the other AFL game, New York broke a four-game losing streak by beating Miami 20-13. The victory lifted the Jets record to 5-4-1 and maintained a slim margin of hope in the eastern race. The Dolphins lost their eighth in 10 games.

JANIK STARS
 At Houston, Buffalo's Tom Janik played havoc with Houston quarterback Don Trull's passes as the Bills turned the new-look Oiler team's air game against it.

Janik intercepted one of Trull's passes and carried it 37 yards for a touchdown. Moments earlier, he had latched on to another pass and set up a drive that paid off nine plays later with Jackie Kemp's 26-yard keeper around right end.

Colts Out Of First Place
 Detroit Lions upset Baltimore Colts Sunday, knocking the Colts out of a first-place tie in the National Football League's Western Conference.

Dallas Cowboys, however, moved into the first-place deadlock in NFL's Eastern Conference with St. Louis Cardinals, idle during the weekend.

In an upset of a milder nature, Atlanta Falcons won the first regular-season game of their young history, beating New York Giants 27-16.

The Colts' 20-14 loss to Detroit coupled with Green Bay Packers' 13-6 victory over Chicago Bears left them one game behind the Packers, who are 8-2.

York Defeats St. James Rams Sat.

WINNIPEG (CP) — Toronto East York Argonauts exploded for 23 points in the last quarter to capture their third consecutive Canadian amateur football title Saturday with a 30-18 victory over St. James Rams.

Quarterback Gord McTaggart, a Toronto native, sparked the late drive with a 36-yard touchdown romp that put East York ahead for good.

As 300 fans watched in 24-degree temperature, St. James scored 16 points in the third quarter to take a nine-point lead. Toronto nursed a 7-0 lead at halftime after a scoreless first quarter.

But a penalty and a brilliant play by McTaggart found the necessary holes in St. James' defence in the last 10 minutes.

Toronto halfback Gerry Burrows caught a 32-yard McTaggart pass for the first East York touchdown in the opening minutes of the second quarter.

Tom Walker made it 7-0 when a field goal attempt went for a single on the last play of the half.

In the third quarter, St. James quarterback Wayne Hinkel, a Winnipeg high school teacher, guided his squad to two converted touchdowns and two singles.

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SCORES TWO TDs
 Jack Robinson converted both touchdowns for St. James and added two singles. But the outstanding Rams player was halfback Chuck Michalski, who romped for two touchdowns.

With Rams leading 16-7 and Toronto moving from their own 25-yard line, Denny McCusker, substitute quarterback, marched his team to the St. James six.

On the next play, Toronto fullback Ray Williams, a top rusher in the game with 101 yards in 16 carries, scored and Walker's convert made it 16-14 for St. James.

A third down gamble by Rams failed on their own 28 and three plays later Walker put Toronto ahead 17-16 on a 24-yard field goal.

Palmer Wins Houston International Tournament

PALMER BIRDIES TO WIN
 Palmer birdied his way to a 34-36-68 and captured third place, worth \$8,000, with his 72-hole total of 277.

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Doug Sanders bagged a final 34-36-70 and took sixth with 279. Then came a quartet at 280.

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — Arnold Palmer dropped a 12-foot putt on the final hole Sunday and won the pressure-packed \$100,000-Houston-Champions International golf tournament by a stroke over Gardner Dickinson Jr.

Palmer had finished his two-under-par 34-35-69 round for a 72-hole total of 275, nine under par, and was watching on television when Dickinson, 39, came home needing a par four to tie the Palmer and force a sudden-death playoff.

But Dickinson, from Lost Tree Village, Fla., flubbed his second shot, was short of the green on his third, then chipped boldly from about 30 feet and the ball just did not get the hole.

First prize was worth \$21,000 for Palmer, the all-time money winner in golf. Dickinson, who had \$39,230 in official money winnings although he hadn't won this year, collected \$13,000 for second place.

Dickinson, the pace-setter by one stroke over Palmer at the 54-hole mark, finished with an even par 36-35-71 and a total of 276.

WINS MONEY CROWN
 While Palmer charged to the victory, Billy Casper clinched the official money winners title as he finished tied with Jack Nicklaus, the money titleholder the last two years.

Casper shot a one-over par for 264, even par for the tournament.

George Archer of Gilroy,

Calif., fired a 34-36-68 and captured third place, worth \$8,000, with his 72-hole total of 277.

Doug Sanders bagged a final 34-36-70 and took sixth with 279. Then came a quartet at 280.

Palmer said he had only 28 putts, including eight one putts. "It was the best putting round I've had in a good while."

Casper and Nicklaus each won \$11,977. Casper finished the tour with \$121,944 to Nicklaus' \$111,418. Palmer took third with \$110,467.

George Knudson of Toronto, who had shared the halfway lead with Dickinson at 136 after Friday's play, shot a two-over-par 73 Saturday and a four-over-par 75 Sunday to finish at 284 with eight other golfers.

Knudson, 29, who the previous Sunday had won individual honors in the Canada Cup at Tokyo, won \$1,197.

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Habs Win, Chicago Ties, Bruins Win Fifth Straight

NEW YORK (AP) — Montreal goalie Charlie Hodge, making his fourth start of the season, led the sagging Canadiens to a 2-1 National Hockey League victory over New York Rangers Sunday night.

The win ended a five-game losing streak for the Canadiens and a five-game unbeaten string for the Rangers.

Hodge turned away 40 shots in achieving his first victory. He had played in two losses and a tie previously.

Hodge was particularly sharp in the scoreless first period, when the Rangers outshot the Canadiens 15-5.

Montreal's Gilles Tremblay snapped a scoreless tie at 13:09 of the second period with his first goal of the season. It came on a soft backhand which found its way between New York goalie Ed Giacomin's pads. Ted Harris and Claude Provost assisted.

Dave Balon won a faceoff, recovered the puck and shovelled it past Giacomin for Montreal's second goal. A maze of players blocked the New York netminder's view on the goal, which came at 17:45.

Both teams were a man short less than one minute later when Harry Howell scored for New York. Ingardfield sent Howell in with a perfect pass and the Ranger defenceman unwhipped a 25-footer past Hodge.
