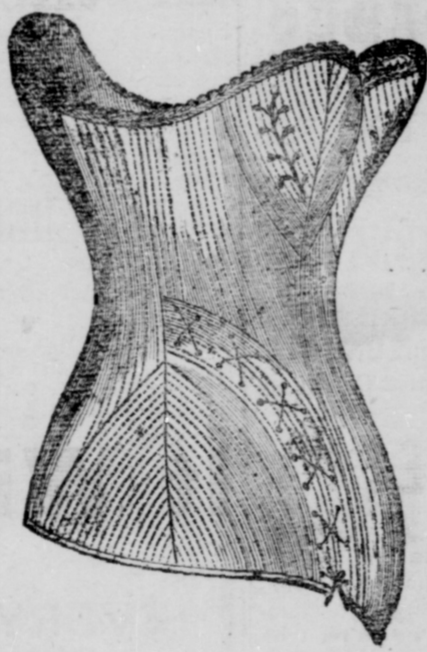

## Beautify the Farm and Home.

(Montreal Witness)

A proposition comes to us to the effect that all farmers should regularly occupy Saturday afternoon in cleaning up their places, and thus doing their share in making the country look as beautiful as it might. There are few countries where so little attention is paid to outward neatness as is the case in Canada. This is a matter in which new countries almost necessarily differ from old ones. The English spend a great deal of time keeping their farms, their villages and their towns clean, and in making their outward surroundings respectable. On many parts of the continent slovenliness is so utterly condemned by public opinion, and one's standing depends so much upon his surroundings, that everything is scrupulously finished and clean. Time spent in clearing away unsightly dead timber would not only furnish a certain amount of firewood to the saving of valuable, or prospectively valuable, living crop, but would add to the price obtainable if the farm were brought to sale. The keeping of fences in good repair and the planting of hedges along their lines to take their places in time would also pay. Fencing rails cost more now than they once did, and some day they will probably have to be thus replaced. By the way, would it not be possible to improve some of these unsightly fences off the face of the country altogether? The road front should also be attended to. Shrubs and shade trees should be planted in ornamental positions. The house should be adorned with climbers, and in short everything done that will make home pleasant to the eye of those who remain in it, and its memory in the minds of those who may wander from it the brightest thing on earth. In short, our farmers should make themselves into country gentlemen, and bring up their sons and their daughters, too, with a pride in their origin and calling. If this proposition were carried out, what a changed country this would be in six months. Eden itself, we are given to understand, would, on the other hand, soon have to become a wilderness had man not been put into it "to dress and to keep it."

## The Scot and the Devil.

Highlanders have the habit when talking their English, such as it is, of interjecting the personal pronoun "he" where not required, such as "the king he has come." Often in consequence a sentence is rendered extremely ludicrous. A gentleman said he recently listened to Rev. Mr. —, who began his discourse thus:—"My friends, you will find my text in the first epistle generated Peter, fifth chapter and eighth verse: "The devil he goeth about like a roaring lion seeking whom he may devour." Now, my brethren for your instruction I have divided my text into four heads. Firstly, we shall endeavour to ascertain who the devil he was. ## MISCELLANEOUS.

Garibaldi is creating great excitement in Italy.

Toronto thinks its late Exhibition will clear about \$5,000.

Ex Queen Isabella, having been permitted to return, intends to remain in Spain.

The managers of the Montreal Exhibition netted \$24,000. Nothing succeeds like success.

A new medical college will be erected in Raleigh, N. C., for colored students. Eleven thousand dollars will be raised to build it.

Canadian Hops are growing in favour with American brewers. The Philadelphia brewers now esteem them the best grown on the continent.

It is said that the date of the opening of Parliament will not be definitely decided until the return of the Governor-General to the Capital.

The tonnage of English sailing vessels has decreased by about 500,000 tons since 1870, but steam tonnage has increased by about 1,400,000 tons.

A meddlesome old woman was sneering at a young mother's awkwardness with her infant and said "I declare, a woman never ought to have a baby unless she knows how to hold it." "Nor a tongue either," was the quiet rejoinder.

The Signal Corps Station at Cape Henry, Va., on the 26th ult., reports to the Chief Signal Officer as follows: "The two masted British schooner Lizzie and Emma, McPhee, from Norfolk for Kingston, Ja., with a cargo of shingles, was burned last night in Lynn Haven Inlet. The crew of six and the sails were saved."

All honor to Helen Gladstone. Although daughter of the English Premier she earns her own living, having taken the position of private secretary to the vice principal of Newnham College, where she was lately a student. Her main object is to set an example to her sex, and to do her share towards putting a stop to the idea, which is so prevalent in England, that it is degrading for a lady to work for her living.

Lord Archibald Campbell, on recently arriving in Liverpool by the "Peruvian," published an account of a gigantic fight of which he and his fellow passengers were witnesses off Bellisle Island, between a monster sword fish about 30 feet long and a large whale. When the combat faded from the sight of those on board the "Peruvian" the whale was getting the worse of the encounter.

James Forrester and wife, went to Indianapolis from Laporte on Tuesday. They stopped at a hotel over night, and blew out the gas before going to bed. Next morning Forrester was found dead in bed, and his wife in such a condition that her recovery was despaired of. Two men, one of them James Hanna, of Oakland, Pa., were found dead in bed in the Burnet House, at Stroudsburg, on Wednesday. They blew out the gas on retiring, and were suffocated.

A bogus Medical College, similar to that recently discovered in Philadelphia, and designated the New England University of Arts and Science, has been found in Boston, the leading operator of which appears to be Mr. Harry C. Stickney, who was one of the Buchanan Faculty of Philadelphia. What number of the diplomas has been issued by the New England institution is not known. Stickney asserts that none have been issued in this country, but there are evidences that some have been sent to Germany and other parts of Europe, and inquiry on the subject has been made of parties at the suggestion of the German Minister at Washington. Stickney, in 1875, procured New Hampshire a charter for this institution, which however was soon afterwards repealed, but investigation shows that the business has been active at the office of the University in this city.

DEATH OF A NOTED CHARACTER.—Mr. Gamble, Master of Horse to the Emperor Napoleon, died recently at Chiselhurst. He was born in Saltcoats in 1817. He entered the service of Prince Louis Napoleon in London in 1846, went with him to Paris in 1848, played his part in the coup d'etat in 1851, accompanied the Emperor through the Italian campaign of 1859, the Franco-Prussian war of 1870, and was with the Emperor in captivity at Wilhelmshohe. He also came to Chiselhurst, and remained the faithful attendant of the Emperor, Prince Imperial and Empress who were greatly attached to him. Deceased had many Scotch and English friends, who will remember his hospitality during their visits to the Imperial stables at the Louvre, where he had the charge of the largest and finest stud in the world. He received presents from most of the crowned heads in Europe when visiting Paris, including the Queen and Prince Albert. He was proud of being a Scotchman, remarkably shrewd and intelligent, and kind to his relatives.
