Also be sure to secure eligibility certificates as no horse can start on any track without same and it should be applied for right away. The starting fee of \$10 applies also to the three and four-year-old futurities. These futurities give every promise of being among the best in years and the racing date is September 9th at the Charlottetown track. The secretary-treasurer is W. G. Our congratulations to the young men who promoted the Kinkora Raceway on the success attained with their first meet last Wednesday afternoon. Over 1,000 enthusiastic fans were present to cheer the winners, which were: No. 1 Classified, Tiny Budlong (Bryenton) 1-1-1, best time 2:16 3-3, owned by Linus Mulligan. This is the track record pacer. No. 2 Classified, High Tide, owned and driven by Marie Kennedy, O'Leary, 1-1-1, best time 2:17. No. 3 Classified, Julia Budlong (C. Craig) 1-1-1, best time 2:20. No. 4 Classified, Clipperdale, owned and driven by Herb Wisener, Pictou, 1-1-1, best time 2:26 2-5.

A release from the publicity department, Saratoga Raceway, N.Y., states that Lucky Fingo, a son of Calumet Fingo 2:04 1/2 and Azie Argot, has won six victories there, his last four in succession. He is owned by the Sturdy Dog Food Company of Syracuse and is expected to take a record of 2:10 in the near future—mighty good showing for a two-year-old. His characteristics are tersely summed up as follows: "He leaves in a hurry and he stays on the pace all the way."

Another two-year-old that is making repeated strides to success is Christissima by Nibble Hanover 1:58 1/2. This little gal was second to Lucky Fingo in her last start. She is being trained by Joe O'Brien for Dunbar W. Bostwick, treasurer of the United States Trotting Association. Our remark on the above is that it is a distinct compliment to Joe to receive a horse from the Bostwick stable, which includes some of the finest in the world, notably Chris Spencer 2:00 2-5, a trotter considered second only to Proximity, and winner of \$126,000.

A page ad yesterday gave the actual starters for Old Home Week races next week, August 14-19. The 24 well filled classes have a total of 178 horses, one of the largest lists ever raced in the Maritimes. Commencing Monday night at 8.30 there will be a Junior Free For All, a No. 2 Classified and No. 3 Classified Trot. Then racing follows Tuesday afternoon, Wednesday afternoon and Wednesday night, Thursday afternoon and Thursday night. It is a tremendous program with most of the best horses in the Maritimes taking part. No doubt it will be a meeting that will be long remembered by racing fans.

with the illegal methods of taking trout as described, they have pollution troubles to contend with. Quite a few mill operators have no adequate facilities for the disposal of sawdust. Many trout streams are becoming clogged with mill rubbish and trout fishing is declining in consequence. Refuse from starch factories has played havoc with trout in the past and will continue to do so unless steps are taken to prevent the residue from potatoes, left after the starch is extracted, being allowed to enter the water. Co-operation with enforcement officers by hunters and fishermen is the key-note of success in respect to game law enforcement. I note with extreme satisfaction a marked inclination on the part of those who take their outdoor recreation with rod and gun to come forward with information regarding game law infractions brought to their notice. This is an encouraging sign.

Hunters and fishermen are beginning to realize that they are standing in their own light when they withhold information regarding game law violations. The upland game birds picture continues to brighten particularly in respect to Huns and pheasants. By the time raspberry pickers are finished with the crop a fair indication may be had regarding our Ruffed Grouse. The waterfowl outlook for the coming fall is still clouded in uncertainty. I am referring specifically in this instance to ducks. Dominion Wildlife Officers are expected in the province shortly to make a final check on the duck crop and when this is completed an over-all picture will be available on duck hunters prospects this fall. As mentioned earlier the duck season opens on October 1st and the goose season on October 20th. Hungarian parting will coincide with the ducks which is as it should be.
