

**Useful Recipes.**

**FURNITURE POLISH.**—Alcohol, 21 ounces; gum shellac 2 ounces; linseed oil 14 ounces; gum benzoin, 2 ounces; oxalic acid, 1 ounce; white resin, 2 ounces. Dissolve the gums and acid in the alcohol, let it remain 24 hours and then add the oil. This polish has been in use in my family for fully fifty years, in a damp climate, and has been found to keep the furniture in perfect condition.

**TO KEEP BEDS FROM HAVING BUGS.**—I see no end of receipts for cleansing beds, and, as a hotel-keeper have, perhaps, paid over \$300 for various nostrums. My plan is, during the present month, March, to have all my beds taken to pieces, to scrub all the joints and ends with water and soap, and then to use any hard varnish for the ends, slats, &c. I know of no other method as easy or as thorough. I have used this in Georgia and Florida, where vermin abound.

**BREAKFAST HASH.**—Chop into hash some cold meat, (corned beef, beef, or mutton, or fowl;) season with salt and a little pepper, also a little butter if liked; boil enough potatoes to make, when mashed, twice the quantity of the hash; mash the potatoes to a cream, adding before the mashing a tablespoonful of butter and a tablespoonful of salt; fill an earthen baking dish with the potatoes, rounding it handsomely; in the centre of the potatoes make a deep hole large enough to contain the hash; round it nicely and bake a light brown; garnish with celery-tops.

**BOSTON CREAM CAKES.**—Put in frying-pan or other flat-bottomed vessel one-half pint of water and one cup of butter; when boiling, add two cups of sifted flour; stir well three or four minutes, and put into a deep dish to cool; when perfectly cool, add five eggs and a teaspoonful of saleratus; beat until no egg can be seen; allow one tablespoonful of this to each cake, and bake in buttered pans about four inches apart, in a very hot oven, about 15 minutes; when baked make an opening in the side of each cake, add three teaspoonfuls of cream, made as follows: To one pint of boiling water add two eggs, one cup of white sugar, half-cup flour, well beaten together; when cool flavor with extract of lemon.

**STUFFED EGGS.**—Poil the eggs hard, cut them in two lengthwise, and remove the yolks which chop, adding to them some cooked chicken, lamb, veal, or pickled tongue, chopped fine; season the mixture, add enough gravy or the raw yolk of an egg to bind them. Stuff the cavities smooth them, and press the two halves together; roll them in beaten egg and bread crumbs. When just ready to serve up, dip them in a wire basket, into boiling lard, drain, serve on napkin. Garnish with parsley or leaves, or serve with tomato sauce.

**POTATO PUFFS.**—Take cold roast meat, beef, mutton, or veal and ham together—clean from gristle, cut small, and season with pepper and salt; also cut pickles if liked; boil and mash some potatoes, make them into a paste with an egg, and roll out, dredging with flour; cut round with a saucer; put some of the seasoned meat upon one half and fold the other like a puff; pinch neatly, and fry a light brown.

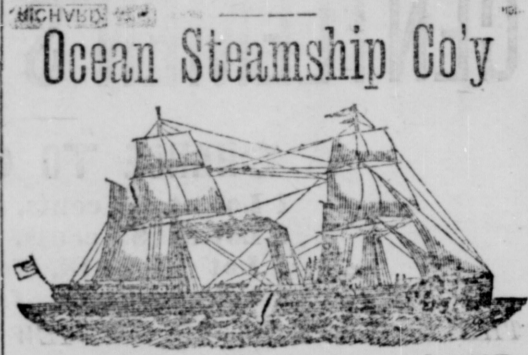
**BREAD PUDDING.**—Half a pound of stale bread, soaked in warm water for ten minutes, and wrung dry in a clean cloth; one quart of milk, four eggs, yolks and whites well beaten together; two ounces of butter, one even teaspoonful of salt, half a pound of well washed and pickled currants, dried in a towel; one coffee-cup light brown sugar, half a grated nutmeg; mixed well; butter the pan, and bake for three quarters of an hour in a hot oven. Cost, about thirty cents, at present; when eggs are cheaper, 25 cents, and is sufficient for eight people.

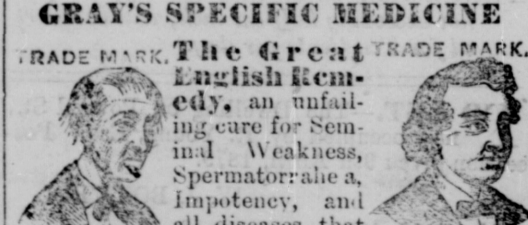

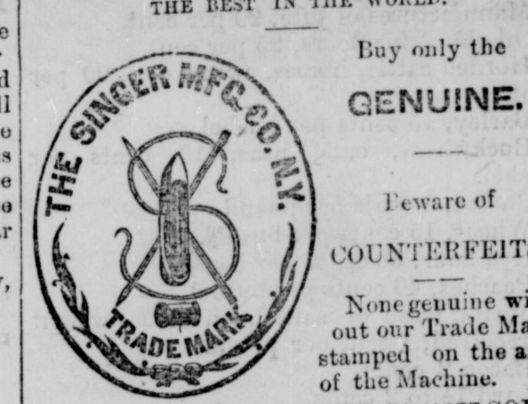
