Lenten Meditation

From The Columns of The Times, London. STRENGTH THROUGH WEAKNESS

Modern life often masks the frailty of man. His questing mind has discovered so much that life's ultimate secrets seem almost within his grasp. Discovery has been followed by technical triumphs enabling him to plumb the depths of the sea and to traverse at fantastic speeds the heights of the air.

Medical science has also made great advances: the expectation of life has been so increased that what was old age in an earlier century is today frequently regarded as comparatively youth.

The achievement of mastery, however, has brought in its train a certainty of frailty. From the heights of the air and the depths of the sea there may come destruction more terrible than any previous age either knew or contemplated. Man's power over nature has so greatly increased that the possibility of universal destruction now haunts the imagination.

One consequence is that in this western world nervous and mental breakdown has become common. Yet just because the mentally overwrought and the mentally defective are cared for in isolation from the rest of the community, it is easy for men and women to forget their very existence.

As life grows more sophisticated, even the terrors of death come to be hushed up. Yet, for those who have to bear it, sorrow is thus made all the more poignant and the shock of separation more deeply felt.

There is no lasting triumph through pretence, through the masking of life's pains and terrors. The way of stoicism, even though it faces the facts and makes the best of them, brings little security to those who know in their hearts that they are weak.

The Christian also faces the facts—including the fact of his own weakness—yet sees a deeper, meaning implicit in them. He knows, in the words of the Collect that "the frailty of man without This cannot but fall." For him the basic premise of all living is that God made him. Life is lived rightly, the world is organized rightly, only when it is lived and organized as its Maker would have it be.

Where is this deeper meaning to be found? The Christian believes that all he needs to know has been shown him in the life and death of him who took man's frailty upon him; who bore the consequences of man's pride and sin; who faced no imitation pains and died no imitation death, but was, nevertheless, death's victor and not its victim.

simple project for Canada as we could base our sizes on the scientific survey by the U. S. government.

But the setting of Standard Sizes alone will not be enough—manufacturers will not use these standards, unless consumers demand standard sizes.

C. A. C. will continue to press for these standards. You as members can help by asking for them.

Children's clothes are even more confusing as to sizes. What does size 5 mean? You'd actually think it would be the size for a child aged 5 years but that is very rarely the case. A mother trying to clothe her 5 year old buys a 6 in this, a size 7 in that and maybe even size 8. She rarely buys size 5.

It is usually too small. Why should we put up with a condition like this?—perhaps 50 per cent of it is our own fault! The retailer is anxious to please his customer and the manufacturer in turn will make what the public wants if he knows what it is.

Let us pay more attention to this in our shopping and back up C. A. C. in their efforts to improve conditions as they exist now as regards women's and children's clothing.

UNHEEDED WARNINGS

When we were in Puerto Rico some years ago we heard this story of the experience of the people on a neighboring island. They had been warned well in advance of the approach of one of those terrific cyclones from which that area suffers, and had every preparation possible for the onset.

It came and passed, and little damage was done. The sun came out, the calm was perfect, and the people threw open their doors and windows in answer to nature's smiles.

Unfortunately this was only "the eye" of the storm, the calm at the centre around which the hurricane raged, and in a short time the other side of the circle struck them when they were unprepared for it and the devastation was complete. Open doors and windows left their houses at the mercy of the wind and the loss was irreparable.

All the Gospel accounts of the events leading to the crucifixion describe Christ's warning to Peter, and then his denials. He was caught unprepared as were the inhabitants of that southern isle. He met defeat at the point of his greatest strength. If ever there was a heart full of love and loyalty to Christ, it was Peter's. If ever there was a man brave to the point of recklessness, it was Peter. When the hands of the officers whom Judas drew were laid on Christ, Peter drew his sword and struck out against the enemy even though he was aware that resistance against such odds was hopeless. It would have meant certain death if Jesus had not stopped the fight. But when his Master was taken prisoner and refused to use in His own defense the power which they knew was His, dismay seized all His followers.

Peter was caught off his guard by the mockery of a mischievous girl, and the man whom danger could not daunt fell before scorn and did the thing which he had just declared that he would die rather than do.

The Lenten period is the time for self-examination and re-education and Peter's experience contains lessons for us all. In the first place, he had ignored the Master's warning in Gethsemane: "Watch and pray lest ye enter into temptation; the spirit indeed is willing but the flesh is weak."

Because Peter had slept while Jesus was praying, he went into the crisis of the ages wholly unprepared. Some of the most practical men we have ever met have testified that the worship of the Lord's Day and the truth of God strengthened them for the duties and trials of the week. A trust with God at the beginning of the day has kept many a weak man "strong in the Lord and in the power of His might". As Luther remarked: "Prayer and provender hinder no man's journey."

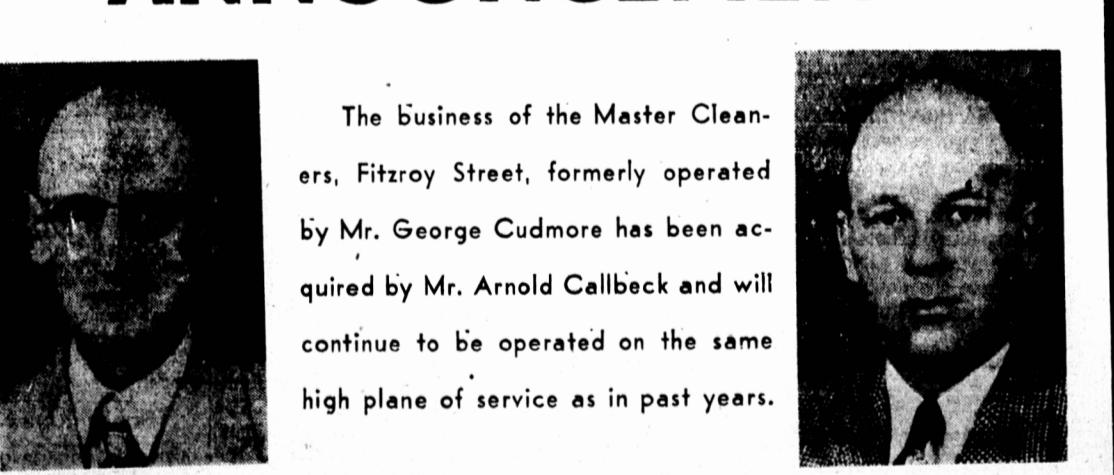
